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前言

《全新大学英语四级听力突破》是根据国家教委颁发的文理科和理工科《大学英语教学大纲》以及大学英语考试委员会最近公布的四级英语新题型而编选的。旨在帮助学生加强听力训练,增强听力技能和适应新题型的能力,提高听力水平,顺利地通过国家英语四级统考和其他各类考试。

本书编者借鉴了多年来大学英语四级教学实践的经验, 广泛涉猎了国内外各种新材料,并按照四级考试的新题型和 要求,对所有材料进行了详细筛选和整理,汇编成了一本内 容充实、题型新颖的听力辅助教材。全书共分两大部分。第 一部分为听写填空概述和 4 个单元的听写填空练习,每个单 元 5 篇文章,用以训练学生的精听技能和书面表达能力。第 二部分为 12 套听力试题,每套试题包括 10 个对话, 3 篇短文 和 1 篇听写填空。可供学生进行听力综合技能训练和测试。书 后还配有与录音相应的文字和答案。

本书录音由外籍教师精心制作,声音清晰,语调自然,符 合四级考试的要求。全书共配有 6 盒录音磁带。

本书由施文霞任主编,李红燕、于艳英、孙彩萍参加编写。全书各部分分工如下: 听写填空(Part I: Spot Dictation Exercises)由于艳英(Exercise 1~2)、孙彩萍(Exercise 3~4)编写; 听力测试(Model Tests)由李红燕(Section B of Test 1~12)、施文霞(听写填空概述、Section A and C of Test 1~12)编写。

由于水平所限,不足之处在所难免,敬请读者不吝赐教。

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Part I Spot Dictation Exercises

多年来,全国大学英语四、六级考试听力试题基本上采用客观性选择形式。这虽然对于提高学生的听力水平起了很大作用,但在一定程度上忽略了学生的书面表达能力和对听力材料的精确理解。为了更进一步提高考试的信度和效度,使考试对教学有较好的反拨作用,国家考试委员会研究公布了一种新的听力题型,即听写填空。

一、听写填空的形式

听写填空从表面看类似于完形填空、试卷上给出一段 200 词左右的短文,其中有10个空格,总计词数为50个。但 又不同于完形填空。完形填空后常设有四个选择项,考生必 须通过阅读,参照上下文进行选择。而听写填空则要通过听 短文录音,填入省去的句子和短语。

听写填空实际上属于听力范畴,与听力对话理解和听力 短文理解一样,都需先听录音再做题。然而,听写填空则是 一种将听力和书面表达能力融为一体的试题。试题的录音通 常放三遍。第一遍语速正常,供学生听懂原文;第二遍在空 格后有停顿,供学生听写;第三遍和第一遍相同,正常语速, 让考生检查所写的内容。

二、听写填空的目的和要求

听写填空测试的目的并不仅仅是检查学生所听懂的词汇 和句型,而主要是测试学生在语篇水平上综合的听力理解能力,以及学生的书面表达能力。以便将以往的应试教育转变 成素质教育,切实提高学生的语言运用能力。

这种题型的设置,有助于教师在日常的英语教学中注重培养学生的各种听力技能,其中包括学生的泛听技能、精听技能和逻辑思维能力。同时,也要求学生具备以下各方面的能力:

首先,要掌握一定量的词汇,其中既包括听力词汇又包括阅读词汇。因为词汇量的大小是衡量学生听力的最基本的条件。

其次,要有扎实的语法基础知识,掌握各种各样的句型。 这样才能推断出略读的词语,写出正确的句子和短语。

此外,还要有一定的阅读能力和逻辑思维能力,能够利 用所给的文字材料理解全文的要旨。

除了以上所谈的语言知识和语篇知识外,学生还应有广 泛的背景知识,这样才能对所听的材料理解得更快更准确。

三、听写填空试题的解题原则

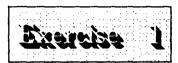
听写填空是一种新型的综合性的试题,它涉及学生的各方面的能力,即听的能力、读的能力、写的能力以及综合思维的能力。因此,学生解题时可按照下列步骤,以便调动各方面的因素,取得满意的成绩。

1. 放录音前,首先阅读现有的文字材料,设法找出文章的关键词语,了解文章的梗概。这样便于激活考生大脑中原

有的专业知识和背景知识信息,从而更快地理解全文的内容。

- 2. 根据现有的文字信息,认真收听第一遍录音,并把自己读到的、听到的和想到的综合起来,以便对全文内容能有更为详细的了解。
- 3. 放第二遍录音时,利用停顿时间,把所听的内容填入 空格。书写要清楚、整齐,速度要快。
- 4. 利用第三遍放音的机会,边听边检查听写的内容。如果发现错误,可及时纠正,也可画上标记,听完录音后进行 改正。
- 5. 对于听不清楚的某些连读形式,可以借助语法和上下 文加以补充和完善,以便使原文保持完整的意义。

以上所述只是个人对听写填空题型的理解和答题的体 会。事实上,要提高听力水平,做好听写填空,还应有良好 的心理素质,灵活多变的方法。同时,还须重视其他影响听 力的非语言因素。

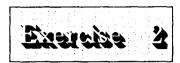
