前言

《企鹅英语语法·惯用法》是《企鹅英语词汇》丛书的一个有益的补充,主要供中级和高级水平读者使用。这本书总共包括750多个常见惯用法,而且正如题目所示,它的重点在于测试而不是教学。总之,这本书是对各种有关惯用法的参考书和辞典的一个有益补充。

本书的风格与《企鹅英语词汇》丛书的保持一致,其中包括各种测试题,从单项选择、纵横字谜、短语及其解释配对、完成句子、改写句子——到图片测试,即为每幅图片选择合适的标题。另外,还有关于表比较意义的短语("as brown as berry")、谚语和有关颜色、身体部位和动物名称等测试题。

《企鹅英语语法•惯用法》可用于教师授课或学生自学。为了方便后者,书后答案还在必要时作了详尽的解释。使用本书,读者会发现短语学习是一件充满挑战和令人愉悦的事情,并且可以逐步培养语感。

致读者

本书将帮助你学习大量的英语词汇。但是要真正掌握新词,必须反复练习。下面这种方法有助于 学习新词:

- 1、先仔细阅读题目,然后开始测试,用铅笔写 出答案。
- 2、做完练习后检查答案并改正错误。再看一遍 练习题,对原来不认识的单词或刚才做错的 习题多加留意。
- 3、5分钟后再次测试。遮住已填的单词或请别 人提问。重复练习直到记住所有单词。
- 4、擦去答案。
- 5、过一天再做一遍。(你应该能记住大部分单词了。)
- 6、最后,在接下来的一个月内再做两遍,这样 所有单词就印在你的脑海中了。
