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叢書總序

香港許多人都熱衷於學習英語,因為英語應用 範圍廣泛,方便與外國工商貿易、文化交往:也有 助於個人進修、吸收新科技資訊。但是一般英語學 習者在學了不少入門知識,作了許多聽、讀、講、 寫的練習之後,往往仍然感到不能真正掌握和通曉 英語,還需要想辦法進一步提高自己的英語水平。

本叢書就是為這些英語讀者設計的。它從英語的各個方面如詞彙、句子、成語、諺語、書信、翻譯等,都作了有系統的、由淺入深的介紹,同時除了介紹語言知識之外,還特別注意指出有關的西方生活、文化知識和準確而地道的説法,使讀者在原有的基礎上能再進一步。

本叢書為了適應香港讀者繁忙的生活和工作, 特別採取每日學一點的形式,文字力求淺白,內容 盡量簡明:有分析、有實例:小開本,加插圖,使 讀者可以利用自己的零碎時間,隨時隨地學習,輕 鬆愉快地在增添英語知識和加強運用能力兩個方面 都有所收穫。

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前 言

"成語"是指一種語言中長期以來習用的、表達 完整意義的、結構相對固定的詞組或短句。任何~~ 種語言都存有許多成語,英語中的成語尤為豐富。 成語有兩個主要特徵:語義上的完整性和結構上的 固定性。一個成語是一個語義單位,表達一個完整 的意思,但它的意義卻不能只從它所包含的單詞的 字面意義去推測。例如 under the weather 意為"身 體不適",這和"under"、"weather"的意義都沒有 關係:結構上的固定性指的是:一個成語中的詞不 能隨意改動或增減,例如 under the weather 就不 能改為 below the weather, put on airs 就不能説成 put on air。這兩個特徵顯然給學習者造成困難, 因為,學習一個成語就必須死記硬背,記住它的構 成,記住它的意義。但另一方面,成語又十分有 趣,因為,和任何語言中的成語一樣,英語中的成 語並不是英語的使用者生拼硬造的,而是在長期的 生活過程中自然地、漸漸地產生、沿用,最終固定 下來的,因此,不少成語的背後都有一個和社會生 活、民族文化有關的故事。由此可知,能恰如其份 地運用成語無疑會使我們的語言表達得更確切和更 牛動。

迄今為止,英語成語手冊、成語辭典,乃至成語大全之類的書已經出了不少,而這本只收了三百八十五個英語成語的小冊子有甚麼特色和優點呢?

首先,本書有着明確的對象,即具有中等英語水平的讀者,故在編寫過程中,我始終以照顧這層次讀者的特定水平和需要為大前題:其二,本書所收的三百六十五個成語是從英語幾千個成語中挑選出來的,其中剔除了那些用得過濫和那些過於冷僻的,有強烈地方色彩的成語,故可以說,所選取的成語和與方色彩的成語,故可以說,所選取的成語,有關英語成語中的"核心"部分:三,本書不僅清楚解每個成語的意義和出處,而且更通過簡明易增的例句來展示如何使用該成語,並指出在使用時容易發生的錯誤:四,全書文字台灣大學,以談到輕數人類切之餘,也加快吸收的速度。

總而言之,我的意圖是把這小冊子寫成為一本 集知識性和趣味性於一身,適合中等水平讀者口味 和需要的工具書。它"一日一篇"的編排方式能方便 讀者在繁忙的、節奏逼促的生活中抽出片刻空暇來 日讀一篇,化整為零:同時,它也可以作為英語學 習者的一本案頭書,隨時查用。
