

Gary Smith, an engineer, was attracted by a last-minute travel deal he found online before Christmas: two nights at Manhattan's posh Waldorf-Astoria hotel — and by air to New York — for about \$600 per couple.

Though getting away for the holiday weekend proved impractical, Smith, like many other savvy travelers, often jumps on Internet travel <u>promotions</u>. He estimates he has saved from \$1,000 to \$2,000 per year since he started making his own travel arrangements online five years ago.

"It's a great way to stay in a 4-or 5-star hotel and pay much less." notes Smith. And he does not care about which travel web sites he surfs. "I go wherever the deal is — I compare," Smith says. "I have gone to www. google. com and put in 'cheap flights or cheap hotel' and gotten a list of 10(sites) per page. Sometimes, you can do a hotel cheaper on one site and plane fare on the other. I keep searching back and forth until I find something where the time works, the price is right and things line up. Then I just click the mouse."

"These days, growing numbers of Americans — as many as three out of five — go online to research and book trips," industry experts say. And many web sites, including the so-called "Big Three" online travel agencies — Expedia, Travelocity and Orbitz — are getting easier for consumers to use. Each charges a service or booking fee.

Increasingly, savvy travelers are learning that it's often a good idea to deal directly with individual airlines or hotels; some of the best rates can be found on airline web sites, such as <u>southwest.com</u> or hotel chains such as <u>starwood.com</u> or <u>marriott.com</u>, which guarantee best rates. Better package prices may be available from the "Big Three", however, thanks to large-scale price-bundling on hotels, flights and rental cars.

Often, experts say, "the best online bargains are won by travelers who have flexible travel dates or who can book last-minute trips".

More than half of high school students surveyed at least one symptom (症状) of hearing loss connected with the use of portable music players, like iPods and other MP3 players.

Does your child turn up the volume (音量) on the television or radio, even though everyone else can hear just fine? Does your child say "what?" or "huh?" repeatedly? It could be their ear-bud headphones, which, like the ones typically used with iPods and other portable music players, project sound directly into the ear canal (耳孔).

Sound levels are measured in <u>decibels</u>. Generally, decibel levels fewer than 80 or so are not harmful to hearing. But a MP3 player can put out levels in excess of 100 decibels, and children sometimes stay plugged in for hours.

Like generations of mothers, Lynette Cook shouts across the house for her children to turn down the volume of their music, only they're not listening to stereos. They're rocking out to music on tiny iPods, listening through very small speakers tucked into their ears.

Hearing damage occurs when loud sounds destroy tiny hear cells in the inner ear. These cells turn sound waves into electrical impulses (脉冲) and send them to the brain. Destroy just 25 to 30 per cent of these cells, and hearing loss occurs.

Carmen Lappen, the nurse at South Mountain High in Phoenix, is amazed when the children surveyed admitted they had hearing problems. Students at her school love their iPods and other MP3 players. She laughed, "They're not going to tell me they hurt." Lappen worries when she can hear students' tunes, even when they're wearing ear buds: "If I can hear it, it is way too much for their ears." She won't buy an MP3 player for her 17-year-old son.

Why do American schools fail to create lifetime readers? There are two basic and related "facts of life" that parents and educators seem to __1__. The first fact is that human beings are __2_. We are willing to do over and over that which brings us pleasure. For example, we go to the restaurants we like, order the foods we like, and listen to the redio stations that play the music we like. In contrast, we avoid the restaurants, foods, and music we dislike.

What does this pleasure principle have to <u>3</u> with reading? Children love stories, so every time we <u>4</u> to a child at home or at school, we send a "pleasure" message to the child's brain. You could even call it a commercial, conditioning (使形成条件反射) the child to associate books and print with pleasure. <u>5</u>, all too often, parents don't read to their children; and, to make matters <u>6</u>, schools send "unpleasure" messages about reading. Endless hours of worksheets and seemingly unconnected test questions can be <u>7</u>, threatening, and meaningless. If a child seldom experiences the "pleasures" of reading at home and meets only the "unpleasures" at school, then the natural <u>8</u> will be avoidance.

The second basic fact is that reading is a build-up skill. __9__, reading is like riding a bicycle, driving a car, or sewing: in order to get better at it, you must do it. And the more you do it, the better you get at it. The last twenty five years of reading research __10__ this simple formula (规律). Regardless of sex, race, nationality, or socioeconomic background, the students who read the most are the ones who read the best, achieve the most, and stay in school the __11__. In contrast, those who don't read much cannot get better at it. And most Americans don't read much, and therefore aren't very __12__ it.

"Downing the last drop of an expensive famous brand H_2O as well as remembering to throw the empty bottle in the recycling bin, makes you feel pretty good about yourself. <u>It shouldn't</u>. Even when the bottles are recycled, there are all kinds of other consequences of swallowing bottled water," says Melissa Peffers, the air-quality program manager for Environmental Defense.

The containers are often filled in faraway lands, then shipped from abroad, and stored in refrigerators at your local store. Compare that with the influence on environment of turning on your tap, filling a glass, and drinking up!

"Anyone who is choosing bottled water for health reasons is misguided," says Peffers, "Most bottled water is just tap water." And what comes out of your tap is carefully monitored to follow the strict rules. Consider another fact that bottled water is surprisingly expensive, especially when compared with the alternative, which is almost free, and it is astonishing that America's desire for bottled water seems impossible to satisfy, reaching nearly 30 billion bottles a year.

"My parents' generation never had bottled water," says Isabelle Silvrman, an Environmental Defense legal adviser. She has made a commitment to going bottle free. "You don't need to fetch it home from the store, and it's cheaper," she adds.

Bottled water's role as a status symbol needs to change, Peffers points out. So when a waiter at an expensive restaurant offers "And what's your drink?" that's no reason to forget your conviction(信念). "Don't be afraid to say, 'I'll have tap.' Say it loud enough that the other tables nearby can hear you," Peffers says, "and then spend that money on a dessert."

Seeing a volcano erupt (喷发) is a wonderful experience, and you can really feel the beat by climbing to the summit (山顶) of Pacaya for a close-up view. There are guided tours every day up this highly active volcano from Antigua. Giving travelers a chance to see Mother Nature at her most powerful.

Pacaya is an easy drive from Antigua, a beautiful city with many colorful houses along its old streets that are turned into art-works during its Holy Week festival. No matter when you come to Antigua, you won't miss the Pacaya-tour companies.

But climbing Pacaya is no easy job: it is 2,560 meters high, and reaching the summit takes two to three hours of seemingly one-step-forward and two-step-back movements. As you climb, you hear the dull sounds of eruptions high above. Steaming, hot remains from recent eruptions begin to line the path as you near the active summit: the McKenney Cone (火山锥). Just as though you were going to walk over to the edge of the cone, the road turns to the left and up to the relative safety of the old, inactive summit.

Many tours are timed so that you arrive at the cone of the volcano is plenty of time for sunset and the full contrast between the erupting red lava (熔岩) and the darkening sky. On a good day the view from the summit is extremely exciting. The active mouth boils, sending red lava over its sides, and once in a while shoots hot streams up to 100 meters into the air. There is a strong bad smell in the air even if you take care to be upwind of the cone. As evening turns deeper into the night, the burning lava quietly falls down the side of the volcano. For you, too, it is time to get down.
