  - 2. 字彙:每課平均約三十五字,加詞類變化之衍生字,全 書八册共約三千二百字。附有 K. K. 制注音,並註中 文釋義。
  - 3. 習語:解釋肯要,並附例句,務求正確應用。
  - 詞類:慎選重要字彙,詳列衍生字形,並附用法例句, 期能運用自如。
  - 5. 練習:將課中所學,融入字彙,填充、詞類、翻譯等項 練習中,經口講筆寫,必能得心應手。
  - 6. 對話:引伸課文內容,淺易應對,語法生動自然,卽學 卽用。

7. 句型:精編各類句型,化繁爲簡,深入淺出,經口講筆 寫,必可熟能生巧。

## NOBODY IS ANYBODY'S FOOL Honesty Is the Best Policy—

You can fool some of the people some of the time and all of the people some of the time, but you cannot fool all of the people all of the time.



Lying, under one guise or another, is pervading¹ all classes of society. A ready lie means an

easy way out. This is a dangerous situation<sup>2</sup> that shows signs of moral<sup>3-1</sup> bankruptcy<sup>4</sup>.

A man of integrity<sup>5</sup> thinks of right and wrong only, but a man of evil nature thinks of gains and losses. He will be honest only if honesty pays, and will be dishonest if he thinks dishonesty pays him better.

Only men of upright<sup>6</sup> character<sup>7-1</sup> have moral courage. To be truthful is to be manly<sup>8</sup>. Lying is cowardice<sup>9</sup>. To pretend to be something which 10 we are not is the root of all immorality<sup>3-3</sup>. A man of sterling<sup>10</sup> character has the guts to speak his mind and lay his heart bare and open.

Do not pretend, even if your honesty may cause you harm, loss, or suffering, simply because it is right to be honest and wrong to be dishonest. Flattery<sup>11</sup> is intrigue. <sup>12</sup> Falsehood<sup>13</sup> is wickedness<sup>14</sup>. An excuse is worse than a lie, for an excuse is a lie guarded. "They say so" is half a lie. Say what you mean and mean what you say. Speech is a mirror<sup>15</sup> of the soul. What you say is what you are. Be frank and candid with people. Do not promise if you cannot keep your promise.

A braggart<sup>16-1</sup> is a liar. He brags<sup>16-2</sup> of 25

something he is not. A truthful man, on the contrary, never boasts of himself.

The rule of law, the morality<sup>3-2</sup> of society and the honor of man all forbid fraud, <sup>17</sup> cunning<sup>18</sup>, deception<sup>19</sup>, and trickery<sup>20-1</sup>.

Some people are very treacherous<sup>21</sup>. Their sugar-coated speech is no other than snares<sup>22</sup> or traps<sup>23</sup>. The hook is hidden in the bait. Be careful not to be betrayed<sup>24</sup> with a kiss.

An honest face is the best letter of recommendation. You are what you look, a man's face is indeed an index<sup>25</sup> of his character. We can tell what sort of man he is by the expression of his countenance<sup>26</sup>. Unless you are a crafty<sup>27</sup> fox, good at hiding intentions, any fool can see into your inner soul through your outer expression. To give people a favorable impression, to win people's vote<sup>29</sup> of confidence, you must mold<sup>30</sup> an honest character and form a natural appearance. An honest image is based on an honest heart. They are two in one. A kind heart is the highest letter of credit. It is we ourselves who make our faces, and make them gradually and unconsciously to express our inner character. When our character

is formed, it slowly writes its characteristic<sup>7-2</sup> marks on the face.

But it takes a trained<sup>31</sup>, careful and experienced observer to read some faces, for some foxy people can make their faces like masks<sup>32</sup> to hide their real selves. A fair face may hide a foul heart.

A dishonest man can never be peaceful in conscience. He is guilty<sup>33</sup> deep in heart. Real happiness consists in clear conscience. The severest 10 punishment is the prick of conscience. Only by being honest can one enjoy peace of mind.

From a historical point of view, it does not pay at all in the end to cheat by dishonesty. The success of a cheat<sup>34</sup> or an impostor<sup>35</sup> is literally<sup>36</sup> not a success, but will in the long run prove a seed of his self-destruction. Dishonesty may bring you temporary<sup>37</sup> advantages, but your dirty trick<sup>20–2</sup> is sure to be found out in time, and as a result, your credit will fall to pieces. Well-dressed as a liar is, he is to be undressed. When you are found false, you will find there is no footing<sup>38</sup> for you, vast as the world is, By that time, what will it profit<sup>39</sup> you if you gain the whole

world and lose your own soul?

Thus, from the spiritual point of view, honesty is in the end the best policy.

Be yourself and be honest.
