

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## 出版说明

《每日英语》讲座节目在中国北京、上海、广州、西安、河北、长春、天津、江苏、甘肃、福建等地播出以来,受到了广大英语听众的欢迎。应广大听众要求,北京人民广播电台和加拿大国际广播电台就举办连续性讲座节目进行了研究与协商,决定联合举办《每日英语续集》讲座节目,由加拿大国际广播电台组织编写、录制,北京人民广播电台以及上述各地广播电台组织在当地播出。

《每日英语续集》(Everyday English—Series II and III)分上、下两册出版,上册(Everyday English Series II)内容以中国留学生在加拿大的生活、学习和工作为主线,广泛涉及了加拿大的风俗习惯、风土人情和文化背景;下册(Everyday English Series III)广泛涉及了有关专业领域如电讯、政府、农业等等各行各业的语言和词汇。

## PARAGRAPH INTRO FOR EE II & III

The response to Everyday English, Radio Canada International's first English language course broadcast in China, has been overwhelming. CLARE: Everyday English Series II is written by the Canada/China Language and Cultural Program at Saint Mary's University and is produced by Radio Canada International especially for English language learners in China.

BOB: Hello, this is ......

CLARE: And I'm..... Welcome to Everyday English.

V: HELLO, THIS IS..... WELCOME TO EVERYDAY ENGLISH.

MUSIC: THEME (UP AND OUT)

BOB:

In this programme, you'll learn how Canadians welcome guests into their country and into their homes.

CLARE:

In this programme, you'll also learn about the language associated with introductions and occupations.

BOB:

In the first part of the programme, Laura Barnes of the Canada-China Friendship Association meets Mei-Li and Fu on their arrival from China. She is driving them from the airport. Mei-Li explains what she'll be doing during her year-long stay in Canada.

### **DIALOGUE**

LAURA: Mei-Li, you and Fu certainly chose a nice day

to arrive in Canada.

MEI-LI: Yes, Laura, the sun's very strong. It's a

beautiful summer day.

FU: I'm a bit surprised, Mei-Li. I was led to be-

lieve that Canada was a COLD country.

MEI-LI: Oh, it IS in the winter, Fu. But the summers

can be very, very hot.

LAURA: You seem to have done your homework, Mei-

Li.

MEI-LI: I've read quite a bit about the weather in Canada, Laura. It's an important part of my work as an environmentalist.

LAURA: Of course. I hadn't really thought of that.
What sort of work will you be doing in Canada?

MEI-LI: I'll be looking into ways in which pollution is affecting the environment in Canada.

LAURA: You'll be working with someone from Environment Canada — isn't that right, Mei-Li?

MEI-LI: Yes, I'll be working with a woman named Diane Douglas.

FU: She's the sister of my host, Ross Douglas.

MEI-LI: I'm hoping that we'll be able to exchange ideas on how to deal with pollution.

LAURA: Is pollution much of a problem in China, Mei-Li?

MEI-LE: Yes, very much so. It seems that the more we industrialize, the more pollution we produce.

LAURA: We've had a similar experience in Canada, Mei-Li.

MEI-LI: I'm most concerned with the effects industries are having on our lakes and rivers.

LAURA: You're not alone, Mei-Li. Canadians are also worried. After all, Canada has more fresh water than any other country in the world.

CLARE: You'll find out about Fu's occupation in the next part

of the story. For now let's go over this part.

BOB: It's a hot day when Fu and Mei-Li arrive from Chi-

na.

CLARE: Fu's not familiar with Canadian weather, But Mei-Li

knows that there are hot summers and cold winters in

Canada.

BOB: Mei-Li knows about the weather because she's an en-

vironmentalist. That means a person who tries to solve problems with the environment, for example,

problems with air and water.

CLARE: What will Mei-Li be studying about the environment

while she is in Canada? Let's listen to that part of the

story again.

DIALOGUE

MEI-LI: I'll be looking into ways in which pollution is

effecting the environment in Canada.

BOB: Pollution is a serious problem both for Canada and for

China.

CLARE; Mei-Li will be working with Environment Cánada, a

government agency that is responsible for the envi-

ronment.

