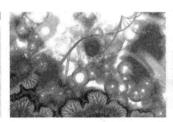
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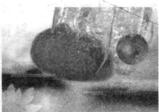

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前言

医学英语是以临床医学、护理和相关医学技术专业的实际应用为中心的必修课程。以全国医学高职高专课程标准为编写大纲,以全国医护英语水平考试为导向,结合美国同类课程原版教材,将国内外临床医学和护理专业的工作模式与英语语言教学有机结合,我们编写了本版教材,供临床医学、护理、助产、药学、医学检验技术、影像技术、口腔医学技术等专业使用。

Role of Registered Nurses Passage A

Pre-reading Questions

A registered nurse (RN) is a nurse who has graduated from a nursing program at a college or university and has passed a national licensing exam. Registered nurses help individuals, families, and groups to achieve health and prevent disease.

Regardless of specialty or work setting, RNs perform basic duties that include treating patients, educating patients and the public about various medical conditions, and providing advice and emotional support to patients' family members. RNs record patients' medical histories and symptoms to help to perform diagnostic tests and analyze results, operate medical machinery, administer treatment and medications, and help with patient follow-up and rehabilitation.

RNs teach patients and their families how to manage their illness or injury, including post-treatment home care needs, diet and exercise programs, and self-administration of medication and physical therapy. Some RNs are also trained to provide grief counseling to family members of critically ill patients. RNs work to promote general health by educating the public on various warning signs and symptoms of diseases and where to go for help. Registered nurses also might run general health screening or immunization clinics, blood drives, and public seminars on various conditions.

When caring for patients, RNs establish a plan of care or contribute to an existing plan. Plans may include numerous activities, such as administering medication, including careful checking of dosages and avoiding interactions; starting, maintaining, and discontinuing intravenous(IV) lines for fluid, medication, blood, and blood products; administering therapies and treatments; observing the patient and recording those observations; and consulting with physicians and other health care clinicians.

Some RNs provide direction to licensed practical nurses (LPN) and nursing aides regarding patient care. RNs with advanced educational preparation and training may perform diagnostic and therapeutic procedures and may have prescriptive authority.

Most RNs work as staff nurses, providing critical health care services along with physicians, surgeons and other health care practitioners. However, some RNs choose to become advanced practice nurses, who are often considered primary health care practitioners and work independently or in collaboration with physicians. For example clinical nurse specialists provide direct patient care and expert consultations in one of many of the nursing specialties listed above. Nurse midwives provide primary care to women, including gynecological exams, family planning advice, prenatal care, assistance in labor and delivery, and neonatal care. Nurse practitioners provide basic preventive health care to patients, and increasingly serve as primary and specialty care providers in mainly medically underserved areas. The most common areas of specialty for nurse practitioners are family practice, adult practice, women's health, pediatrics, acute care, and gerontology; however, there are many other specialties. In most states, advanced practice nurses can prescribe medications.

Some nurses have jobs that require little or no direct patient contact, but still require an active RN license. For example, infection control nurses identify, track, and control infectious outbreaks in health care facilities; develop methods of outbreak prevention and biological terrorism responses; and staff immunization clinics. Legal nurse consultants assist lawyers in medical cases by interviewing patients and witnesses, organizing medical records, determining damages and costs, locating evidence, and educating lawyers about medical issues. Nurse administrators supervise nursing staff, establish work schedules and budgets, and maintain medical supply inventories. RNs also may work as health care consultants, public policy advisers, pharmaceutical and medical supply researchers and salespersons, and medical writers and editors.

American Nurses Association

The American Nurses Association (ANA) is a professional organization to advance and protect the profession of nursing. It started in 1896 as the Nurses Associated Alumnae and was renamed the American Nurses Association in 1911. It is based in Silver Spring, Maryland. The ANA states nursing is the protection, promotion, and optimization of health and abilities, prevention of illness and injury, alleviation of suffering through the diagnosis and treatment of human response, and advocacy in the care of individuals, families, communities, and populations. The Association is a professional organization representing registered nurses (RNs) in the United States through its 54 constituent member associations. The ANA is involved in establishing standards of nursing practice, promoting the rights of nurses in the workplace, advancing the economic and general welfare of nurses.

