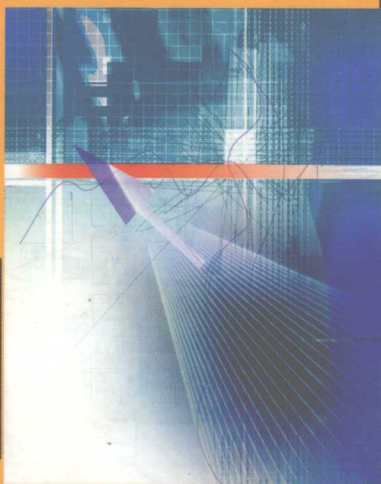

中国加入世贸组织后,提高英语水平,加强交际能力,是广大在校学生的共同愿望。

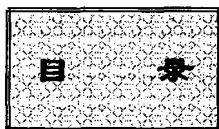
本书是根据国家教委英语专业教学大纲所编写,概括了1998年至2002年以来英语专业的各类考试题型。
