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FOREWORD

Many people have truly complicated—and often polarized—feelings toward America. Due to these mixed feelings, it is difficult to objectively view America, but perhaps those feelings are evidence that these people have a very strong interest in America. It is unfortunate that neither those who like or dislike America seem to accurately understand the nation. Based on nationalism, one side cries out for the rejection of America; while the other side embraces America. In this sense, it is now more important than ever to strive to objectively view America in the era of globalization.

I had always wanted to create a series of books on America decades ago. However, back then, I didn't know much about America, nor did I have the confidence to write about America as I felt that I would be scorned by the many experts on America. But after deciding that the time has come for me to write about America, I published this three-volumed series after working on it for two years. Even though I lived in America—as a visiting professor—for only about a year and a half, I encountered topics on America on a daily basis from the media over a 10-year period while I lived in Europe. Whether I wanted it or not, I have had significant exposure to America, and I take pride that I have worked hard to

understand its society and people. This three-volumed series on America is based on such experience and knowledge.

The series consists of these three volumes: Volume 1: *The People*—from America's democracy and constitution to its social problems, and from the immigration history to American life style, this volume tries to give a full picture of American life; Volume 2: *The History*—it tells about the history of the U.S. from Columbus' discovering America to its growing to be the only superpower in the world; and Volume 3: *The Presidents*—the volume shows how American presidents, from Washington to Obama, influences the U.S. and even the world. Volume 3 was added because it's difficult to understand America without understanding the various aspects and characteristics of the U.S. presidents and the U.S. presidency.

I hope that these books will not only help dispel any wrong illusions about America but also enable my readers to accurately view America, free from any unreasonable prejudices. I am grateful to my dear readers and those who contribute to the editing and publishing of the series!

这套书包括以下三册：第一册是《美国人》，从美国的民主和宪法到美国社会的问题，从美国的移民历史到美国人的生活习惯，力求全面展现美国人的生活图景；第二册是《美国历史》，深入阐述了美国从哥伦布发现新大陆直至发展成为今天世界唯一的超级大国的历史；第三册是《美国总统》，从华盛顿到奥巴马，看历任总统如何影响了美国乃至世界。写第三册是因为，如果不理解美国总统和总统制的各方面及其特点，就很难理解美国。

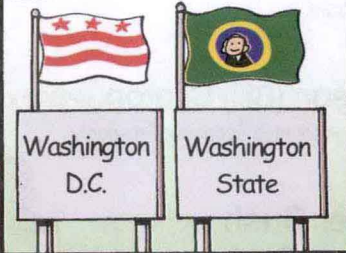

His name lives on as the names of the capital city of the United States and a state.

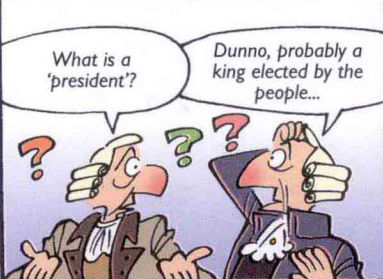


Most significantly, Washington served as the first president of the United States.

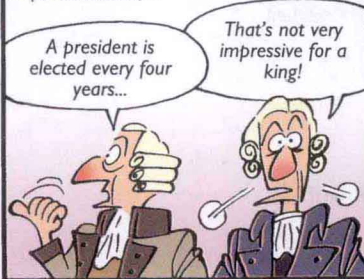

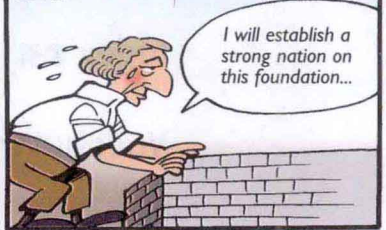
He was elected to the presidency, an office that did not exist in any other country.

Washington left school at the age of 15.

but he was a great leader who could inspire people with his clear judgment and prominent leadership.

His half-brother Lawrence was a great influence on the young Washington.

We encountered a Spanish ship during our navigation!

Attracted by Lawrence's stories on military life, he tried to enlist in the British Navy.

However, his widowed mother persuaded him otherwise, so instead of joining the navy, he worked as a land surveyor for six years from the age of 15.

When he was 21 (1753), he joined the Virginia militia,

and later on was detached to the regular British army to fight in the French and Indian War.

After the war, Washington returned to the Mount Vernon plantation he had inherited from his parents.

At that time, he met his wife-to-be Martha Dandridge Custis,

the widow of Daniel Parke Custis, once the richest man in Virginia.

Through his marriage to Martha in 1759, Washington came to own more than 3,000 slaves and 17,000 acres of land.

Married well, and now have two children

with lots of land and slaves!

He eventually became one of the wealthiest men in Virginia, with his land holdings alone reaching 22,000 acres.

Washington's made it!

Wish there was another widow like Martha!

After Washington became president, his slaves outnumbered the civil servants employed by the U.S. federal government.

Perhaps this is why he refused to serve a third term as president.

Although he was a war hero who had achieved victory in the Independence War, Washington's reputation as a soldier was no match for his reputation as a man with impeccable character.

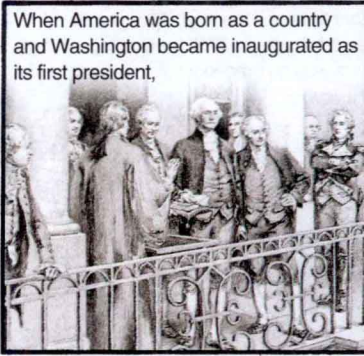

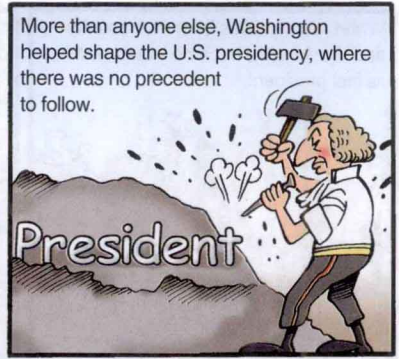
