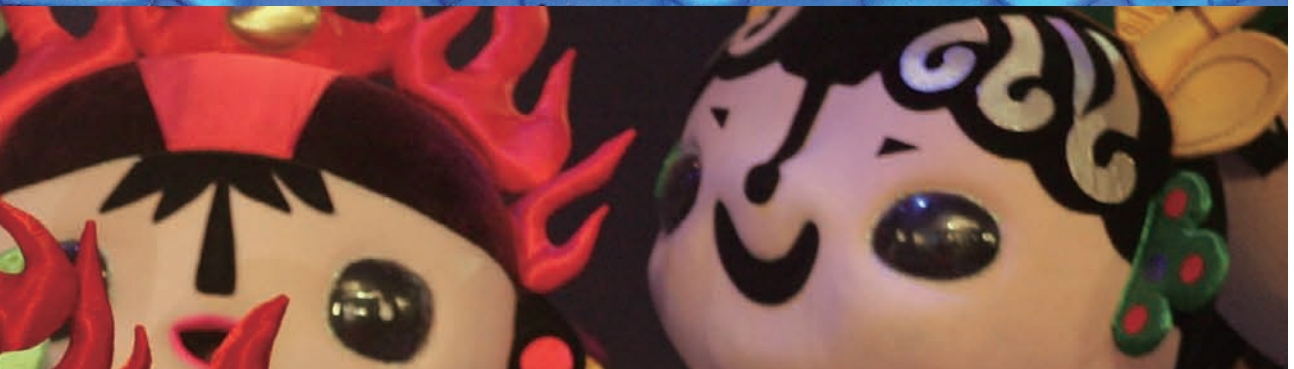
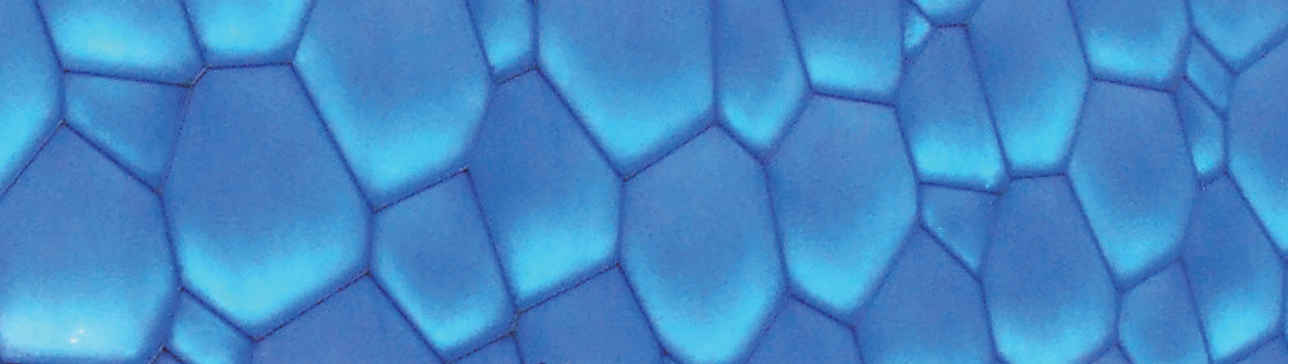


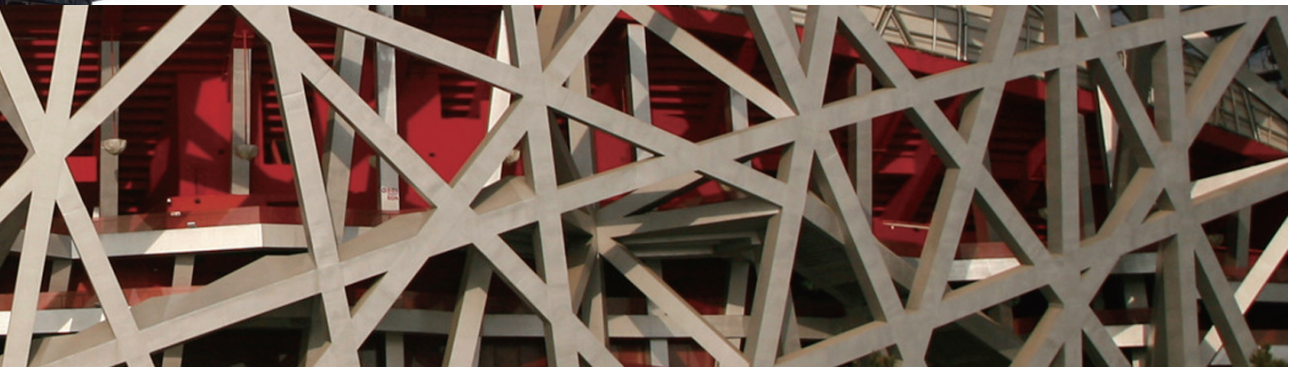

Guo Hu, The Man Who Is Best at Chatting about “Weather”

Guo Hu—person in charge and spokesman of the Beijing Meteorological Administration, team leader for the Beijing Olympic meteorological services.

