本书特色

- 五、答案及解析详细 本书的答案解析非常详细,首先对文章进行简单的概括性说明,然后详细分析每一题的考点、解题思路并结合具体题目渗透解题技巧,突出对阅读技能的训练和解题思路的点拨,便于学生自学自测使用。

Passage 2

There is an English saying that goes, "he who laughs last, laughs the hardest." High School Musical star and teen heartthrob (让人心动的男人) Zac Efron is laughing a lot these days.

As a young boy, Efron was picked on in school because he was always the smallest in his class and teased (取笑) because he had a big space between his teeth. In sixth grade, Efron's basketball team made it to the league championships. In double overtime (两个加时赛), with three seconds left, he rebounded the ball and passed it—to the wrong team! They scored and his team lost the game.

But history, as they say, is a thing of the past. Now at 21, Efron is one of People magazine's 100 Most Beautiful People, graces (荣登) the cover of Entertainment Weekly, Hollywood's most influential magazine, and is traveling the world promoting the third High School Musical film, Director Adam Shankman described Efron as "arguably the

biggest teen star in America right now." Simply google "Zac Efron" and you get more than 14 million responses. Yes, it seems Efron has a lot to smile about these days.

Efron was born and raised in California. He took school seriously. According to Efron, "he would flip out (发疯) if he got a B and not an A in school, and that he was a class clown." It was his father who encouraged him to act. He took part in school performances and with a local theater group. He also took singing lessons. He graduated high school in 2006 and was accepted at the University of Southern California to study film. But he deferred (延期) —why study movies when you can star in them.

Now he has signed on to star in the romantic comedy Seventeen Again and to play in the remake of the hugely popular movie, *Footloose*. Efron is also earning more than \$3 million for his role in High School Musical 3. Not bad for a 21-year-old. But Efron still remembers those bullies (欺人者).

"You always have to remember that bullies want to bring you down because you have something that they admire," Efron said. "Also, when you get made fun of, when people point out your weaknesses, it's an opportunity for you to rise above."

Efron has risen all the way to the top of the movie business. And he can now laugh all the way to the bank.

Passage 3

Lemons taste sour. Sugar tastes sweet. Salt tastes salty. Taste buds (味蕾) on the surface of your tongue help you tell foods apart that you've put into your mouth. Until recently, scientists believed there were only a few tastes: salty, sweet, sour, bitter and umami ("delicious" in Japanese) —a meaty taste in some types of cheese and mushrooms. That idea may be changing.

At the Nestle Research Center in Switzerland, scientists think that there are more tastes than the ones we already know about. To test their idea, they have been studying the taste of metal.

There are proteins (蛋白质) in taste buds. Some proteins sense sourness and others sweetness. In order to study the taste of metal, the scientists needed to discover what proteins in taste buds can sense metal.

They fed mice water containing different concentrations of metal salts. Mice preferred water with low concentrations of iron and zinc (锌) over distilled water (蒸馏水), but avoided water with high concentrations of metals. The mice hated copper (铜) or magnesium sulfate (硫酸镁) at any concentration.



The team found that mice without either the TRPM5 protein, which is involved in sensing sweet, umami and bitter tastes, or the T1R3 protein, another protein involved in sensing sweet and umami, avoided iron and zinc even at low concentrations. However, they lost some of their dislike of magnesium and copper. Another protein, called TRPV1, is involved in the pain response to spicy (辛辣的) foods. Mice without the protein overcame some dislike of copper salts and high concentrations of iron.

Those results show that the three proteins are connected to the taste of metal. However, there are other proteins involved, because none of the mice completely lost their dislike for magnesium and copper or high concentrations of iron and zinc. Scientists don't yet know all of the proteins.

Maybe it's scientists' business to study tastes, but it's your business to take care of them. As you get older, you tend to lose taste buds and your sense of taste is weakened. And taste buds can be damaged by extreme heat or cold, a dry mouth, smoking, spicy foods, extremely sour foods, and so on. But damaged taste buds can heal, so your sense of taste is not lost. If you have problems with your taste buds, see a doctor.

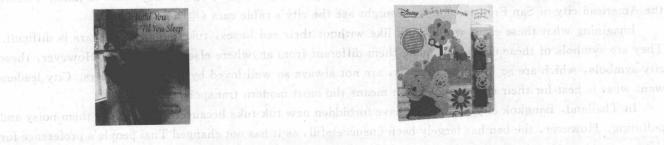

Passage 1 Passage and inmediate success and entired her enough William Henry Bragg was born at Westward, Cumberland, on July 2, 1862. He was educated at Market Harboroagh Grammar School and afterwards at King William's College, Isle of Man (马恩岛). Elected a minor scholar of Trinity College, Cambridge, in 1881, he studied mathematics under the well-known teacher, Dr E. J. Routh. He studied physics in the Cavendish Laboratory during a part of 1885, and at the end of that year was elected to the Professorship of Mathematics and Physics in the University of Adelaide, South Atter her death in 1968 an oppurgation was set up in her name to combat blindness in the accoloning salidara.

His research interests dealt with a great many fields and he was skilled at picking up a subject, almost casually (随便地), making an important contribution, and then dropping it again. However, the work of Bragg and his son Lawrence in 1913-1914 founded a new branch of science of the greatest importance and significance, the analysis of the crystal (水晶) structure by means of X-rays. It is true that the use of X-rays as an instrument for the systematic revelation (展现) of the way in which crystals are built was entirely due to the Braggs. This was recognized by the award of the Nobel Prize jointly to father and son in 1915.

He was an honorary Doctor of some sixteen universities, and a member of the leading foreign societies. Many other medals and awards were given to him among which may be mentioned the Rumford Medal in 1916 and the Copley Medal (its premier award) in 1930.

He was the author of many books, including Studies in Radioactivity, X-Rays and Crystal Structure, The World of Sound, Concerning the Nature of Things, Old Trades and New Knowledge, An Introduction to Crystal Analysis, and The Universe of Light. His favorite hobby was golf. After a life of astonishing productiveness, Sir William Bragg died on March 10, 1942.

As a young ice skater, I had flown pretty high, pretty quickly. My partner and I won the Canadian junior pairs championship when I was 14. Later I was thrilled to be picked to skate in the 1994 Olympics in Lillehammer, Norway. But then everything came down.
