# Global Warming

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Since 1850 the average<sup>1</sup> temperature<sup>2</sup> of Earth's surface<sup>3</sup> has increased<sup>4</sup> about 0.6°C (1°F). Scientists predict<sup>5</sup> it may warm much more by the end of this century<sup>6</sup>. Who's turning up the heat?

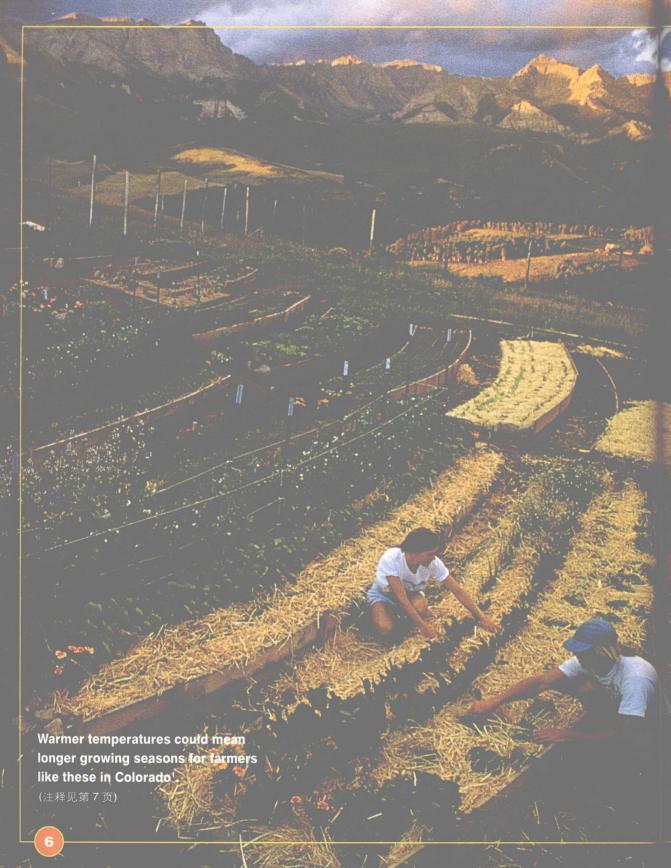
Well, it seems that we are! Some of this global warming may be natural. However, nearly all scientists now agree that most of it is due to<sup>7</sup> people's actions<sup>8</sup>. Over the past 150 or so<sup>9</sup> years, we've added huge amounts<sup>10</sup> of certain gases, especially<sup>11</sup> carbon dioxide<sup>12</sup>, to the air. These gases can trap<sup>13</sup> heat near Earth's surface—so more of them in the air means a hotter planet<sup>14</sup>.

As temperatures climb, scientists say we can expect Earth's climate<sup>15</sup> to change in many ways. In this book, we'll take a closer look at <sup>16</sup> global warming—its causes<sup>17</sup> and its possible<sup>18</sup> effects<sup>19</sup> on the planet. Global warming could affect<sup>20</sup> everyone on Earth, but not everyone agrees on<sup>21</sup> what to do about it.

# How Well Are We Doing?

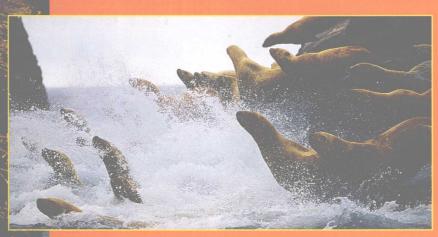
### **Good News**

- Global warming may lead to shorter, warmer winters.
- Longer summers mean a longer growing season.
   Farmers may be able to grow more food.
- Plants need carbon dioxide to live and grow. More carbon dioxide in the air could be good for some kinds of plants.
- Reducing<sup>2</sup> the amount of carbon dioxide in the air could slow the warming trend<sup>3</sup>

### **Bad News**

- Warmer temperatures could melt<sup>4</sup> glaciers<sup>5</sup> and polar<sup>6</sup> ice sheets<sup>7</sup>.
- Melting glaciers and ice sheets add water to the sea. As sea levels<sup>8</sup> rise, coastlines and some islands could disappear<sup>10</sup> under water.
- Global warming may change the weather in ways that lead to more severe<sup>11</sup> storms, floods<sup>12</sup>, and droughts<sup>13</sup>.
- Getting everyone in the world to work together to reduce carbon dioxide is not easy.

