


你可以在三个地方找到字母"h":





Mum broke the cup by accident.


ache aches

An acorn is a small nut that grows on an oak tree.
Oak trees grow from acorns.

2 When you pretend to be someone in a play or film, you are acting.

active

An **active** person is full of life and is doing something.

actor actors

An **actor** is a man or woman who acts in a play or a film.

actress actresses

A female actor is sometimes called an **actress**.

add adds, adding, added

I If you **add** one thing to another, you put it with something else.

2 If you add numbers, you find out how many they make altogether.

The symbol + means **add**.

One **add** one makes two. 1 + 1 = 2

addition

Addition is what you do when you add numbers or other things together.



adventure adventures

You have an **adventure** when something exciting happens to you.

adverb adverbs

An **adverb** is a word that tells you more about a verb.



The wind blew wildly.

aeroplane aeroplanes

An **aeroplane** is a flying machine that carries people and things.



afraid

When you are **afraid**, you are scared or frightened.

after

Something that is **after** something else is later than it.

I watch television after school.

afternoon afternoons

The **afternoon** is the part of the day between 12 noon and evening.

again

If you do something **again**, you do it once more.

Sarah rang the bell and then she rang it **again**.

against

I If you put a ladder **against** a wall, you put it so close that it touches the wall.

2 If you are playing **against** a team, you are on the other side.

age ages

Your **age** is the number of years you have lived.

ago

Ago means in the past.

Joe started school two years ago.

agree agrees, agreeing, agreed

When you **agree** with someone, you think the same as they do.

The girls agreed to go swimming.

air

Air is made of gases. It is all around but you cannot see it. People must breathe **air** to live.



alien aliens

An **alien** is a creature from another planet.

The aliens arrived in a spaceship.

alike

People or things that are nearly the same are alike. Arun and Ram look alike because they are brothers.



alive

When people, animals and plants are living, they are **alive**.

all

I All means each member or part.All my family came to the wedding.2 All also means the whole of something.

Liz ate all the jelly.

alligator alligators

An **alligator** is a scaly reptile that looks like a crocodile. It lives on land and in water.



alliteration

Using words which begin with the same sound closely together is called **alliteration**.

"Green grass" is an example of alliteration.

allow allows, allowing, allowed

When you **allow** someone to do something, you let them do it.


Kate allowed Peter to use her ruler.

almost

Almost means nearly but not quite. *It was almost 3 o'clock.*

alone

alphabet alphabets

alphabetical

Alphabetical means in the same order as the letters of the alphabet. The words in this dictionary are listed in alphabetical order.

already

Already means before now. I have already had my dinner.

also

Also means as well.

I can swim and dive. I can also skate.

altogether

When you add things up, the answer is what you have **altogether**.

Rasheed has four stickers and Anna has five, so they have nine stickers **altogether**.

always

If something **always** happens, it happens every time.

This bus is always late.

amazing

If something is **amazing**, you are filled with a feeling of great surprise.

ambulance ambulances

An **ambulance** is a special van that takes sick people to hospital.



amount amounts

The **amount** of something is how much of it there is.

There was a huge **amount** of snow on the road.

amphibian amphibians

An **amphibian** is an animal that lives part of its life in water and part on the land. A frog is an **amphibian**.

analogue

The face of an **analogue** clock or watch has numbers

from I to I2. Two hands point to the numbers to tell you the time.



ancient


Ancient means very old or long ago. The Pyramids were built in ancient times.

An **ant** is a tiny insect. **Ants** live in large groups.


antelope antelopes

Anyone is another word for anybody.


anything

April is the fourth month of the year. It has 30 days.


apron aprons

array arrays


An **array** is a group of things set out neatly in columns and rows.



arrive arrives, arriving, arrived When you arrive at a place, you get there.

arrow arrows

- I An arrow is a thin stick with a point at one end and feathers at the other. It is shot from a bow.
- **2** An **arrow** is also a sign that points to something or shows you the way.



art

Art is paintings, drawings and sculptures.

