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# 前言

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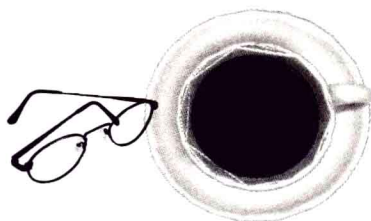

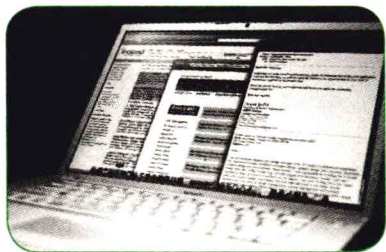

## Part 1 The Best and Worst Jobs of 2011 2011年度最佳与最差职业

## 阅读1 软件工程师就业前景大好 (MP3)



The year 2011 is the best of times for software engineers and the worst of times for **roustabouts**, according to a survey of the nation's best and worst jobs released.

Software engineers have the top jobs, thanks to the exploding demand for high-tech gadgets and the appetite for applications for iPods, tablets and other devices, said the survey by online jobs site CareerCast.com.

Software engineers enjoy a strong outlook for employment, low stress, few physical demands and good wages, it said.

Roustabouts, on the other hand, who are oil rig or gas **pipeline** workers, have the worst job, it said.

A roustabout's job is dangerous, as shown by the explosion aboard the Transocean Ltd. oil drilling rig in the Gulf of Mexico that killed 11 workers in April.

Roustabouts routinely work 12-hour shifts in tough conditions, it said.

The top five jobs, which include **mathematician**, actuary, **statistician** and computer systems, typically pay more than twice as much as the lowest jobs—\$83,777 compared to \$30,735 per year.

The least **desirable** jobs along with roustabout for 2011 are iron worker, lumberjack, roofer and taxi driver, it said.

CareerCast evaluated 200 professions based on pay, environment, hiring outlook, stress and physical demands, using data from the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, the Census Bureau and trade association studies.

To determine the amount of stress in a job, for example, the study looked at such factors as whether an employee's life was at risk or the number of **deadlines** and travel.

Jobs in media, led by public relations executives, dominated the highest stress professions, according to the report, although commercial airline pilot topped the list.

Jobs in communication can be high pressure, especially for newscasters who go on-air with little or no time for preparation and photojournalists working in dangerous environments.

Software engineer, computer programmer and mathematician were all rated low-stress.

## Topic /02

## The Paid Bloggers 美国正在流行新职业“博客作者”

时至今日，如果你是一个网民，恐怕不会不知道什么是“博客”。很多人会时不时在自己的博客上发表一些心情、图片、经历、评论等等。但是你有没有想过，写博客也可以成为一种职业？在

当今美国，靠写博客为生的人几乎跟律师一样多。这个事实会不会让身为博客达人的你感到兴奋呢？让我们一起来了解这一职业。

## Part 1 The Paid Bloggers in American 美国的收费博客作者

### 阅读1 靠写博客赚钱的美国人越来越多 (MP3)

Paid bloggers fit just about every definition of a microtrend: Their ranks have grown dramatically over the years, blogging is an important social and cultural movement that people care **passionately** about, and the number of people doing it for at least some income is approaching 1% of American adults.

The best studies we can find say we are a nation of over 20 million bloggers, with 1.7 million profiting from the work, and 452,000 of those using blogging as their primary source of income. That's almost 2 million Americans getting paid by the word, the post, or the click whether on their site or someone else's. And that's nearly half a million of whom it can be said, as Bob Dylan did of **Hurricane** Carter: "It's my work he'd say, I do it for pay."

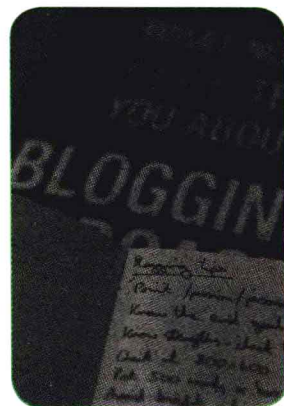
The barriers to entry couldn't be lower. Most bloggers for hire pay \$80 to get started, do it for about 35 months, and make a few hundred dollars. But a subgroup of these bloggers are the true professionals who work at **corporations**, serve as highly paid blogging consultants or write for sites with substantial traffic.

Pros who work for companies are typically paid \$45,000 to \$90,000 a year for their blogging. One percent make over \$200,000. And they report long hours 50 to 60 hours a week.

As bloggers have increased in numbers, the number of **journalists** has significantly declined. In Washington alone, there are now 79% fewer DC-based employees of major newspapers than there were just few years ago. At the same time, Washington is easily the most blogged-about city in America, if not the world.

Almost no blogging is by **subscription**; rather, it owes its economic model to on-line advertising. Bloggers make money if their consumers click the ads on their sites. Some sites even pay writers by the click, which is of course a system that promotes **sensationalism**, or doing whatever it takes to get noticed.