# Life in the Greenhouse

# 温室中的生活

Earth is surrounded<sup>1</sup> by a layer<sup>2</sup> of air called the atmosphere. Without the atmosphere Earth would be a cold, lifeless<sup>3</sup> planet. Why? Because the atmosphere holds heat near the planet's surface that would otherwise<sup>4</sup> escape<sup>5</sup> into space<sup>6</sup>. Let's see how this works.

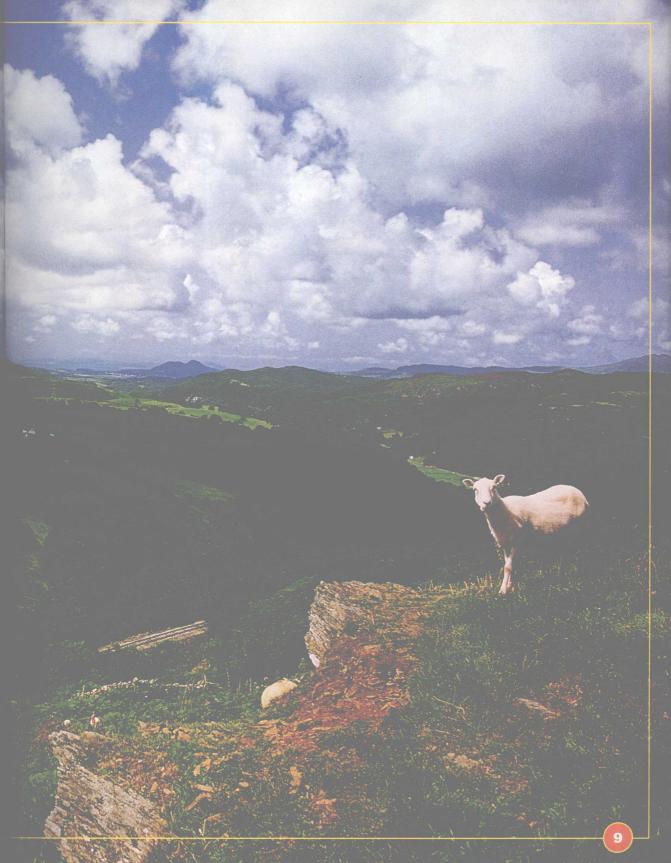
Our atmosphere is a mixture<sup>7</sup> of many gases. Nitrogen<sup>8</sup> and oxygen<sup>9</sup> are the gases that make up<sup>10</sup> most of the atmosphere. Other gases, includ-

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ing carbon dioxide, are found in smaller amounts. Even though<sup>11</sup> you can't see it, our atmosphere is one of the secrets to life on Earth.

The atmosphere makes life on Earth possible.

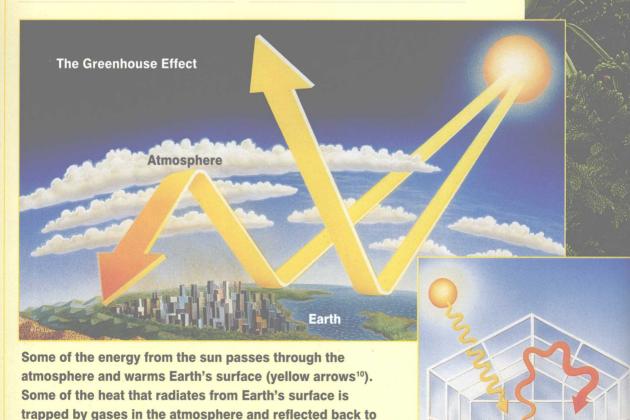


Light from the sun passes through the atmosphere, just as sunlight passes through panes<sup>1</sup> of glass in a greenhouse. When energy<sup>2</sup> from the sun strikes<sup>3</sup> our planet's surface, the sunlight warms the land and the top layers of the ocean<sup>4</sup>. The warmed surface radiates<sup>5</sup>, or gives off, heat.

