自从非英语专业《大学英语教学大纲》颁布以来,全国各高等院校的师生和准备报考硕士研究生的考生都十分关心大学英语四级、六级考试和攻读硕士学位研究生的英语入学考试。为帮助考生按照教学大纲的要求进行全面的复习准备,作者分析研究了近年来大学英语四级、六级考试和研究生入学考试的试题内容、命题特点和考生的突出困难,编写了这本《大学英语练习和测试》,供上述考生使用。考生可以在全面复习的基础上对本书的练习和试题进行重点操练。为培养考生举一反三、触类旁通的能力,作者对练习和试题作了详细的注释,引用了国内外先达们的一些例句和论述,特别是对一些常用词的搭配、用法和辨异,精选了典型的实例,联系语言实际,有的放矢。

本书包括两大部分。第一部分分四章:第一章介词和介词习语;第二章短语动词;第三章同义词、近义词和易混淆词;第四章综合测试练习。第二部分:答案与注释。本书的一大特点是,前三章的全部练习突出词、语的用法,在编排上以重点词的字母顺序排列,并在每题或每组题的左上方列出该重点词。这样,本书前三章实际上是一本大学英语重点词汇用法手册,可供读者随时查阅。本书也可作为 EPT、VST、TOEFL 考生的自学参考材料。

在本书编写过程中,在北京化工学院任教的美国语言专家 Chales Reich 审阅了原稿,提出了许多宝贵的修改意见,在此谨致谢 意。

由于作者水平有限、编写时间仓促, 疏忽和错误之处在所难免, 恳请使用者批评指正。
