
Traditions are an important part of Native American culture.





Every family has customs and traditions. Younger people in a family learn things from older people in the family. Read on to learn about a grandmother who has a special lesson for her granddaughter.





Mosi woke up with the sun. Today was a special day. She was going to have another rug-weaving lesson with her grandmother.

Weaving is a tradition in Mosi's family. A **tradition** is knowledge or beliefs that are passed

down. In Mosi's family, grandmothers teach their grandchildren how to weave beautiful rugs.

Rug weaving has many steps. Grandmother made Mosi a time line. The time line showed all the steps it would take to make the rug.

Today, Grandmother and Mosi were going to gather plants. "Do you remember why we are gathering plants?" Grandmother asked Mosi.

"I think so," said Mosi. "We need the plants to make dye."

"That's right," said Grandmother. "Plants are the **source** of color for dyes. The colors in our rugs all come from plants."

Rug-Weaving Timeline

Shear, or cut, wool from sheep.

DAY 2 Wash wool; set it out to dry.

DAY 3 Gather plants for dyes.


DAY 4 Card, or comb, the wool.

DAY 5 Spin the wool into yarn.

Make dye and dye the wool.


DAY 7 Set up the loom where the rug will be made.

DAY 8 Begin weaving the rug.



"Why can't we buy dye at the store?" asked Mosi.

Grandmother frowned. "Sometimes I do buy dye at the store," she said. "But it is our **custom** to make colorful dyes from plants."



Different Ways of Life
