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### 前 言

Education has been women's biggest 41 of this century. In the early years, orthodox critics warned that the education of females would make their breasts shrink, their milk dry up and their wombs distort or twist. In 1901, there were just 1, 170 female pupils in primary schools in all of Bengal. A hundred years later, the literacy level among 42 has gone up all over Asia. But even today women are expected to 43 their husbands, maintain comfortable homes and raise children.

Still, there has been some progress. For example, women in the subcontinent have changed their clothing customs. Earlier, a sari—a single, long piece of thin cotton—was tied \_\_44\_\_ the body. Now almost every woman also wears an underskirt, a blouse, underwear, shoes, some even stockings. The pioneers had to fight to adopt such clothing in a male-\_\_45\_\_ society that criticized women

even for wearing spectacles. But they persisted. For Hindus, a law was passed to ban sati, the practice in <u>46</u> a wife immolated herself on her dead husband's pyre. Other laws banned child marriage and polygamy and made it legal for <u>47</u> to remarry.

No constitution in any Asian country today makes a distinction between the rights it gives men and those it affords women. But 48 women are still oppressed. They are forced to remain malnourished, illiterate and unemployed sex objects or child-bearing machines. Women may have become 49 of government in many countries—India, Sri Lanka, Turkey even in Muslim-dominated Pakistan and Bangladesh. But as any chauvinist would explain, these women are mere puppets—and it's the men who 50 the strings.

### Passage 1

In U.S.A. homicide is down about 20 percent from the level of the early 90's; in 1997, it reached the lowest rate in 30 years. During the 80's, Brooklyn averaged two murders per day; last March, Brooklyn went a full week without a homicide for the first time in a generation. Crime is down in nearly every category, including burglary and robbery. Since 1993, not only has the felony rate dropped, but the total number of violent crimes has fallen 14 percent, even while the population continues to grow. As Gordon Witkin has written, "It's hard to think of a social trend with greater significance."

Many factors are at play here, among them the sheer reduction in criminals. Tougher laws and sentences have led to a furious rate of imprisonment, with 1.8 million Americans now jailed, more than double the figure of a decade age. The shift toward "community policing" has helped, though crimes are also falling in cities that have not adopted this system. It's important to note that, while most policing has improved in the past decade, there has been no national initiative on this score, just lots of local experiments.

The adoption of James Q. Wilson's "broken windows" theory of civil propriety has helped, too. Annoying as New York City Mayor's anti-walking campaign might be, there is no doubt that an
