本册选材时,仍注意到适应高中学生的心理特点和知识结构,除继续选用一些传说、故事、科普知识、史地常识、风土人情、历史人物和名人轶事的题材外,还着重选了一些名著名篇,以便对学生经常性的课外阅读活动起到引导作用。为确保材料的可读性,本册所选课文的生词率,仍均控制在2%以内。