As that heat rises, some of it is "trapped" by gases in the atmosphere and reflected<sup>6</sup> back toward the planet's surface. Like the glass in a greenhouse that holds heat inside the building, gases in the air hold in heat around Earth. Scientists call this global heat-trapping process<sup>7</sup> the greenhouse effect<sup>8</sup>. The greenhouse effect keeps the temperature of our planet's surface comfortably<sup>9</sup> warm.

## **Too Much of a Good Thing**

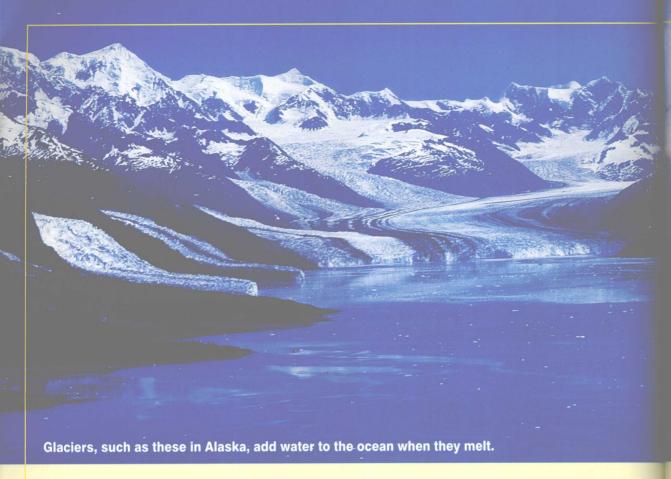
Several gases in the atmosphere contribute to<sup>1</sup> global warming. The one you've probably<sup>2</sup> heard the most about is carbon dioxide. Carbon dioxide is a good heat-trapping gas—a greenhouse gas, as scientists say. A certain amount of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere is natural. In fact<sup>3</sup>, you add some to the air every time you breathe out<sup>4</sup>.

We also add carbon dioxide to the air when we burn things, especially fossil fuels. Fossil fuels are energy sources<sup>5</sup> formed<sup>6</sup> from the remains<sup>7</sup> of plants and animals that lived millions of years ago. Coal, oil, and natural gas<sup>8</sup> are all fossil fuels. People in the United States and other countries started burning large amounts of fossil fuels more than a century ago. The amount of fossil fuels being burned each year has been increasing worldwide<sup>9</sup>. The more we burn, the more carbon dioxide is released<sup>10</sup> into the atmosphere. More carbon dioxide means more heat is trapped near Earth's surface.

Years ago, some scientists predicted a global warming if we added large amounts of carbon dioxide and other greenhouse gases to Earth's atmosphere. Other researchers began to track<sup>11</sup> Earth's temperature and the amount of carbon dioxide in the air. And guess what! Like two people walking hand in hand, as the amount of carbon dioxide in the air increased over time<sup>12</sup>, so has Earth's average surface temperature. Some scientists reported that if we keep adding carbon dioxide and other greenhouse gases to the atmosphere at the current rate<sup>13</sup>, Earth will probably warm at least<sup>14</sup> another 1.4 to 5.8°C (2.5 to 10.4°F) by the year 2100. That's a huge change in a very short time.

### **Melting Ice, Rising Seas**

What's the big deal<sup>1</sup> about Earth warming a few degrees<sup>2</sup>? Why are some people worried? What will happen? To figure out<sup>3</sup> how rising temperatures could affect Earth, scientists have gathered<sup>4</sup> information from researchers all over the world. They use the data<sup>5</sup> they collect to predict what the effects of global warming may be. Using the collected information, scientists predict that as global temperatures rise, glaciers and polar ice sheets will melt at a faster rate. This will add water to the oceans and will cause sea levels to rise worldwide. Many scientists believe that the 0.6°C (1°F)
