# 高级英语视听说教程

New Vision Advanced English Viewing Listening and Speaking



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《高等学校英语专业英语教学大纲》对英语专业高年级学生开设的视听说课程进行了如下描述: 视听说课的目的在于提高学生对语言真实度较高的各类视听材料的理解能力和口头表达能力。通过"视"、"听"、"说"的结合,以直观画面和情节内容为基础开展有针对性的口语训练,运用复述、总结、对话、口头概述、即席演讲等活动形式,提高学生的听力理解和口头表达能力,加深他们对英语国家的政治、经济、社会、文化等方面的认识和了解。并提出利用广播、录音、投影、电影、电视、录像、计算机、多媒体和网络技术等对外语专业的教学进行改革。可以说,利用网络资源优化英语听说教学是信息化、数字化、网络化时代的发展趋势。

本教材正是为了适应时代的发展和英语教学的需要而编写的。编者努力吸收情景教学、个性化教学、交际教学等现代化教学理念的精髓,以听说带动读写,精讲多练为编写指导思想。 在视听说的基础上,促进学生的听、说、读、写四项基本技能的全面提高。

本教材中所采用的视频材料大部分源自英美国家几个著名的广播电视网,如: CBS (the Columbia Broadcasting System)、CNN (the Cable News Networks)、NBC (the National Broadcasting Corporation)、VOA (Voice of America)等。所选择的材料覆盖范围广,涉及的话题丰富多样,并具有一定的深度。这些网络视频时效性强,口语特点鲜明,不仅能够帮助学生提高英语听说水平,还有助于提高他们的鉴赏、批评能力、思维能力和创新能力的培养。

本系列教材共分两册,此为第二册。本册在延续第一册的编写思路和风格的基础上,在难度和话题上有所深入。全书共包括 10 个单元,每个单元包含三个视频,其内容反映了最新的社会现象,如丰田召回门事件、美国食品安全法案、奥巴马夫人时尚热、霍金关于外星人的最新猜测等等。视频的长度平均为 3 分钟,可以给课堂教学留出足够的讲解和讨论时间。

每个单元主要由五大模块构成: Topic Preview、Viewing, Listening & Speaking、More about the Topic、Expanding the Topic和 In your Own Words组成。基本编写原则是将听、说、读、写四项技能相结合,以听说为主。听之前用讨论的方式引入话题,之后再用听力和阅读中所学的内容以及词汇丰富说的任务。

Topic Preview: 此部分为 Lead-in, 位于每个单元之首。由一些学生熟悉的电影、故事或者图片引入单元主题。并引导学生就话题进行小组讨论。

Viewing, Listening & Speaking: 为本教材的主体部分。内容选自美国广播节目实录的原声听力,提供地道的媒体语言、生动用语以及最新的社会热点问题的表达和评述技巧。练习部分采用开放性问答、缺词填空、图表填写等多种形式,同时考查主旨大意和一些重要的细节。另外,通过练习引导学生注意视频中出现的一些非常生动真实的用语,并根据上下文猜测词义。最后,根据所听的内容,展开讨论。

More about the Topic: 此部分为第二部分的延伸。选取两段与前一话题类似或者相关的视频进行补充学习。目的是扩展本单元的主题,丰富讨论以及写作的内容,增加学生接触不同真实材料的机会。此部分内容可采取学生课外自学、上课老师点评的方式开展。

Expanding the Topic: 该部分为扩展练习。将听说练习与阅读结合在一起。通过选取与单元主题相关的短文加深学生对该话题的理解,扩展他们的知识面,有助于丰富他们口语练习的内容。在每篇短文之后,设计不同类型的口语练习,提供充分的口语练习机会。

In your Own Words: 为每个单元的最后部分。要求学生利用在本单元学到的词汇和表达,进行口语练习(Speaking)或主题写作(Writing)。

本教材侧重于对英语原声广播节目的理解以及口语表达的训练。因此适用于高等学校英语专业高年级学生使用,同时也可供研究生以及社会上具有中高级英语水平的自学者使用。

本教材由浙江工商大学长期从事英语专业听力教学一线的教师编写,并得到了浙江工商大学外国语学院省级重点专业(英语)建设经费的资助。编者谨向一切关心和帮助过本教材编写的同事和朋友们致以衷心的谢意,并感谢大连理工大学出版社在整套教材的编写、版式设计等方面所提出的宝贵意见和所做的大量工作。





#### Passage 1: Real First Thanksgiving Wasn't So Cozy

On Thursday, we Americans will mark our annual Thanksgiving holiday. It often revolves around a lavish dinner for family and friends that begins with a prayer of thanks for our blessings. The Thanksgiving tradition is modeled after harvest-home feasts —— especially what's been called the First Thanksgiving in colonial Massachusetts.

It's the pleasant story of a cold, late-fall day in 1621, when about 50 pious English settlers called Pilgrims, who had barely survived their first winter in the New World, shared a feast with neighboring Wampanoag Indians.

But according to curators at Plimoth Plantation – a living-history museum in the same settlement where the Pilgrims and Indians marked that harvest almost 400 years ago – the Thanksgiving story is more fable than fact.