I saw lots of pictures at the art show.

ask asks, asking, asked

I You **ask** someone a question when you want to find the answer.

"When is the party?" Simon asked.

2 You **ask** for something when you want to be given it.

"May I have some pudding?" Amy asked.

asleep

When you are **asleep** your eyes are closed. You do not know what is happening around you.

assembly assemblies

An **assembly** is a group of people meeting together.

We have school assembly every day.

assistant assistants

An **assistant** is someone who helps another person.

astronaut astronauts

An **astronaut** flies in a spacecraft and travels in space.

An **atlas** is a book of maps.

attack attacks, attacking, attacked

When you watch and listen carefully, you are paying **attention**.

attract attracts, attracting, attracted

The people who watch or listen to a concert, film or TV show are the **audience**.

The **audience** laughed at the clowns.



August

August is the eighth month of the year. It has 31 days.

aunt or auntie

Your **aunt** is the sister of your mother or father, or the wife of your uncle.

author authors

An **author** is a person who writes books or plays.

automatic

An **automatic** machine does things on its own.

An **automatic** washing machine washes clothes on its own.

autumn

Autumn is the season between summer and winter. It gets cooler and the leaves fall off many trees.



awake

When you are **awake**, your eyes are open. You know what is happening around you.

away

If you go **away**, you leave the place where you are.

awful

Awful means very bad. Dad had an **awful** cold.

axe axes

An **axe** is a tool with a handle and a sharp metal edge. People chop wood with an **axe**.



baby babies

A baby is a very young child.

back backs

- I The back of something is the opposite side to the front.
- 2 Your back is the part of the body between your neck and your bottom.



backwards

- I If you walk **backwards**, you are walking in the direction that is behind you.
- **2 Backwards** is the opposite way to forwards. If you say the alphabet **backwards**, you start at Z and finish at A.

bacon

Bacon is a kind of meat. It comes from a pig.

We had eggs and bacon for breakfast.

bad worse, worst

- I Something **bad** is not good.
- **2** Food is **bad** when it is too old to eat.

badge badges

A **badge** is a small sign with words and pictures. You wear it on your clothes.

badger badgers

A badger is a wild animal.

It has black and white fur and lives underground. It comes out at night to hunt for food.



bag bags

A **bag** is used to hold things. It can be made of cloth, plastic, paper or leather.

bake bakes, baking, baked
When you bake food, you cook it in an oven.

baker bakers

A **baker** bakes and sells bread and cakes.

balance balances, balancing, balanced

- I When you **balance** something, you keep it steady and stop it from falling.
- **2** A balance is a weighing machine. Put these two parcels on the balance to see which one is heavier.



ball balls

A **ball** is a round object. You can throw, catch, hit, roll or kick it.

ballet

Ballet is a special kind of dancing. It often tells a story.

balloon balloons

A **balloon** is a thin rubber bag. It can be blown up to make it float in the air.



band bands

I A **band** is a group of people who play music together.

2 A **band** is also a narrow strip of something, such as a rubber band.



bang bangs, banging, banged

I A bang is a sudden loud noise. The balloon burst with a bang.

2 When you **bang** something, you hit or shut it noisily.

Harry **banged** the door shut.

bank banks

I People put their money in a **bank** to keep it safe.

2 A **bank** is also the land near the side of a river.

bar bars

I A bar is a long piece of wood or metal.

2 A **bar** is also something made in a rectangular shape, like a **bar** of soap or a **bar** of chocolate.



bare

I Bare means uncovered.

Kim took her shoes off and danced in her bare feet.

2 Bare can also mean empty.

The fridge was **bare** so Mum bought some more food.

bargain bargains

A **bargain** is something that is worth more than you pay for it.

bark barks, barking, barked

I The **bark** of a tree is the hard part that covers its trunk.

2 A dog that **barks** makes a short, loud sound.

barn barns

A **barn** is a large building on a farm. Farmers store their crops in **barns**.

base

The **base** is the bottom part of something.

The boys camped at the **base** of the mountain.