2:10 pm, July 13, 2001, at the Beijing Millennium Monument, cheers to celebrate the successful bid to host the 2008 Olympics resounded across the heavens.

[New Beijing! The Olympic bid was successful!]

At this moment, at the west side of the Millennium Monument Square, in a meteorological monitoring car modified from a white IVECO, the deputy director of the Municipal Meteorological Observatory, Mr. Guo Hu was beside himself with joy, jumped high, and his head hit the car roof.

[Guo Hu]: I was so excited. The weather that day was a bit mixed with some drops of rain, somewhat like the weather in Athens, when the flame was lit on March 24.

People talk shop all the time. Guo Hu's topic is never away from “weather” when he chats with someone. He was appointed the director of the Beijing Meteorological Observatory not long after Beijing's successful bid for the Olympics. He has a heavier task, and becomes more sensitive to the slight change of the weather. Even his family members get weather mania.

[Guo Hu]: I have got the occupational disease. I am used to standing in my courtyard and detect whether it rains or not even after I go back home. Influenced by me, my son often stands in the courtyard, looking at the sky. He

yells in a while, “Dad, come the clouds!”

In 2004, Guo Hu was appointed as the person in charge and the spokesman of the Beijing Meteorological Administration. His mobile phone needs to be on twenty four hours a day. His name and image have appeared more frequently on the media. Guo Hu suddenly found out that he becomes a celebrity.

[Guo Hu]: Even vegetable-sellers in my neighborhood know that I do weather forecasting. My son is now a college student at the Tsinghua University. His classmate from Harbin called him and told that he saw me forecasting the weather on the television!

Since the start of the countdown before the Olympic Games, Guo Hu has felt a growing pressure day by day. He set a bed in the office to catch the weather changes at any time.

[Guo Hu]: My wife made an absence list for me. She marked a cross on the list when I stayed in office overnight. Sometimes, since the weather forecast is a process, such as Matsa, I had to stay in the office for several days. My wife told me that I spent nearly one-third of a year in the office.

Despite of Guo's hard work day and night, the unexpected typhoon of Matsa in August 2005 played tricks on this senior meteorological expert.

[Guo Hu]: Weather forecast demands experience like doctor making diagnosis for



Cao Dafo, Folk Olympic Envoy

[Cao Dafo]: Beijing 2008 Olympic Games, China Folk Global Promotion Group, traveling from the ninety-sixth to the one hundredth country, kicking off soon, Good Luck China...

Led by Cao Dafo from Beijing, the China Folk Olympic Promotion Group started their journey from the Beijing International Airport on April 11, 2008. In ten days they will realize their dream to reach 100 countries to promote the Beijing 2008 Olympic Games. This dream began on the sleepless night seven years ago, when Beijing successfully won the bid for the 2008 Olympic Games.

[Cao Dafo]: When Mr. Samaranch made the final decision on July 13, I felt like a firecracker, flying high to the sky. I was so excited. I drove my car along the second and the third ring road. I thought at that time I should do something. Go out! Go to 100 countries! The theme of promotion was to invite people all over the world to participate in the Olympic Games.

As the first batch of self-employed people in Beijing after the reform and opening up of China, Cao Dafo doesn't feel traveling expenses are problems for him. In addition, he is not short of enthusiasm. Cao has never stopped his steps after his first stop in Spain. In order to promote the Beijing Olympics, he did his best in every country he landed in. He even tried to break a world record in the Antarctic.

[Cao Dafo]: A notice on the ship calls for

breaking a Guinness World Record. If anyone can keep naked over fifteen minutes on the ice land of the Antarctic, he will break the record. I have a very good appetite, and I am as hard as nails. I told the captain that I would like to have a try. In the beginning I felt a bit cold. Then I started practicing Chinese Kung Fu, and made several forward rolls. Many foreigners applauded and said Chinese OK.

The braveness of Cao Dafo lit the enthusiasm of the people on board. After they knew that he came to promote the Beijing Olympics, people with different skin colors waved the Chinese national flag, jumped high on the ice and had a group photo together with him.

[Cao Dafo]: Once a post office in the United States was about to close when we arrived. Nobody was allowed to go inside anymore. We showed them our flag and explained our purpose to promote the Beijing Olympic Games around the world. Staff of the post office stamped the seal on our group flag solemnly. We then asked to post two postcards. Unexpectedly, they volunteered to pay for the postage to express their support to the Beijing Olympics.