BOB: Mei-Li will be working with Diane Douglas. She's

the sister of Ross Douglas.

CLARE: Fu will be living in Ross Douglas's home white he's in

Canada. So Ross will be Fu's HOST for the next

year.

BOB: Is Mei-Li concerned with a particular problem? Let's

listen to that part of the story again.

#### DIALOGUE:

MEI-LI: I'm most concerned with the effects industries

are having on our lakes and rivers.

LAURA: You're not alone, Mei-Li. Canadians are also

worried. After all, Canada has more fresh

water than any other country in the world.

CLARE: Mei-Li is interested in industrial pollution of lakes

and rivers. And so are most Canadians because they

want to keep their fresh water nice and clean!

BOB: Let's listen to more of the story. Fu talks about what

he'll be doing while he's in Canada for a year.

## DIALOGUE:

LAURA: Fu, does your work involve the environment,

too?

FU: No, not at all. I'm a translator.

LAURA: I see. And what will you be doing in Canada,

Fu?

FU: I'm here to improve my translating skills.

Most of the work I've done has involved translating poetry, plays, and short stories.

However, I'm trying to branch out.

MEI-LI: In what way, Fu?

FÜ: I'm hoping to learn about Canadian Business.

By the time I return to China, I want to be

able to translate business correspondence and contracts.

LAURA: Are you going to be taking courses in business English?

FU: Yes, I'll be starting classes in business Emplish and translation at the University of Gatawa.

MEI-LI: Didn't you tell me you're going to be working in a business too?

FU: Yes, I'll be working part-time with Ross

Douglas. He works for a company that publishes books.

LAURA: That should help you with your translation work.

FU: Yes, and I think it'll also give me an idea of how Canadian businesses work. I'm looking forward to working with Ross Douglas very much.

LAURA: Well, I think you'll get to meet him soon,
Fu. This is the Douglas's house.

CLARE: You'll find out what happens when Fu and Mei-Li meet Ross Douglas in the next part of the stery-

BOB, Fu is a translator. He usually translates creative works like poetry, plays and short stories.

CLARE:

But he hopes to BRANCH OUT. That means he hopes to gain new experience. He wants to learn about written documents in the business world.

BOB:

What will Fu do to improve his skills as a translator? Let's listen to that part of the story again.

### DIALOGUE:

LAURA: Are you going to be taking courses in business

English?

FU: Yes, I'll be strarting classes in business Eng-

lish and translation at the University of Ot-

tawa.

CLARE: Fu will take courses at one of the universities. He

will enroll in a program for translators. But that's

not the only thing that he'll do.

BOB: What else will Fu do in Canada? Let's listen to that

part of the story again.

### DIALOGUE:

MEI-LI: Didn't you tell me you're going to be working

in a business too?

FU: Yes, I'll be working part-time with Ross

Douglas. He works for a company that pub-

lishes books.

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FU: Yes, and I think it'll also give me an idea of

how Canadian businesses work. I'm looking forward to working with Ross Douglas very

much.

LAURA: Well, I think you'll get to meet him soon,

Fu. This is the Douglas's house.

CLARE: Fu will work with Ross Douglas in a publishing and

distributing company. That will allow him to find out

about the business world.

BOB: Let's listen to more of the story. Laura Barnes intro-

duces Fu and Mei-Li to Ross Douglas at his home in

Ottawa.

DIALOGUE:

ROSS: Ah, that must be our guests!

ROSS: Well, hello!

LAURA: Hello, Mr. Douglas. My name's Ms. Laura

Barnes. I'm with the Canada-China Friend-

ship Association.

ROSS: Pleased to meet you, Ms. Barnes.

LAURA: Pleased to meet you. May I introduce Ms.

Mei-Li Shen and Mr. Fu Zhou. Ms. Shen,

Mr. Zhou, this is Mr. Douglas.

FU: And you, you must call me Fu.

MEI-LI: Call me Mei-Li, please.

ROSS: Well Fu, Mei-Li, welcome to our home. Ms.

Barnes, we're just about to sit down and re-

lax, if you'd like to stay.

LAURA: You're very kind. Unfortunately, I must be

on my way, or I'll be late for my next ap-

pointment. Thank you just the same.
