there was a serious drought in this area *as was the case* in many other parts of the province, and yet the commune managed to increase production *as though* it were a normal year. The reasons for this miracle were very simple: the commune did not neglect any aspect of its work, *whether* ideological or technical, and carried it out strictly according to the directives of the Party; it did not *brush aside* the criticisms or suggestions of its members, *even if* they were put forward by a small minority, so the production drive of every member was stimulated and each team *vied with* the others to produce more grain. Thus with the correct leadership of the Party and reliance on the collective wisdom of the masses and the active spirit of every member, their drive to produce more grain *was crowned* with success. The work of this commune, in fact, *throws light on* the secret of all our successes. *Just as* this commune defeated nature to boost grain production, so can we in every branch of work overcome all difficulties and forge triumphantly ahead.

Since 1921 when he joined and helped set up the Communist Party of the United States, Comrade Foster had held aloft the banner of Marxism-Leninism, made unrelenting efforts to strengthen the unity of the ranks of the American communists, and become an outstanding fighter and leader of the C.P.U.S.A. In order to safeguard the purity of Marxism-Leninism and consolidate the unity of the Party, he persistently carried on, in his own ranks, struggles against revisionism and dogmatism. He had at three crucial times united and led the whole Party in waging struggles against revisionism to protect the Party, namely, the struggle against Jay Lovestone's theory of "American exceptionalism" in 1927—1929, the struggle in 1944—1945 against the right opportunism of Earl Browder's leadership which abolished the Party and regarded American capitalism as "progressive capitalism", and the struggle against the revisionist splitting activities under the leadership of John Gates in 1956—1957. He strongly opposed the viewpoint that the aggressive American imperialism is "omnipotent", "benevolent" and a people's regime "full of the spirit of altruism". He pointed out that it was a serious mistake either to underestimate the reactionary nature of American imperialism or to overestimate its strength. He made tireless studies of the revolutionary working-class movements of the United States, combined the universal truth of Marxism-Leninism with the concrete practice of these movements

and earnestly observed all the problems that history presented before the American working-class and its vanguard. It is precisely because of this that he had full confidence in the future development of the Communist Party of the United States.

Comrade Foster devoted his whole life to the emancipation of the American working-class, to the future well-being of the American people and to a lasting peace. He will live for ever in the hearts of the progressive mankind and the Chinese people. The Chinese people will always stand side by side with the American people and all the other peoples of the world who love freedom, yearn for peace and strive for social progress; they will persist till peace and socialism is won throughout the world in the struggle against the U.S. imperialist policies of war and aggression and for world peace, national liberation, democracy, freedom and socialism.
