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自 序

回忆我自己学习英语的过程,那是一个由无数件小事、 无数次小努力相互衔接而最终到达目的地的过程。其中包括 很多的阅读、晚上钻在被窝里狂听、大量看英语电影、逮住 会说英语的人就练英语口语,并能解决英语学习过程中的一 个个或大或小的问题。我第一次去美国就没有什么语言障 碍,在与老外的交流中也没有文化、生活、风俗习惯方面的 隔阂,我想这要归功于我看了大量的美国电影以及同西方人 尽可能多的接触。

我大学毕业后到青岛当老师时,看了大量的英语电影。 当我沉浸在电影的故事中的时候,我常常忘记自己是在学习 英语,但回想起来那个时候我学到了最地道的英语。在无意识的过程中,我接受了大量地道、富有时代气息的美国语言, 了解了美国人的生活方式、思维模式、价值观、风俗习惯等。

1989年在我去北京外国语大学读翻译专业研究生之前,我已经看了很多电影并且能看得明白。因此,我就和北北外的同学在看英语电影时开玩笑说:"看不懂问我就行了。"结果没想到,我听懂的地方没有人问,他们问的地方恰巧是我们一个不懂的。我意识到我还需要多工夫来看英文电影,我就了三个美国人辅导我看电影,每一句话都解释到我完全就找了三个美国人辅导我看电影,每一句话都解释到我完全,以短语和俗语的角度,从文化、思维、生活、风俗习惯的角度解释得一清二楚。同学们觉得我果然水平不凡。但在这种"不凡"背后却是我真正做到了狂看英语电影。

因为这些经历,所以我常说,不为而为,功在其外和无心插柳柳成荫对英语学习亦是如此。一个人整天拿着一本听力书几盒听力磁带是打不开视野的。不打开视野就无法大量接触英语,也就无法真正学好英语。学习英语在跳出语言知识本身时,就会接触到一个海阔天空、精彩纷呈的真实世界。进入这个世界并能融入其中,就能学好英语。

我在教托福听力时,有一个题目就曾谈到这个观点:要了解一个国家,最好的方法就是看这个国家的电影。我自己的做法证明了这一点,并且我在多年教授英语的过程中倡导这一做法。在国内还有一种现象:那些把英语学得很地道的人,要么是有大量机会接触外国人,要么是看过大量的英语电影,即有大量接触真实英语的机会,这也证明了上述观点。

其实,我国的大学都为英语专业学生开设英语视听课。 我在北外读书时,系里还给本科生设置英语电影视听课。但 看电影学英语作为一种非常有效的学英语方法,并没有获得 应有的重视和更广泛的应用。我在十多年前就想开设电影 班,使"通过电影学英语"的方法获得普及,但一直到1996 年,我才在北京新东方学校开设了第一个电影班。这在中国 业余英语培训机构中是首例。课程推出后,效果非常显著, 引领了大众通过电影学英语的时尚潮流。

我教过一个酷爱《阿甘正传》的学生,他一直看阿甘看到自己的语言、姿势、眼神、表情和阿甘一模一样。他在课堂上模仿阿甘,同学们分不清是阿甘模仿他,还是他模仿阿甘。可能阿甘的声音不是世界上最美妙的声音,但每个人都可以在电影中找到自己最喜欢的声音去模仿。

看电影学英语成为时尚当然不仅仅是因为在电影中每个人都能找到自己最喜欢的声音,它还拥有其他媒介不可取代的优势。在中国这样的非英语国家,学习英语最缺乏的真实的英语语言环境。电影可以做到将最贴近生活的真实世界加以浓缩反映,电影让你接触西方国家的聚会、恋爱、婚姻、商业、工作、休闲、校园、超市、银行、医院……英语电影是或话地使用,英语电影是英语口语的"万花筒"。

我当年沉浸在英语电影中的时光,是我学习英语最快乐的记忆之一。我没有像很多学英语的人那样觉得学英语非常

艰难并在内心充满恐惧感, 我学习英语无论是读英文小说、 听英文广播、还是看英文电影, 都觉得是极有趣的事情。事 实上, 当一个人着迷地泡在英语电影世界中并再从这个世界 中走出来时, 他已经学会了英语口语, 有很棒的听力, 以及 对西方文化、思想、生活的理解。

