

内容提要

本书为大学英语听力教程,同时也可以作为全国大学英语四、六级考试听力专训教材。全书分二十单元,每单元都提供听力技巧。听力内容涉及教育、科技、旅游、环保、运动、社交等。每单元分四大部分:第一部分为分类短句对话;第二部分为口语体的长对话;第三部分为短文听力;第四部分提供了大量的听力回家作业,包括视频和十套四、六级考试新题型听力训练。此外全书配有清晰的听力录音光盘、听力练习答案以及听力材料原文。本书内容丰富,题材新颖,话题贴近学生生活,单元安排循序渐进。

前 PREFA@E 言

根据全国大学英语教学改革的指导思想,大学英语教学更加注重听和说,2005年6月起,全国大学英语四、六级考试在测试项目和内容方面有了重大的调整和变化。最明显的变化是增加了英语听力在考试中的比例,从原来的20%增加到现在的35%。因此,不管从大学英语教学要求,还是从四、六级考试内容比例调整的角度上来看,英语听力都有着举足轻重的作用。

本书作者多年从事大学英语教学实践和测试研究,特别在英语听说技能的训练和培养方面取得了一定的成果。根据作者的实践经验和体会,中国学生在进行诸如英语听力考试时,最大的困难往往有两个方面:一是语言,很难听懂口语体的长短对话。二是技能,不知有效提高英语听力的方法。本书的编者从解决学生以上两个方面的困难或问题着手,通过大量系统性听力练习和注释指导,培养和提高考生英语听力的语言能力和应试技能。

此书分为五大部分:第一部分以选择项回答问题的分类短对话形式为主,如:数字计算、人物身份、地点方向、比较对比、条件关系、内容推断、建议请求和事实细节等方面专项训练;第二部分采用长对话选项回答问题和填空形式;第三部分是短文听力同时配有选项回答问题、简略回答和短文填空的形式;第四部分提供了大量的听力回家作业,包括复合式听写、视频和十套四、六级考试新题型听力训练。这十套试题从形式、难度、题量、要求等方面体现了实际大学英语听力考试的要求。第五部分为听力练习答案以及听力材料原文。

本书每单元配有听力指导和词汇注释,帮助学生应对不同的听力题型、在听音之前预测信息、在听音过程中记录信息、利用常识进行推理和判断、写出正确答案或确定正确选项、系统性地进行常用话题听力理解和熟悉常用词汇及表达法等等。学生通过全书内容的学习和操练,不仅能够巩固和加深理解正常英语听力内容的能力,更重要的是能够大大提高英语听力的技能。

本书由华东理工大学继续教育学院组织编写,该校外国语学院戚元方、李岩、张新、上海市商贸旅游学校赵慧教师共同编写。由于作者水平有限,编写时间仓促,书中肯定会有疏忽和错误之处,敬请广大读者和英语同仁批评指正。
