前言

With its welcoming people and its gorgeous countryside, sunny Northern Florida is the

Item 2 Bermuda

Bermuda—the name conjures up images of crystal-clear waters and blazing sunshine. Pastel
coloured houses and boats are(1) of the 150 islands, some of which are little more
than a rock.
Miles and miles of pink sandy beaches and hundreds of secluded bays are(2)
along the coast. The beaches are never crowded, even during(3).
This, the most northerly reef in the world, has(4) any water sports fan could
desire. An exciting underwater world(5) the visitor; they don't even have to get wet!
Golf is probably the most popular sport on the island archipelago, followed closely by
everyone's(6): hanging out at the hotel pool or on the beach.
There are only two seasons here in Bermuda, spring and summer. The seven main islands are
linked by an excellent(7) of public buses and ferries. The British crown colony with
its small capital, Hamilton, lies about(8) kilometres north of the Caribbean, in the
middle of the Atlantic Ocean.
Inhabitants of the British Dependent Territories are often said to be more British than
(9)! Every year, the Peppercorn Ceremony commemorates the day in 1816 when the
government moved to Hamilton.
Bagpipes and military orchestras, however, can(10) throughout the year. Parades
are simply a part of(11). A single peppercorn is still paid to the mayor of St. George
each year. For this was the price of a meeting with the governor of the islands, in the old days.
Everybody else on the islands(12) to get into the water. Subtropical Bermuda is
said to have(13) beaches in the world. The island archipelago certainly has beautiful
clean coasts and turquoise water. Tiny particles of red coral give the sand its(14) pink
hue. The most beautiful beaches are in the south of the island and are also(15). The
Gulf Stream brings warm water to the islands(16).
Back on dry land, the scooter is the perfect vehicle. They are(17) on every street
corner and anybody over the age of 16 can hire one. No special licence is required. The
Bermudians drive on the left, like their English forefathers. The speed limit of 35 kilometres per
hour is rigorously enforced. There are no hire cars on Bermuda, in fact each household is only
allowed one car.
Those who don't want to potter around on a scooter can always take a taxi. The drivers are
often(18) tour guides and know all the best places to visit. Sometimes, they may even
get a restaurant reservation for you—especially at Dennis'.
It is a great place to 'people watch' too.
Men in shorts, with a jacket and a tie are a(19). A local etiquette guide states
explicitly that a gentleman is appropriately dressed in Bermuda shorts even for formal occasions.
Bermuda is a tax haven. Only property tax is assessed by the state each year. Why annoy the
citizens with taxes when(20) of all public revenue is generated by tourism. It is no
surprise then, that the per-capita income in Bermuda is one of the highest in the world.
Bermuda is the site of the world's northernmost reef. The amazing colours and the variety of

marine life never ceases to amaze visitors. If you want to see more of this fascinating underwater world, rent a boat with skipper who knows his way around the reefs or take a trip on one of the many glass-bottom boats.

Part C Interview: Hollywoodizaion of Military Report

Introduction: Dan Rather is anchor and managing editor of the CBS Evening News. Since 1962, when Dan Rather first joined CBS News, he has handled some of the most challenging assignments in journalism. His day-to-day commitment to substantive, fair and accurate news reporting and his tough, active style have earned him a position of respect among his peers and the public.

Madeline Holt (BBC Culture Correspondent): (...more access to) news teams than to people

making reality TV or feature films, but he also told us that there was an obvious advantage in cooperating with entertainment producers because they were less likely to run off to Baghdad to film the flip side, the other side of the story. Is there at the heart of this an official neurosis about telling the public too much, for fear of losing that support for the so-called "War on Terror," and for the government itself?

Dan Rather (CBS Newscaster): Well, what's going on, to a very large extent, I'm sorry to say, is a belief that the public doesn't need to know. Limiting access, limiting information, to cover the backsides of those who are in charge of the war, is extremely dangerous and cannot and should not be accepted. And I'm sorry to say that up to and including the moment of this interview, that overwhelmingly it has been accepted by the American people and the current administration revels in that, they relish that, and they take refuge in that.

Holt: Rather believes that it's not just the administration that's trying to second-guess what kind of information the public can take. He told us that journalists are pulling their punches for fear of being seen by the public as unpatriotic. Astonishingly, he includes himself.

Rather: It starts with a feeling of patriotism within oneself. It carries through with the knowledge, the real and certain knowledge that the country as a whole, and for all the right reasons, felt and continues to feel this surge of patriotism within themselves. And one finds oneself saying, "I know the right question, but you what? This is not the right time to ask it."

Holt: Rather deplores this self-censorship, but he reserves his strongest words for the US government and, in his view, their manipulation of the public according to who gets access and information and who doesn't.

Rather: The belief runs so strong in both the political and military leadership of the current war effort that those who control the images will control public opinion. They realize what an entertainment-oriented society ours has become. Therefore, in one way of looking at it, it is quite natural that they would say to themselves, "Hey, we've had the hollywoodization of the news, we've had the hollywoodization of almost everything else in society, why not the hollywoodization of the war?" And I want to say quietly, but as forcefully as I can, that I hope this doesn't go any further. It's gone too far, already. I am appalled by it. I do think it's an outrage, this is a personal opinion.

characters. It features three women (Monica, Rachel and Pheobe) and three men (Ross, Chandler and Joey) that live in the same apartment building named Central Perk. Monica and Ross are brother and sister. Monica and Phoebe are ex-roommates and Monica now has the current roommate Rachel. So are Chandler and Joey. Later, Monica is married with Chandler and Rachel has to live with the playboy Joey. Ross has been dating Rachel, but this might not be a permanent arrangement. Then Rachel is pregnant by Ross. The following is excerpts from the episode *Rachel Wants to Move Out*. Joey is just so loveable with his innocent speech. It's so cool that it makes everybody roll around with laughter!

About the Cast

It could be said of actress **Jennifer Aniston** (Born in 1969, LA) that she is the girl who broke a million hearts, just because she married Brad Pitt in July 2000.

The show that had made the striking actress famous was, of course, *Friends*. Jennifer had been cast in 1994 as Central Perk cafe waitress Rachel Green, alongside Matt LeBlanc, Courtney Cox, Lisa Kudrow, David Schwimmer and Matthew Perry. Her layered hairstyle earned her the sobriquet of "America's First Hairdo" by *Rolling Stone* magazine.

The global success of the program ensured the six stars were among the highest-paid TV actors after they agreed individual salaries of \$750,000 per show in 2000. But a fat paycheck is not the be-all and end-all in Hollywood, and what Jennifer really wanted was silver screen success. Her first foray into movies was the schlock-horror movie *Leprechaun* in 1993, but it didn't exactly propel her into superstardom.

The Friends phenomenon had studio executives in a frenzy, however, and she was offered many roles. Several of these were romantic comedies such as She's the One and The Object of My Affection, which mirrored her work in Friends where she had a long onscreen love affair with David Schwimmer's Ross. But none made much of an impact. Undaunted, Jen went on to make 2001's Rock Star, in which she plays rock groupie opposite Boogie Nights star Mark Wahlberg, and The Good Girl in 2002.
