前言

《高职、高专、成教英语应用能力考试翻译考点与样题训练》是以《全国高职高专教育英语课程教学基本要求》为依据,针对现行全国高职高专英语应用能力考试而编写的一本实用性较强的考前系列读物之一。该书适用于《全国高职高专教育英语课程教学基本要求》规定内容的高等职业学校、高等专科学校、本科二级技术学院和成人高等学院的学生。同时,可供有关院校常规教学和考前使用。本书特点如下:
