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前 言

要想学好一门外语，只是埋头读书历来就不是一个好方法，因为语言中很大一部分知识单从书本上是得不到的。例如：人们的实际发音、讲话节奏和各类口头表达法等，都必须通用过“听”来学习。

《高级英语听力集锦》共分四个单元，其内容各具特色。

第一单元的内容是英国不同地区的人讲述自己难忘的经历，故事曲折，语言自然，讲述生动。讲故事的人运用了只有在日常交往中才使用的、未经事先准备的英语口语。讲话人的语速变化大、轻重音运用自然、表达各种感情时的语调丰富。

第二单元的课文包括讲话、采访和小品。内容集中于社会生活的五个方面：教育、法律、宗教、旅游和语言。学习者从中可多接触一些英语国家文化和社会的各个侧面，以期用扩大知识面的方式来带动听力训练。

第三单元是五篇广播短剧。内容有体育比赛、贸易往来、侦缉毒品、捉拿持枪歹徒和新闻记者的有趣经历等。常听广播剧可使学生有一种在课堂上不易得到的真实感。广播剧中的部分演员稍带有一些典型的地方口音，如果听者注意把这类口音同标准的英美发音相对比，久而久之就可达到学听其它国家的人所讲英语的目的。

第四单元是美国的电视新闻选编。从新闻中获取信息是语言工作者的重要课题，又是难点。新闻报道有它自己的语言特点，常听新闻可增加最新词汇，也是提高听力水平的有效方法。

本书的编排结构可分为三部分：1. 词汇学习；2. 听力练习；3. 课文（录音的文字材料）。本书适用于大学三年级在校学生和具有相当于中上等英语水平的英语爱好者。

编著讲授本书的实践证明：从“听”入手，学到的知识印象深、掌握快。另外，在听的过程中，我们的读、写、说能力也随之得到不同程度的增强。让我们从实际出发，多方面收集语言素材，坚持训练，早日攻克听力这一难关。

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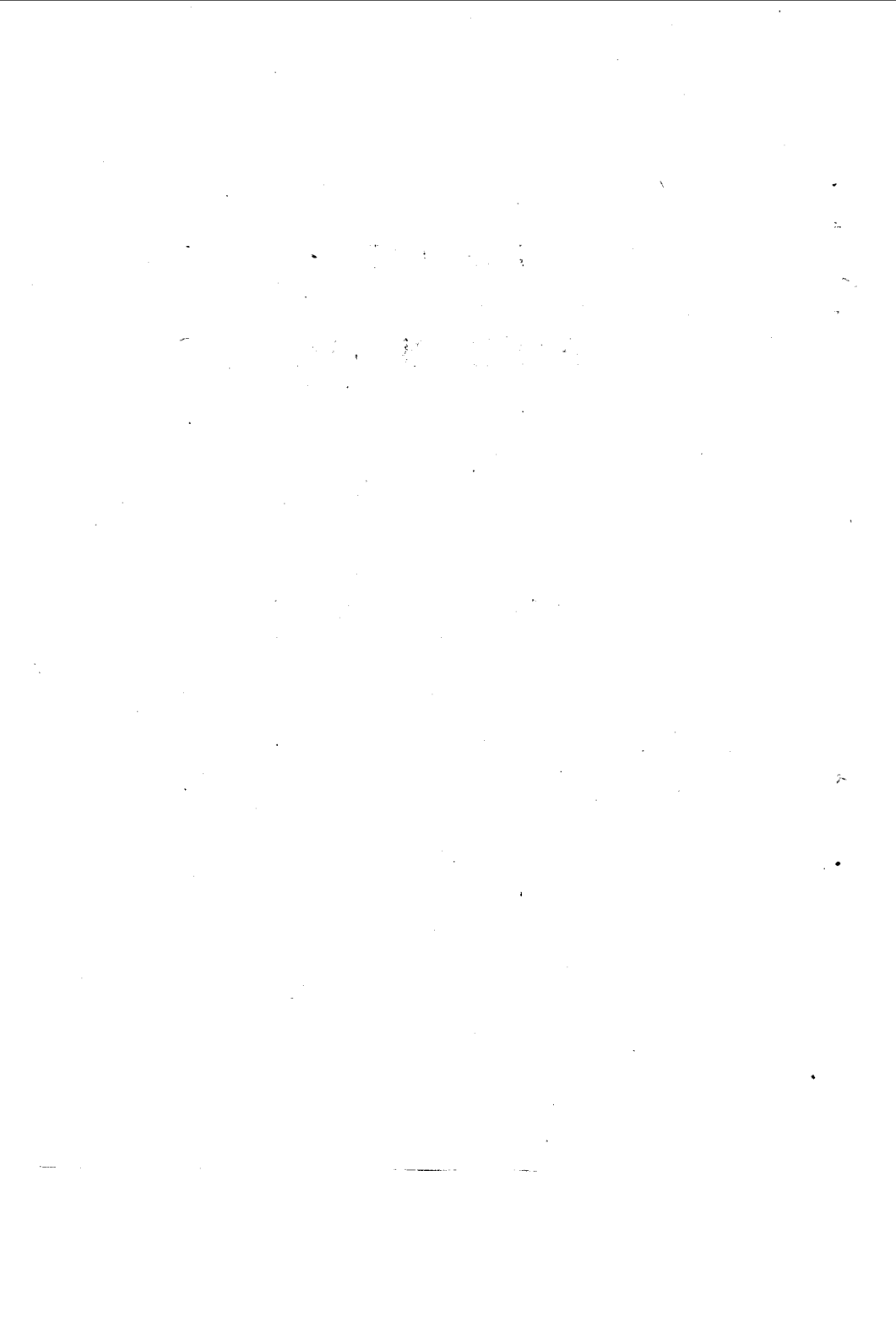