Up to now, help from the overseas Chinese during his journey still warms his heart, every time Cao Dafo recalls it. No matter it was a request for the speech venue or for contact with local



Wang Bing, The National Indoor Stadium Designer Who Prefers to Perform a Supporting Role

Wang Bing – architect of the Beijing Institute of Architectural Design, designer of the National Stadium.

[Wang Bing]: We have the support from the Chinese construction workers as well as the Chinese people. We are certain that construction of the Olympic stadium will fully meet the requirements of the Olympic Games, and even better.

July 13, 2001, the moment Beijing won the bid for the Olympic Games, Wang Bing, an architect of the Beijing Institute of Architectural Design, was doing a live program for the Olympic bid in the studio of Beijing News Broadcast. In front of the reporter, he was excited and proud. This young architect was full of hope for the construction of the Beijing Olympic venues. But what he didn't anticipate was that in the following seven years he should make many efforts to fulfill his promise.

When Beijing was in the process of the Olympic bid, Wang Bing and his colleagues participated in drafting plans for the Olympic venues. After Beijing's successful bid, they soon received new tasks for the Olympic.

[Wang Bing]: In cooperation with the Engineering Department of the Olympic Games Organizing Committee, we conducted research on the need of the Olympic design to form a final outline of the Olympic venues. We completed seventeen items out of over twenty items. For such a thick pile of document, we did seventeen of them.

Just by imagining the thickness of Wang's document, we are aware of how much workload they have undertaken. Planning of the Olympic venues is the foundation of the venue construction. Despite of hard and boring work, everybody understood that good venues are the key to a successful Olympic Games. Wang Bing and his colleagues of the Beijing Institute of Architectural Design worked on the planning for two years.

After successful completion of this task, Wang Bing's long-expecting opportunity finally came. Bids for designing the National Olympic Stadium were opened globally in November 2002. To design the main stadium for the Olympics is a dream for numerous architects. Almost all the world's top designing firms participated in the tender. Wang Bing and his colleagues hoped that Beijing architects would win the bid.

[Wang Bing]: Most of the competitors were unions of several firms, while we were from one single institute. Three months of work day and night. It is actually a very painful process for an architect to put more creative touches on his designs. Sometimes, the Chinese saying "someone would die to make a great coup" may describe that feeling.

Three months later, on behalf of Beijing Institute of Architectural Design, Wang Bing and his team came up with a proposal to compete with other thirteen proposals from home and abroad.



Sang Lan, The Dream still Going On

Sang Lan—former gymnast, currently special correspondent appointed by the official website of the Chinese Olympic Committee.

[Sang Lan]: I was so excited to almost stand up.

On July 13 2001, surrounded by the cheerful crowds at the Millennium Monument, Sang Lan sat in her wheelchair, smiling particularly sweet. At that moment, she forgot her injury and the sad moment of hers three years ago.

[U.S TV Report]: Sang Lan's injury...

A vault accident in the gymnastics competition in the American Goodwill Games on July 21, 1998 changed Sang Lan's whole life. But it did not stop her dream.

[Sang Lan]: My great pity is that I was no longer able to realize the ultimate dream to become a Olympic champion when I was an athlete. But I did not think I was unable to pursue some of my own life goals after I was injured. In fact, I think I was reborn after the injury.

The former president of the International Olympic Committee, Mr. Samaranch encouraged Sang Lan to pass on the spirits of the Olympics, even though she could never stand on the highest podium of the Olympic Games. This becomes Sang Lan's new dream.

[Sang Lan]: Later I became the ambassador for the Olympic bidding. I was involved quite much in the whole process. Because I felt this was a very meaningful thing in my life.

After the successful Olympic bid, Sang Lan decided to return her beloved Olympic Games

in another way. In September 2002, she was admitted by the School of Journalism of Peking University.

[Sang Lan]: If I can participate in the 2008 Olympics as a program host or a reporter, I will feel very honored too. I would like to spread the feeling of happiness brought by the Olympics to every corner and to everyone.

College life for Sang Lan was filled with difficulties beyond ordinary people's imagination, as Sang has lost all consciousness under her chest. Climbing stairs, making notes, going to the toilet, and all the trifles tested her persistence again and again.

[Sang Lan]: There was no electric fans in classrooms, not to mention coolers. I do not perspire. I had difficulty in breathing if without perspiration. I had to hold my urine in the classroom, which caused fever all over me. After long time holding the urine, I had to use a catheter to pass it out afterwards. At that time, I could only pour some water on napkins, and sucked little by the nose. I forgot to take a facial towel with me. Sometimes, honestly speaking, I felt so tired and hard. My eyes turned red too. But after taking a deep breath, I felt it was no big deal. I held on like this. I was eager to make spot coverage very much, so I made great efforts to achieve my goal.

In 2004, the Athens Olympic torch relay arrived in Beijing. Luckily, Sang Lan was selected as a

torchbearer, although she never won any medals in the Olympics for China. She completed the torch relay at the campus of Peking University.

