

内容 提要

前言

全国大学英语四、六级考试委员会已于1995年7月和1996年7月颁布了两批新题型。这些新题型试题着重考察学生运用英语的实际能力,其目的在于使大学英语教学把精力放在课堂教学上,扎实地提高学生的实际英语能力,避免应试教学。为了使考生熟悉新题型,对照检查自己的英语学习,我们按照《大学英语教学大纲》、《大学英语六级考试大纲》及新题型的要求,编写了此书。

本书含10套模拟试题,每套试题由五大部分构成:听力理解、词汇、阅读理解、简短回答、写作。其中听力部分为A、B、C三个小部分,C部分为新题型复合式听写。第二大部分由于近两次六级考试中词汇语法题已没有语法题,所以我们只编写词汇题。试题材料都在编者的教学中试验采用过、具有很强的针对性。

本书是由多位教师精工细作共同完成的, 曾凡贵担任主编, 夏孝才、陈典平、何南林负责词汇部分; 章晋新、黄晓燕、陈颖和杨常倩负责有关听力部分; 曹凡贵负责阅读理解; 张小勇负责简短回答部分; 戴希龙、曾凡贵负责写作部分。最后由曾凡贵负责全书的统稿。

由于编者水平有限, 疏漏之处在所难免, 敬请读者批评指正。

Part III Reading comprehension (35 minutes)

Directions: There are 4 reading passages in this part. Each passage is followed by some questions or unfinished statements. For each of them there are four choices marked A), B), C) and D). You should decide on the best choice and mark the corresponding letter on the Answer Sheet with a single line through the centre.

If we think more about the effect of the theory of Copernicus upon the world literature, we are likely to slip into the exaggeration that it is extremely harmful to man's sense of dignity. The idea that the Earth is the center of the universe is philosophically foolish and aesthetically false. There are certain deficiencies regarding this concept even though man is considered the special child of God. The idea of a moving Earth seemed absurd at first but Copernicus used this assumption. He found that a much simpler and aesthetically superior system resulted.

Copernicus fully understood that the earth is a planet revolving in an annual orbit around the sun, in company of the other planets. Since the earth itself is in the heavens, the contrast between heaven and earth vanishes, in the modern concept of space. Another fundamental concept that Copernicus was obliged to revise was the idea of gravity. The fall of heavy objects toward the center of the earth had been regarded as a movement toward the center of the universe. But Tycho Brahe, the renowned scientist,

asserted that it was impossible for the earth to revolve. At that time, to understand the Copernican theory required the knowledge of mathematics. Brahe's explanation was naturally accepted just as Newton's Law of Gravitation is accepted today.

The work of Kepler and Galileo helped, of course, to bring about general acceptance of the Copernican teaching among the leading astronomers within a century and a half of its formulation. And the Copernicus' theory was at last fully available after Newton's discovery. But in the light of Einstein's principle of relativity, any decision to regard one cosmic body as at rest and another as moving is now hardly justifiable.
