要提高英文實力只有多閱讀。

有效的閱讀英文的方法:

- 1 選擇適合自己的程度,內容又有趣的文章或段落。
- 2. 閱讀全文一遍先明白大意。
- 3. 閱讀第二遍,把不明白的地方徹底弄明白。
- 4. 再將全文朗誦二、三遍(次數視個人的需要增減)。
- 5. 把大意用口頭或文字敘述一遍。

用上述的方法請英文旣簡單又有效。可是很多同學對學校中的英語卻感到厭惡和害怕。原因之一是有些教師上課補充一大堆零零碎碎的知識,語言的學習是一種"能力"的獲得,要靠練習才有效,而不是記住一堆"知識"。很多相關的用法、成語、單字,不必急於讓學生一次吞下。只要多閱讀课文或其他文章,將來自然會學到。而且單字、成語的每一個用法只有在文章中學習才能真正學會。第二個原因是考題太繁雜雞深。一課課文的考題往往比課文本身多好幾倍,或考題變化太大應用得太離譜。所以即使熟讀課文也考不好。因而逐漸對英語失去信心和興趣。

凡是目光遠大以聯考為目標或以培養真正的實力為目標的同學,請不要把時間浪費在鑽研那些知識與考題上,用那些時間用我上面提到的方法念課內或課外的文章,你可以比別人念得多。當然本書也希望你用這個方法閱讀。

市面上出售的閱讀材料很多,但是如果讀來索然無味或看不下去的東西,再怎麼好也沒有用。首先,你得選擇有趣的東西,讓自己樂意讀下去。本書"幽默英語閱讀測驗"便是基於這個信念而寫的。本書不僅趣味性高,而且它的取材

範圍更是包括生活中的各個層面——食、衣、住、行、娛樂 、教育、科學、醫樂、經濟、法律、藝術等無所不包。能使 讀者獲得極廣泛的字彙及各種的用語。除了提高閱讀能力外 ,對於應付聯考"作文"及"翻譯"也有很大的助益。

同樣的字彙,同樣的用語在別的書出現也許你記不住, 但在本書出現將使你忘不了。因為這些單字、成語或用法將 隨著有趣的故事深植在你的腦海中。而且當你要用到它們時 更可藉著有趣的內容很容易加以回憶或聯想。

本書可使程度好的同學在一個月內實力大進。更可使不 喜歡英語的同學一個月內**起死囘生**。本書更可緩和高三人緊 張的情緒。凡是高三人不可不看。

本書主要為高中生而寫,但也適合具有高二以上程度的 其他學校學生或社會人士閱讀。
