

《巧过大学英语四、六级——六级卷备考要领与技巧》,依据最新大学英语四、六级统考命题精神,针对大学英语基础阶段和高级阶段,设计、编写而成。其主要内容包括以下两个方面: (1) 选编符合大学英语相应级别测试内容、题型及深度的专项练习和标准答案、解注; (2) 设计、编写反映相应级别的成套试卷和成套试题的标准答案、解注。各分卷之间既相对独立,又互为有机体。读者既可根据自身的实际需要及努力目标,择其一、二,由浅入深,循序渐进,跨越四、六级统考难关。

本套书的鲜明特点在于紧扣最新大学英语四、六级统考命题精神,依序递进,先分(专项操练)后合(综合测试),无论用之教、学都十分有效、便利。书中多数练习及试题均在一些重点大学内部试用,实践证明试题的难度、效果和层次等指标都与国家统考题有很高的相关性。

本套书的最直接受益者是全国普通高等本、 专科院校参加四、六级统考的莘莘学子,同时 也适合电大、夜大等各类成人高校、培训中心 的学员和社会青年作为自练、自测的材料,也 可供大学英语教师作为选编考题或选取教学实 例的参考。
