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## 编 辑 说 明

《主导英语》(Mainline: Students' Book)系英国著名语言学家L.G. Alexander所编《新概念英语》(New Concept English)系列教材的重要组成部分,全套六册,语言程度上循序渐进,体系严密,与同类教材相比,具有更多的优点,目前已为非英语国家广泛采用。课文汇集当今世界文学、艺术、科学和社会习俗等各方面的内容,采用新颖视听方法,创造模拟英语环境,培养学生实际会话、阅读和写作能力,是一套能在短期内突破听、说、读、写几关的理想教材。为了帮助国内各有关方面的同志学好英语,我们编译了这套英汉对照本,供教学和参考用。本教材既可作为大专院校英语教材,也适用于各种进修班、培训班和广大自学者。

本教材第一册(Beginners A)和第二册(Beginners B)的课文主要用于训练听觉能力和口语,为考虑教学效果起见,不译成汉文,仅将课本最后一部分阅读材料译出,供学生参考。第三册(Progress A)、第四册(Progress B)、第五册(Skills A)和第六册(Skills B)对原版书中的课文同步配置了译文,并对语言难点作了注释。
