1ST SISTER. Go and do what I say at once.





CINDERELLA. I'm going but I'm not your servant.

(Cinderella goes out. The 2nd Sister comes in.)

1ST SISTER. Sister, come here.

2ND SISTER. What is it?

1ST SISTER. Cinderella again. She keeps telling me that she's not a servant.

2ND SISTER. Why don't you talk to Mother? She'll make Cinderella do just what we tell her. 1ST SISTER. I know a better way. I'll get

Mother to tell Cinderella's father. Cinderella will do anything for him.

The Next Day

FATHER. I'm going to the town to sell some wood. Is there anything that I can bring back for you?

1ST SISTER. I must have a new *dress. I haven't had a new dress for weeks.

2ND SISTER. Bring me a dress too. Do bring me a pretty one.



FATHER. And what do you want, Cinderella?

CINDERELLA. Only some flowers, Father.

FATHER. I'll bring each of you what she asked for.

FATHER. Here are your dresses, girls. And Cinderella, here are your flowers.

CINDERELLA. What beautiful flowers!

Thank you, Father.

1ST SISTER. Look at my new dress, Mother. Isn't it pretty?

2ND SISTER. Mine too, Mother. Don't you wish you had a new dress, Cinderella?

MOTHER. Cinderella doesn't need any new dresses. Her old dresses are all right for a girl who isn't pretty.

FATHER. I forgot to tell you what I heard in town. The King is coming back to his *palace soon. He's bringing the *Prince with him. Everyone is saving.

*dance to which women from all the country will be asked. I talked with some of the great men in town. I know

that you will be asked.

MOTHER. The Prince will see my daughters at the dance. Perhaps he will marry one of them.

1ST SISTER. How happy I am to have my new dress.

2ND SISTER. Our new dresses will be just right for the dance.

CINDEREILA. I haven't any new dress, Mother. Will you give me one of your old dresses?

MOTHER. You won't need a dress. I'm not letting you go to the dance. You're not pretty.

The Prince will not look at my daughters when you're standing with them.

CINDERELLA. I know that I'm not pretty, but I wish to go to see the dance.

MOTHER. I shall not let you go.

A Few Days Later

CINDERELLA. Why do I sit here crying? I know that I shall not be going to the dance. I wish that someone was here to talk to.

FAIRY (coming up before Cinderella). Cinderella!

CINDERELLA. Who are you? Oh, how pretty you are!

FAIRY. I'm the *fairy of the flowers. Why are

you crying?

CINDERELLA. I had no dress to go to the dance. The others have gone.

FAIRY. I will make your old dress a new *golden dress.

CINDERELLA. Oh Fairy, Fairy! How did you do it? *Glass *slippers too. But I have no way of getting to the palace.



FAIRY. You will find a glass *coach at the door.

CINDERELLA.

How can I thank
you?

FAIRY. But

one thing I must tell you. Tomorrow morning,

when the sun comes up, your new golden dress will be an old dress again, and there will be no coach of glass. So you must come back home before morning. Good night!

(The Fairy leaves.)

In the Palace

The KING. Who is that beautiful girl standing by the door?

The PRINCE. I don't know, Father. I saw her come in. I said then that she was the most beautiful girl here.

The KING. Have one of your men find out who she is.

The PRINCE (to a friend). Go, talk with the girl with the golden dress. Let her know that I wish to see her.

The KING. Bring her to talk with me later. (The King leaves and the Friend goes to Cinderella.)

The FRIEND (coming back with Cinderella).

This is the Prince. He wishes to talk with you. The PRINCE (to Cinderella). Thank you for coming. (To his friend) Please go now.

CINDERELLA. I never thought to meet you.

The PRINCE. Will you tell me your name?

CINDERELLA. Prince, I must not tell you my name.

The PRINCE. Do you live in the town?

CINDERELLA. No, I live in the country near here.

The PRINCE. Come, let's walk in the *garden. CINDERELLA. Thank you, Prince. I'm so happy to be here.

Later in the Garden

The PRINCE. You are the most beautiful girl here.



CINDERELLA. Oh, no! There are many prettier than I.

The PRINCE. I think that you are both good and beautiful. You have made me very happy by coming to the dance. You must come to the palace again. How happy we have been. It's nearly morning.

CINDERELLA. Oh, I didn't know that it was so late. I must go at once.

The PRINCE. The sun will soon come up. Please stay. We can see the morning come.

CINDERELLA. Oh, no, Prince! I must leave at once.

SERVANT (coming out). The King wishes to see you, my Prince.

The PRINCE. Tell the King that I'm coming. (The Servant goes and the Prince says to Cinderella) I'll soon be back. Then I can stand with you and see the new day come.

(The Prince goes.)

CINDERELLA. I don't want to go, but I must.

Soon my new golden dress will be an old dress, and I shall have no coach to go home in.

(She runs out.)

Later

The PRINCE. Where's the girl in the golden dress? The King wishes to talk with her.

A SERVANT (coming out). Were you calling, my Prince?

The PRINCE. Yes. I'm looking for the girl who was in the garden with me. She had a golden dress and little slippers made of glass. Go quickly. Look in every room in the palace and find her for me. She must be found. (The Servant goes.)

The SERVANT (coming back). I came back because I found this slipper. I think that it was hers.

The PRINCE. She must have lost it when she was running out of the palace. Tell your men that they are to try to find the girl who can put on this little slipper. I think that there is only
