

What's a hyper phone? It's a mobile phone that lets you talk to aliens.


Miles read this feature article about UFOs – Unidentified Flying Objects – and he was sure that UFOs are spaceships from another planet.


Anyway, he decided to talk to the aliens in the UFOs.


"That could take ages," I said.

"My mum," said Miles, heading for the door. "I'd better calm her down."




The Future


As Miles left the room, the voice on the phone asked, "You say you're from Australia?"
