- 1. 编写依据: 近些年来,由于我国国际商务迅速发展,国际经贸地位不断提高,我国已成为世界经济大国,对具有国际竞争力的复合型商务人才需求强劲。高校则出现了几乎是有外语专业必有商务英语的繁荣景象,对商务英语教材也提出了更高的要求。我们根据《高等学校英语专业英语教学大纲》,"大量需要的则是外语和其他相关学科,如外交、经贸、法律、新闻等结合的外语复合型人才,培养这种复合型外语专业人才是社会主义市场经济对外语专业提出的要求,也是时代的要求"的精神,编写了这套教材。

- 4. 教材内容: 读写教程的文本内容围绕学生必须面对的商务语境,以求职、工作、生活为主线,循序进行编写和选材,如: Looking for a Job, A Day in Office, Team Spirit, Being a Salesman, Entertaining Clients, Cross-cultural Awareness, New Face of Marketing, Customer Service, Business Trip, Pricing and Payment, CEO, Tech-transfer 等,包括了商务贸

易、市场、企管、金融、物流、电子商务、合作、人力资源、企业文化等主要商务知识和可体验的商务语境。视听说教程则带领学生进入 Job Interview, Office Work, Getting along with Others, In the News, Pricing and Payment, Wedding Ceremony, Sales Representative, Claim, Business News, Stock, Knowing Inflation 等商务及商务相关的语境,安排了突出商务交际听说可操作性的学生从业必须面对而又感兴趣的情景话题。



编写说明

为了培养学生商务英语交际能力,建构从业的核心竞争力,适应我国经济发展和国际商务人才需求,我们编写了这套《大学核心商务英语剧场——视听说教程》。这套教程共四册,每册 10 单元。

1. 教材结构 每单元由以下部分构成



- 2. 选材原则 本套教材内容选择本着适应"就业、工作、生存、发展"的原则,选择学生关心的话题,教材文本内容具有鲜明的实用性、时代性、兴趣性。本套教材语言鲜活,语境生动,音频视频标准,包括 college life, looking for a job, working with others, meeting customers, office work, franchising, pricing & terms of payment, business interview, tech-transfer, business trip 等 120 余个话题,可以有效地培养学生从业、生活的交际能力。学生可以身临其境,体验学习的轻松与快乐。
- 3. 自主学习 本套教材提供的 MP3、光盘、在线平台构成了教材立体化,听说练习可以机上自主学习、自我评估,具有练习自动正误判断、答案检索、重新演练、文本查读、机上自主学习评估功能,打破了纸质教材传统练习模式,为学生在线学习提供了平台,可以满足学生个性化学习需求。

- 本套教材可作为大学商务英语专业及经管、财经、金融等商科及专业英语课教材及选修课教材。



- scholarship: All universities and colleges have a number of part-scholarship available
 which can contribute towards living expenses or tuition fees for the first year of a
 student's stay of the university.
- 2. payment of fees: Once you have been accepted at an American university, you must pay a deposit (usually \$500) to confirm your place and intention. (Your tuition deposit is refundable if your request for a visa is denied.) The students don't have to pay all the fees in advance. Payment plans, which spread the cost of a university program over a longer period, are available if requested in advance. For an additional \$500 service charge, you can choose to enroll in an approved installment payment plan which allows you to pay a percentage of your total program fees over a period of time depending upon the length of program. Any failure to meet the regulations will result in their enrolment being cancelled.
- 3. accommodation services: Whenever you want to live in a hall of residence or are looking for a place off-campus, Student Accommodation Service can help. They allocate rooms in halls on or very close to the campus, and also manage many private properties and nearly schools. If you have any questions about living on- or off-campus, you can call them and they'll do their best to help you.
- 4. careers service: The careers service of schools can help you at any time during your college life, giving advice and guidance on career choice as well as practical help with your applications for employment or further study. The service aims to help students make appropriate career decisions and provide information on employment, study and training opportunities.

5. hall of residence: There are single study bedrooms on campus located either in catered or self-catering halls of residence. Students housed in catered halls have their own bedrooms in flats. They share bathroom.

- courses: Some courses in Western colleges and universities are multi-disciplinary
 ones. Students are required to study one, or combination. This kind of courses are
 usually specialist courses structured to allow students to have chance to cross
 boundaries of traditional courses in order to widen their perspectives of knowledge.
- 2. sandwich courses: These are courses which combine periods of full time study with one or more periods of practical training in industry, commerce or the professions. Students on sandwich courses who have gained sponsorship from industrial or commercial organizations will normally undertake their placement with the sponsoring body. Other students will be given help in finding suitable placements.

- 1. credit card: Small card that authorizes the person named on it to charge goods or services to his or her account. It differs from a debit card, with which money is automatically deducted from the bank account of the cardholder to pay for the goods or services. Credit-card use originated in the U.S. in the 1920s; early credit cards were issued by various firms (e.g., oil companies and hotel chains) for use at their outlets only. The first universal credit card, accepted by a variety of establishments, was issued by Diners' Club in 1950. Charge cards such as American Express require cardholders to pay for all purchases at the end of the billing period (usually monthly). Bank cards such as MasterCard and Visa allow customers to pay only a portion of their bill; interest accrues on the unpaid balance. Credit-card companies get revenue from annual fees and interest paid by cardholders and from fees paid by participating merchants.
