前言

广泛地阅读英语文学作品,是我们提高运用英语的能力并达到熟练掌握该语言的重要途径,这是毋庸赘言的。文学家都是语言大师,他们运用语言的丰富多彩和驾驭语言的得心应手,都表现在其作品里。我们学习英语与学习母语有很大的差别。学习母语可以听说领先,读写跟上;但是学习英语,听说英语的环境缺乏优势。因此我们学习英语的最好方法只能是通过大量的阅读,也就是在读得懂的前提下,才能听得懂、说得出和写得好。文学作品不但给我们提供了丰富的阅读材料,而且还因为它们的趣味性和新颖感培养了我们良好的阅读习惯。

广泛阅读英语的文学作品可提高英语能力,这仅仅是一方面。大家知道,伟大的文学作品,无不凝聚着作家对真善美的追求和向往,对假恶丑的鞭笞和摈弃。作家在现实生活中所撷取的各种各样的材料,在文学的语境里凭借其丰富性和多样性赋予我们对生活的感悟,它们引发的动态的、活生生的、充满着审美情趣的力量,会在我们阅读的过程中激发我们的生活热情,孕育积极向上的灵魂。文学浓缩着人类生活整个过程中特定的社会和历史,它从与我们生活不同的新的深度和广度来揭示生活。文学紧密地关联着人类要在现实生活中形象地创造自己而努力的目标,它蕴藏着无穷的力量,有待我们在阅读的时候汲取。

And then one morning he received a blackbordered letter³ with the news that his rich uncle, Ralph Nickleby, had fallen by accident and died. This uncle left Godfrey no less than five thousand pounds sterling⁴.

So Godfrey bought a small farm and lived there happily with his wife and two sons until he died. Godfrey had been so careful with his money that when he died, he could leave three thousand pounds to his elder son, Ralph, and one thousand and the farm to his younger son Nicholas.

Ralph believed that riches were the only true source of happiness and power. He also believed it was lawful to take money from others in any way he could, just short of breaking the law⁵. So he built up quite a business for himself in London. He let

When the son was about nineteen and the daughter about fourteen, Nicholas decided it was time to see if he could make some more money. Most of what his father had



left him had been spent on his family and the children's education.

"Speculate1 with it," his wife told him.

Mr. Nickleby said, "But what if we should lose it, then we would have nothing to live off, my dear."

"Fiddlesticks³," said Mrs. Nickleby. "Young Nicholas is old enough to do something for himself, but he needs money to get started. And Kate, poor girl, think of her without a penny in the world! Think of your brother! Would Ralph be as rich as he is today if he had never speculated?"

When this happened, Mr. Nickleby started babbling⁷ wildly. And one day, he called his family around him, hugged⁸ his wife and children, then fell asleep and never woke up again.