随着中国家庭VCD、DVD、电视视频点播等媒介方式的普及,对英语学习来说,英语电影可能正在日益具有更重额的意义。首先,电影会打破现有的英语学习框架,这种新颖用、生动活泼、寓教于乐的方式,会大大补充中国人学到所环境不足。第二,电影可能为中国人指出了一条不用英语的环境不足。第二,电影可能为中国人指出了一条不用英语的大就能掌握地道英语口语的路。另外,对一些不经常用英语的人来说,一段时间不接触英语就会有很大的陌生感,好不看英语电影是保持英语能力的好方法。(当然,也可以看英语书、英语杂志和报纸。)

现在,关于英语电影的书已经很多了,但目前还没有用简明易懂的英语语言来讲解的"通过电影学英语"的书籍。我选择这样一种方式来阐释英语电影,是希望读者尽早进入全英语环境,就像我在学英语时很早就使用英英字典一样。《杜子华英语成功学电影系列》选择的电影都是生活片,语言简练实用。我也力图用简洁地道的英语来为这些电影做注解,帮助读者进入"英语思维状态"。同时,因为我自己教过每一部电影无数次,特别了解中国学生的弱项,因此对单词、短语、俗语、文化等的注释也极有针对性。

我特别想指出的是,读者在看英语电影时,应力求应用科学合理的方法以达到最佳效果。我在《杜子华英语成功学》中提出的六大原则:简单原则、量的原则、重复原则、模仿原则、突击原则、兴趣原则,同样适用于看电影学英语的过程。

看电影学英语尤其要遵循兴趣原则。电影捕捉了生活中很具代表性的各种场景并进行了艺术加工,尽管这样,每个

人的爱好还是不同的,不可能对每部片子都感兴趣。根据自己的口味选择自己喜欢的电影,这样看得越多兴趣就会越浓,就会慢慢把英语学习引向深入。兴趣是学好英语的最好老师。

此外,模仿原则也非常重要。中国人说英语、写英语总带着中国人的语言结构、思维、文化、生活、价值取向,造成"中国味英语"的盛行。这个问题表现在很多方面,比如我在《杜子华英语成功学》中写到的问题,为什么中国人说英语能听懂,听外国人说就听懂,看中国的英文报纸难懂?在看英语电影时模仿剧中人物的句法结构、发音、习语、表达思想的方式等等,模仿多了自然就能慢慢克服英语不地道的问题。

"通过电影学英语"是一种行之有效的方法,这已在我多年的英语教学实践中得到验证。学英语贵在把英语学"活",而通过英语电影所学到的英语是"活的英语"。本系列读物旨在给广大读者,尤其是大专院校学生提供一套学习"活的英语"的"活的教材"。

这套书很快就要和读者见面了,在此,我要感谢使我能写出这套书的美国教师 Phebe Ham,加拿大朋友 Ira Cohen 夫妇, Stanley Starkman 夫妇和澳大利亚教师 Samantha Kierath 等。

还应感谢高等教育出版社的领导和同仁,他们的支持和 大力帮助使得这套书能早日与读者见面。

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

- (1) **Liar:** somebody who does not tell the truth.

 The word "lawyer" sounds like the word "liar" and lawyers
- (2) I'm sure you don't mean...: a polite way of saying "I think you have made a mistake". Being a liar is not a profession so the teacher thinks Max has made a mistake.

sometimes have a reputation for lying.

- (3)He wears a suit and goes to court and talks to the judge: Max is describing his father's job.
- (4) **Wrongly accused:**innocent people; people accused of crimes but who are innocent. 误告。
- (5)**Do you have a moment?:** Are you free? Do you have time to talk to me now?
- (6)**To be with:** to spend time with. Divorced parents often agree to spend certain days of the week with their children.
- (7) **Big win:**Like football games, court cases are "won" and "lost". Fletcher's big win is a case that he has been successful in.
- (8) Fabulous: great, fantastic, looks good.
- (9)Get held up:be delayed, be late.
- (10)**Creep:**Fletcher's nickname for Max. It is a term of affection. 昵称。
- (11) Bothering: irritating, annoying, concerning.
- (12)**Oh, no dad:**Max is pretending to believe Fletcher's arm is turning into a claw.

Fletcher: Oh, yeah(1). It's becoming a claw! Nothing can stop the claw! Run, boy, run! Save yourself!

Max: Do the claw to mom, dad! Do the claw to mom, dad!

Fletcher: Uh-oh! You found the claw's only weakness. <u>Sub-zero temperatures</u>(2)!

Audrey:Did you have any trouble finding the place?

