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前 言

GRE (Graduate Record Examination) 测试是美国普林斯顿教育考试服务处主办的一种考试。其难度高于托福测试,分为普通测试 (General Test) 和专业测试 (Subject Test)。它是美国各大学录取留学生、授予奖学金的重要参考标准,是到美国、加拿大等国留学攻读学位的必考科目。为了帮助我国研究生、大学生和具有同等水平的青年报考 GRE,同时也为有志于按 GRE 测试标准提高英语水平的大、中学青年教师提供参考资料,我们特编写 GRE 系列丛书。本书为丛书中的一种,分四大部分:第一部分包括 40 个词汇表,每个词汇表后配有相应的测试题。前 30 个词汇表中的词汇为应试基本词汇,应全部掌握,后 10 个词汇表中的词汇为附加词汇。第二部分为复习题。第三部分为标准答案。第四部分为历届 GRE 试题词汇部分选编及答案。词汇中的例句仅供读者参考,故未附汉语翻译。

abase-allegory

abase [e'beis] v. lower; humiliate. 使降低地位(或身份), 使谦卑

His refusal to abase himself in the eyes of his followers irritated the king who wanted to humiliate the proud leader. abasement n.

Adverse circumstances compelled him to close his business.

adversity [ed've:siti] n. poverty; misfortune. 苦难,不幸

We must learn to meet adversity gracefully.

His affected mannerisms irritated many of us who had known him before his promotion. affectation, n.
