前 言

英语篇章改错是一篇约200字的文章,标着题号的各行往往有一处错:遗漏、多余、搭配不当、近义或近形词混淆、拼写或词形变化错误。每处错误只涉及一个词。错误多出现在常用词:冠词、代词、连词、前置词、不规则动词。

做改错题的方式,大体已有规范:遗漏的在遗漏处插入"Λ"号,并在该行的题号右侧写应插入的词;多余的或错误的在下面划线,在填答案处写"/"或正确的词;没有错误的则只须在题号右边写"√"。具体请参考"做题样板"。

一些学生未掌握正确的方法。他们常出的差错有: (1) 把答案写在原文里; (2)把答案写在其他行; (3)在正确答案 前写出原文错误的词,还写"改为"或画箭头; (4)在没有题号的各行里找错误。应按上段讲的方法做(不可像本书参考答案那样做)。

改错题涉及的是常见错误。它与选择题不同之处是: 做选择题只判断现成语言材料的正误。改错题限定错误在 某一行,学生必须判断具体错在何处并写出正确的词。篇 章改错有时联系相当长的上下文才做得出来。若能改错, 做选择题可有较大的把握。平时应常注意判别正误,尤其 留心作业里教师的批改。做题要力求触类旁通。

本书以有限的习题复盖尽可能多的典型基本错误。为了增进读者的做题兴趣,作者精心选择自写的文章,以故事为主,并兼顾趣味性和知识性。本习题集难度相当于高考题。最好高二开始做这种题目。
