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

## STUDENT EXCHANGE

- A: So how was Paris?
- B: Fascinating!
- A: In what way?
- B: The people for one thing. They come \*from all over and speak and behave in so many different ways.
- A: What's so special about that? We learned about that in Geography class.
- B: It's one thing learning about foreign peoples and cultures from a book and quite another seeing them with your own eyes. It's much more complex.
- A: I suppose you're right. So what was your most interesting memory of Paris?
- B: That's hard. *One memory stands out*<sup>2</sup>, though. Spending a whole afternoon in the Spanish Quarter in Paris, eating delicious food and feeling so at home. The people there *treated me like one of their own*<sup>3</sup>.
- A: Well, you can't get that experience from reading books.
- B: You got that right!

- A: We were discussing body language in school today.
- B: Body language? You mean gestures and stuff like that?
- A: Exactly. Our teacher was telling us that there are 700,000 forms of body language in the world. We talked about curious gestures I had never heard of before.
- B: Such as?
- A: Well, for example people in some parts of Greece, Bulgaria and Turkey nod their heads to indicate "no".
- B: That's strange. *From what I heard*<sup>1</sup>, tapping your nose in England means "confidential", but it means "Watch out!" in Italy.
- A: And then there are cultures in the Philippines, North America and South America that point with their lips, like we point with our fingers.
- B: That is weird. But *get this!*<sup>2</sup> The curled-index finger-into-the thumb sign or 'OK' sign means fine to you and me, right?...But "worthless" in France, and it's considered an insult in Greece, Brazil, Italy, Turkey, and Russia. Oh yeah. I almost forgot! That "thumb up" sign, meaning 'Great!', is an insult in most African countries.