Fletcher: Okay. I'm late. I'm sorry. I ran out of(3) gas.

Audrey: I have some more boxes for you.

- (1)**Oh**, yeah:Oh, yes, my arm is becoming a claw.
- (2) **Subzero temperatures:**a very, very cold environment; temperatures below 0 degrees Celsius. 零下的温度。
- (3)Ran out of gas: had no fuel in the car.
- (4) The gauge is broken: the fuel gauge in the car does not work; the gauge measuring how much fuel is left in the tank does not function.
- (5) Or something...: Fletcher is being vague about why he is late.

 He does not have a clear reason for being late so it's obvious that he's lying.
- (6) Rough: dangerous.
- (7) Neutral gang colors: In some dangerous communities, people form groups called "gangs" and fight to control the area.

 They often have special clothes or "colors" to show who is a gang member. Neutral gang colors mean a person is not an enemy of the gang but also not part of the gang.
- (8) Pull out my nine and buff a cap:point my gun and fire a bullet.
- (9)**Below the belt:**a low blow. Arguments can be compared to boxing matches. People "hit" each other with points and insults. In boxing, you cannot hit below the other person's waist ,"below the belt". Fletcher is saying that Audrey really really insulted him.拳击比赛中打到违规的身体部位。
- (10) Rick Rude and Randy Macho-Man Savage: two wrestling competitors.
- (11) Gipper: Jerry's nickname for Max.
- (12) **Deleted:**erased. Fletcher is saying that he has wiped the image of Jerry and Audrey together from his memory. Computers have a delete button and he is speaking as if he were a computer.

Jerry:Oh, you are an angel(1).

Fletcher: Boxes?

Audrey: Yeah. Remember I told you a few weeks ago

Jerry's moving to Boston on Friday.

Fletcher: Oh, right. The job, the thing. So what do you do

again?

Jerry: Hospital administrator.)

Fletcher: Right. Right!

Audrey: Well, the boxes are in my car.

Jerry:Oh, those can wait. I made this young man a promise, didn't I? Got time to throw a few(2)?

Max:Sure.

Jerry: Come on then.

Fletcher: I forgot the boyfriend was moving.

Audrey: Jerry. His name is Jerry. And yes, he's moving. **Fletcher:** I'm sorry. I hated him a lot less than your other

boyfriends. Wasn't serious, was it?

Audrey: Semiserious(3). Yes.

Fletcher: You guys aren't... you know(4)?

Audrey: I've been dating him seven months, what do you

think?

Fletcher: Really! Ooh. I was hoping that after being married to me, you'd have no more strength left.

Audrey: Well you have to remember when we were married, I wasn't having sex nearly as often as you were.

Fletcher: Ouch! The ref. takes a point away (5).

Audrey: Max is gonna(6) miss him.

Fletcher: I'll be here.

Jerry: Ready? Yeah. Play ball.

Fletcher: Max, Come on. We've gotta(7) go.

- (1) You are an angel: You are so nice and kind. 像天使一样。
- (2)Got time to throw a few?:Do you have time to play some baseball together? "Throw a few" means throw some balls.
- (3) Semiserious: Relationships are usually either casual or serious. Serious means a couple are thinking about living together or getting married. "Semiserious" means Audrey's relationship with Fletcher is not casual and yet not serious. Semi means half.
- (4)You guys aren't... you know?:Fletcher is asking if Audrey and Jerry are having sex.凭语感听出字里行间的意思。
- (5) **Takes a point away:** Audrey has hit below the belt (犯规) again. Fletcher is pretending an imaginary referee (裁判员) is keeping score of who is winning the argument.
- (6) gonna: going to.
- (7) gotta:got to.

Fletcher: Absolutely, Max factor. We just have to <u>stop by(1)</u>

the office for one minute.

Beggar: Excuse me, sir. Any spare change(2)?

Fletcher: Oh, I'm sorry. I'm all out(3).

Fred:I can't do it.

Miranda: Fred, it's your duty to present the strongest case possible.

Fred: The strongest case possible, <u>consistent with the truth(4)</u>.

Miranda: Will you let the Judge decide what's true?

That's what he gets paid for. You get paid to win.

Fred:If you insist that I take it to trial, I'll represent Mrs. Cole <u>aggressively and ethically(5)</u>. But, Miranda, I

won't lie.

Miranda: Then we'll just have to find someone who will.

Fletcher: Twenty-first floor, menswear(6).