Passage B Critical Thinking in Nursing

Critical thinking is reasonable, reflective thinking that is focused on deciding what to believe or do. It is the rational examination of ideas, inferences, assumptions, principles, arguments, conclusions, issues, statements, beliefs and actions. The National League of Nursing anticipated the need to move from the nursing process to critical thinking in 1983 when it emphasized that nursing graduates should be able to think critically. It also included critical thinking as a criterion for baccalaureate program accreditation. Due to current nursing



shortages, cost containment and high expectations for quality nursing care, there is an urgent need for nurses to recognize and act upon organizational and system problems.

Critical thinking is essential for nurses working in preoperative care. It is a vital part of nursing care. The nurse's scope of practice has expanded the demand for critical thinking, the ability to solve problems, and increased ability to make sound judgments. Some things included in critical thinking for workplaces include: identifying and solving patient care problems; putting into operation surgery departments' missions; directing and contributing to strategic planning; creating an atmosphere that allows staff to make sound decisions by following their gut feelings.

Ambulatory surgery care occurs in a decreased time frame, which means nurses must be able to perform tasks quickly and efficiently to ensure a positive patient outcome. Some skills required include ability to gather information from patients and family, make accurate judgments, and use critical thinking skills. Nurses should consider patients to be a whole and find the best way to meet the goal of the care being provided, which can ensure the most positive outcomes for patients.

There are many opportunities to demonstrate critical thinking in a SDS/PACU unit. For example, when a patient is pre-admitted there are certain procedures and tests that must be performed on the patient. All females of childbearing age require a pregnancy test 72 hours before the scheduled surgery date. By performing this simple test a woman who may be pregnant and not know may have the surgery cancelled by the surgeon so that the fetus does not receive medication that could potentially harm the fetus.

In the PACU, nurses monitor patients using a 3 lead heart rhythm, monitor blood pressure, pulse, heart rate and oxygen level every 5 minutes. If a person's pulse suddenly becomes elevated and their blood pressure drops, nurses should know that this may be a sign of bleeding which can lead to shock. Therefore the patient may need to return to the operating room to stop the bleeding or it could mean that the patient needs an increase of fluids. Nurses should notify the physician in a timely manner so that this life-threatening doesn't become fatal. These examples illustrate critical thinking a nurse may use to identify potential problems and decide appropriate actions.

Critical thinking can be best described as that higher order of reasoning used in reaching professional informed judgments in high stakes, time restrained and novel-problem situation. Since nurses are accountable on a daily basis for the quality of care provided to the patients, nurses must interpret data, explore possible avenues for the solution, propose alterative solutions to a problem, and then make a clear concise decision that is best for the patient. Poor thinking can be fatal to our patients therefore, it is important for nurses to become skilled in a higher level of thinking and reasoning abilities in order to practice sound clinical judgment.

There were about 2,737,000 nurses employed in the US in 2010. About half of them
worked in hospitals. Some had jobs in doctor's offices and nursing care facilities or were
employed by home health care services, schools and correctional facilities. Registered nurses in
hospitals and nursing care facilities work around the clock, usually on rotating shifts. Their
schedules include weekends, evenings and holidays.
Nursing involves some risks including exposure to communicable diseases and dangerous
drugs, and injuries related to lifting and moving patients. However, there are procedures that
help mitigate these risks.

To work as a registered nurse one must earn a bachelor of science degree in nursing
(BSN), an associate degree in nursing (ADN) or a diploma in nursing. BSN programs are
offered by colleges and universities and generally take four years to complete. ADN programs,
offered by community and junior colleges, take two to three years to complete. Diploma
programs, usually three years long, are administered by hospitals. They are relatively rare
compared to BSN and ADN programs.

A nurse often begins his or her career as a hospital staff nurse. With experience he or she
may be promoted to assistant unit manager or head nurse. Some nurses eventually move into
more advanced managerial positions, but a graduate degree may be needed.

The US Bureau of Labor Statistics predicts job growth for registered nurses will be faster

than the average for all occupations through 2020. There will be more job openings in this career field than there will be in almost any other.
