进一步了解西方文化, 从而为将来的学习奠定良好的基础。

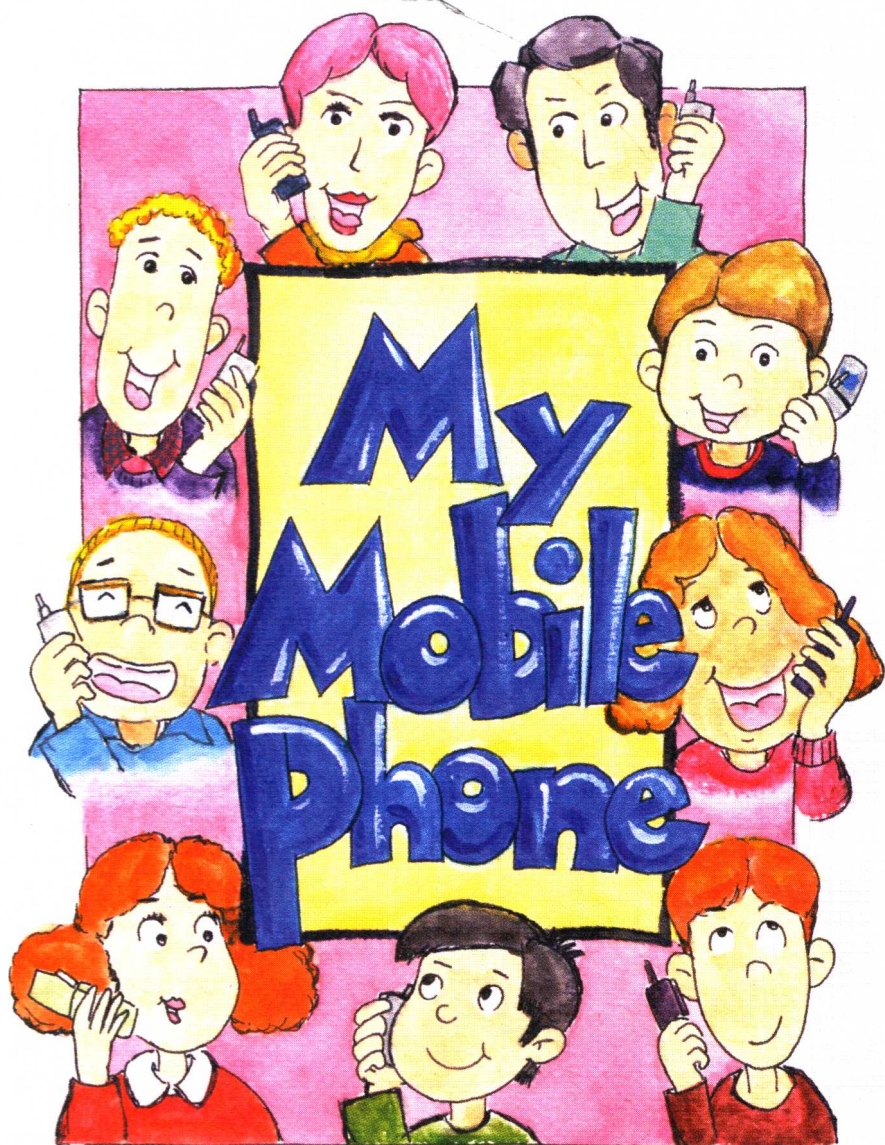

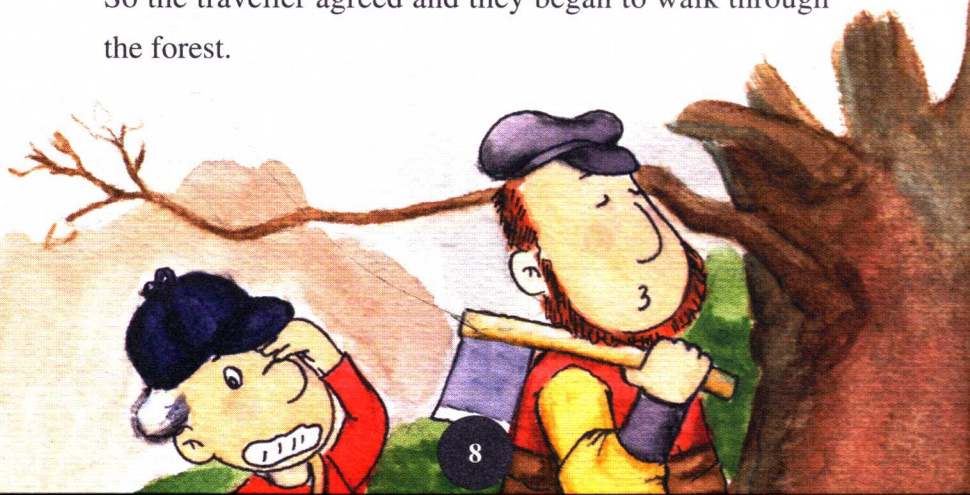


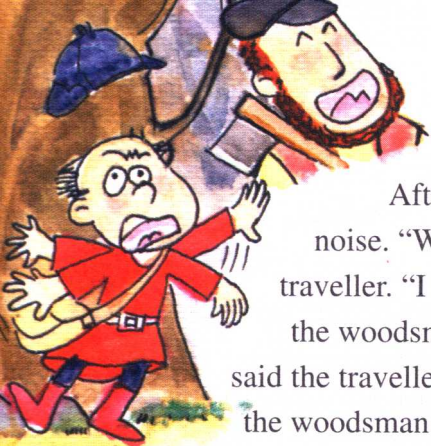
The Bear, the Woodsman and the Traveller

Later on they heard a noise again. This time it was a roar and it was very close.

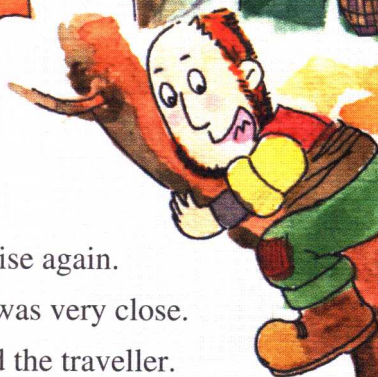
"Look. I can see a bear," said the traveller.
