# 前言

《环球英语》适用于将英语作为第二语言或外语的学生使用,可分为4个级别。它以学生为核心,以完成任务的方式练习使用英语,不仅可以激发学生的学习兴趣,同时还可以创造一个积极交流的课堂气氛。



The 2,000-year-old Dragon Boat (Tuan Ng) Festival commemorates the death in the third century B.C. of Chinese national hero Qu Yuan.
