出版前言

Lizzie worked in the farmer's house.










The Underground Railway

Gran had given her a lot to think about.




The next morning after breakfast, Gran laid Lizzie's quilt on the kitchen table.


"The first square in the top left hand corner is a Nine Patch, which means fields," she explained.

"Fields, trail, pine tree, water."


The message was too hard to read.