[Sang Lan]: I remember a small episode when the torch was passed to me. The flame almost burned my hair by a sudden wind. The torch handle was very hot and almost burned a blister on my hand. But both my hair catching fire and my hand getting a blister were too minor things compared to the great moment of relaying the torch. As long as I passed on the torch smoothly, for me, my dream already came true.

Sang Lan said that the special relationship between her and the Olympics cannot be separated. Over the past seven years, Sang Lan's figure appeared at the campaign to promote Beijing citizens to learn English to welcome the Olympics, or at the Olympic lecture for the Ji'an Hope School in Jing Gang Shan, or in promotional films for the

Beijing 2008 Paralympic Games. A TV program called Sang Lan 2008 tells about people and events related with the Olympics. Her wheelchair, which has worn to expose the internal tyre, has witnessed Sang Lan's journey and every effort made by her for the Beijing 2008 Olympic Games.

[Sang Lan]: Now the year 2008 is coming closer and closer. I think my ties with sports have never gone away from me. This emotional tie, really, can never be cut apart. I believe that through my efforts this dream continues.

The day when the Beijing Olympic Flame Lighting Ceremony was held in 2008, Sang Lan revealed in her blog that this year she was again selected as the Olympic torchbearer by Lenovo. She has recorded a song, Come on China, for the Chinese Olympic Committee. She said every time she listens to it, she is very excited, just same as she prepared for the run-up before the vault.

Only one hundred and forty centimeters tall, sitting in the wheelchair, Sang Lan looks very tiny. However, with the conversation going on, I gradually sensed a great power hidden in her body. Eighty percent of her entire body has lost consciousness. Additionally, she participated in many charitable activities. It took her five years to obtain a bachelor's degree in journalism from Peking University. She is now the special correspondent for the official website of the Chinese Olympic Committee and the host of the blog department of Chinese Sina website.

Sang Lan told me in the interview that not long ago, she went to Sichuan to see her adopted panda Tongtong. Tongtong was named by Sang Lan herself. It comes after the Beijing Olympic Games slogan - One World, One Dream. (Tong Yi Ge Shi Jie, Tong Yi Ge Meng Xiang in Chinese pronunciation)



Na Heli, Feeling an Affinity with the Olympic Games

Na Heli—a former farmer of Wali township, Chaoyang District of Beijing, currently the manager of Commerce and Trade Branch, Beijing Xin'ao Property Management Co. Ltd.

[Na Heli]: You can say myself and my family have an affinity with the Olympics.

There's no story without coincidence. Wali township of Chaoyang District, where Na Heli, his fellow villagers, and their ancestors lived for centuries, was chosen to be today's national Olympic central areas. What a coincidence it is that on the noon of July 13, 2001, 37-year-old Na Heli was elected as the leader of No. 14 brigade of Wabian village, Wali township. In his words, he began to get involved in politics. On that night, president of the International Olympic Committee, Mr. Samaranch announced that Beijing won the bid to host the 2008 Olympic Games.

[Successful bid for the Olympics]: The 29th Olympic Games... "Beijing" and "Wow"!

[Na Heli]: I cheered up! I didn't think of anything else at that moment. But when I calmed down, I realized that wasn't I elected as the brigade leader! My first term started the countdown too. Haha!

During the countdown of his political life, the biggest thing Na Heli did was to mobilize his fellow villagers to move out of the village for the construction of the Olympic central area.

[Na Heli]: In 2002 after the assessment company and the demolition company entered, and removal and demolition started. I was under a lot of pressure, because after all, nobody had experienced relocation before. "How much will you compensate for me? You

pull down my house!" I didn't know how much he should get. Tell me, how many times of demolition of one's house and relocation can a person experience in his whole life?

It is difficult for anyone to leave permanently his life-long abode. Take Na's family for example, they had lived there for seventeen generations. But as a brigade leader, Na Heli convinced the whole family to move out first.

[Na Heli]: Our removal brought along the whole village. The removal and demolition project started on August 24 and completed before October 1. There was no household who refused to budge. The demolition company claimed that it was their first time to demolish such a big area but with so fast speed.

It was this move of Na Heli and his fellow villagers that opened a prelude to construction of the Olympic projects. Today, those old farmhouses and crops lands have already turned into a vast array of modern constructions. Bird's Nest, the Olympic main venue, is attracting the world's attention. Mr. Na has a new role to play. He is now the manager of Commerce and Trade Branch of Beijing Xin'ao Property Management Co. Ltd, the housekeeper of the Bird's Nest.

[Na Heli]: The Xin'ao Property Management is responsible for management of public area of the central Olympic park where the Bird's Nest and the Water Cube are currently located. My major responsibilities include logistics and