### 阅读2 美国人对这一现象的观点及忧虑

It is hard to think of another job category that has grown so quickly and become such a force in society without having any tests, degrees, or regulation of **virtually** any kind. Courses on blogging are now cropping up, and we can't be far away from the Columbia School of Bloggerism.



There is a lot of interest now in Twittering and Facebooking but those venues don't offer the career opportunities of blogging. Not since eBay opened its doors have so many been able to sit at their computer screens and make some money, or even make a whole living.

And with millions of human-hours now going into writing and recording opinion, we have to wonder whether being the blogging capital of the world will help America compete in the global economy.

Maybe all this self-criticism will propel us forward by putting us on the right track and helping us choose the right products. Maybe it will create a **resurgence** in the art of writing and writing courses. Or serve as a safety net for out of work professionals in the crisis. But for how long can nearly 500,000 people who are gradually replacing whole swaths of journalists survive with no worker protections, no enforced ethics codes, limited standards, and, for most, no formal training?

Blogs are already moving upmarket and improving. The term “Professional Blogger” is no longer an oxymoron.

Making money from blogging requires you to do only two things: drive a lot traffic, then maximize the income from that traffic.

## Topic /03

## Best Job in the World 世界上最让人“羡慕”的工作

你觉得什么工作让你羡慕呢? 是报酬优厚的职业经理人, 还是自由时间较多的大学老师, 抑或医生、律师、政府人员? 答案还真不是这样, 世界上“最好的工作”, 或者说是“终极工作”, 往往不是传统意义上的这些工作。它们是一些压力小、收入高, 让你感觉“怎么可能会有这样的好事”的工作。没错, 它们真的存在, 何不了解一下呢?

## Part 1 Unconventional Richly-paid Job 薪水丰厚的非传统工作

### 阅读1 全球风光无限的美差 (MP3)

Queensland have launched the 'Best Job in the World' campaign, calling for video applications from people interested in a \$100,000 contract to relax on Hamilton Island in the Great Barrier Reef for





six months while writing a blog to promote the island.

Helen Moores, chief buyer of world and **speciality** beers at Tesco has a job that most men could only dream of. Ms Moores tastes beer. Often as early as 9.30am and is employed to drink—and swallow—beers from around the world. "Sometimes I sample more than 20 beers in a session—so I have to watch it. My boyfriend is very jealous of my job."

Tony McLaughlan would argue that his role as an **electrician** in Antarctica for the British Antarctic Survey is the best. The -50C temperatures and the fact that Mr McLaughlan is 9,000 miles from home in an almost **uninhabitable** wilderness mean that demand for an electrician will be low. However, the £23,000 salary, free food and paid rent meant that thousands of people jammed phone lines when the job was first advertised on the BBC.

For those who prefer warmer climes, then work as a water slide tester might be more appealing. Tommy Lynch spends his working days touring his holiday firm's "splash resorts" to monitor quality control. For some of these he has to struggle to locations in Cyprus, the Algarve, Egypt and Mallorca. "I do have the best job in the world," said Mr. Lynch, "but no one believes me when I tell them what it is."

Perhaps the job that really takes the biscuit when it comes to "job satisfaction" belongs to Betto Almedia, during the Rio de Janeiro **carnival**. The Brazilian goes to work at 11am each day and spends his time painting the bodies of some of the carnival's most beautiful women.

It takes about two hours to paint each living art work, and most days he will have two blank canvases to turn into masterpieces, for which he charges £ 660 a day. "You wouldn't believe how many applications I get for an assistant," Mr. Almedia said. "But it's hard work, man, I take my job seriously."

Leigh McCarron is paid to take a night's rest at a Travelodge three or four times a week to ensure that the beds are up to standard. The position of director of sleep pays a salary of £ 60,000 a year.

## 阅读2 那些“另类”的高薪工作

Not all people seeking employment are content with traditional sectors. So Forbes has put together a list of 12 bizarre posts that come with solid salaries, with yoga master at the top place.

According to Forbes, although teaching yoga doesn't always **guarantee** people a hefty salary, Bikram Choudhury could receive an impressive \$5.7 billions a year, which reflects the fact that he can list as clients **luminaries** like former US President Richard Nixon. He created bikram yoga, had a bunch of franchises and millions of fans.

Pearl divers can pull in up to \$110,000 for just two months of work. However, they are always under the stress of getting lost and lack of air.

Yet another below-ground High-paying but hard job is that of an oil & gas diver. Qualified

professionals in this industry can make up to \$80,000 a year. They are very highly trained and require specialized certification beyond other commercial divers and they have to suffer from long separation from family.

No one ever said taking on weird and well-paying jobs would be easy. Take submarine chefs. A cook with six years of **submarine** cooking experience earns up to \$227,500 per year. Part of the reason is that it's hard to lure qualified chefs underwater to work for the nation's armed forces—even with the **temptation** of \$4,000 per week—as they tend to prefer the freedom and perks of life on dry land.

## Topic /04 Taking on Part-time Work 你可以做一个精明的“上班兼职族”
