




引言





As borders close, ugliness is laid bare

BERLIN, Germany — The doors to Western Europe have been slammed shut. The countries that once offered freedom and opportunity to those trapped in the communist east have hung out a new sign: Immigrants stay out.

Meanwhile, the millions of African, Asian, Turkish and Caribbean black immigrants already in Western Europe are facing a new and brutal wave of intolerance. Crimes of racial hatred are rampant, and their viciousness is intensifying.

In Solingen, a manufacturing city in northwestern Germany, neo-Nazi skinheads torched a house in May, killing five Turkish women and girls. At least 30 people, most of them immigrants from non-European countries, have died in Germany in the past 20 months in right-wing violence.

In Britain, Indian and Bangladeshi immigrants claim police have lost control of the streets, so they are forming vigilante street gangs to protect families. They fear marauding neo-Nazi thugs, and their other white neighbors as well.

Fearful clamor arises: Stop the tide

TANAQUILLO, Mexico — Evaristo Duarte doesn't realize he's headed for serious, and growing, hostility.

Wearing designer jeans and a Polo shirt that give him a definite California look, the sapling-thin Mexican is headed back to the USA.

Here's his plan: He'll drop his waiter's job popping caps off Corona bottles in a dirt-floor cantina in Tanaquillo, an adobe village southeast of Guadalajara. Then he'll hop a northbound bus to Tijuana, wait for the 10:30 p.m. shift change by the U.S. Border Patrol, wade across the pollution-poisoned Tijuana River and scoot toward L.A. and a ride to east Los Angeles.


Mexicans such as Duarte know America too well to believe the streets are paved with gold. But they do know *El Norte* means opportunity, a chance to makes five times as much money as can be made at home.

This 34-year-old man with a wispy moustache has gone north scores of times, each time leaving his wife and two children for several months. It is a way of life. His father did it before him; so have his neighbors.





The day the devil smiled



The bombing of Hiroshima, 50 years ago today, defined our century
