编者的话

近几年来,不但社会上出现了学习英语的热潮,在广大中 小学中, 英语课的学习也打开了新局面。不少学校除了进行 课堂教学外,还开展了各种形式的生动活泼的课外活动,排演 英语短剧尤其受到广大学生的欢迎。我们长期从事英语教学 工作,深知排演英语短剧对学生英语学习的补益,也有不少同 行向我们索取这方面的材料,因此将我们平日为学生编写的 若干英语短剧和小品重加整理,汇集成集。其中有创作,也 有败写。这些短剧难易程度适合于中小学学生水平,与中小 学 英语课的内容有所结合,这当中就有一部分是根据教材改 写的。通过排练及表演,可以直接收到巩固课堂知识的效果。 语言经在京工作的英、美语言专家们审阅,形式短小活泼,适 于排练。在编写过程中,我们根据一般水平读者的需要,对剧 中出现的一些语言现象做了注解,重点放在句型和习惯用语 上,这样,社会上自学英语的初学者, 也可以以此扩大词汇量 和语言方面的知识面。由于我们水平有限,在剧本中可能会 出现考虑不周之处,望广大读者给以批评指正。

内容简介

本书包括二十多个英语短剧和小品,按由易到难的顺序排列,内容丰富有趣,语言简练,形式短小活泼,是激发学习外语的兴趣、 开展英语课外活动的必备材料。中、小学生以及大学英语起始班的 学生都可以从中找出适当的节目进行排演。

在编写过程中,作者照顾了中学英语课本的词汇和语法,与某些课文也有所接合,因此此书也可用做中学英语教学的辅助材料,作者对篇中房出现的习惯用语、重要句型以及重要语法现象等均做了注解,难字注有音标,以便自学阅读。

The Blind Men and the Elephant

Characters: the elephant-driver

six blind men: A, B, C, D, E and F

Scene: A street in a small town in India.

(When the curtain rises, the six blind men are standing by the roadside. They beg from the passengers. Before long an elephant is driven along the road. The elephant driver is crying, "Make way, Dease. Make way, please.")

A: Kind sir, would you please give us some food?

Driver: Sorry. I'm but an elephant driver. I have no spare food for you.

B: Didn't you say that you're an elephant driver?

Driver: Yes.

C: I hear the elephant is a huge animal, isn't it?

Driver: Yes. In fact, it's the largest animal in the world.

D: Really? What a pity we can't see it.

E: I don't care what the beast looks like if only I can feel it.

Figure 1. That's a good idea. Excuse me, Mister Driver, but may I touch your elephant?

Driver: Why? Certainly. Everyone of you can feel it if you like.

A: Thank you. It's really very kind of you. Oh, fellows, let me try first.

(A begins to feel the elephant. He happens to put his hand on the elephant side.)

A: Well, now I know all about this beast. He is like a wall.

(B begins to feel the elephant. He feels about the elephant's tusk.)

B: My brother, you're quite mistaken. He is not at all like a wall. He is round and smooth and sharp. He is more like a spear than anything else.

(C begins to feel the elephant. He happens to take hold of the elephant's trunk.)

Both of you are entirely wrong. Anybody who knows anything can see that this elephant is like a snake.

(D is very short and he reaches out his arms, and grasps one of the elephant's legs.)

D: Oh, how blind you are! It is very plain to me that he is round and tall like a tree.

(E is a very tall man. He happens to take hold of the elephant's ear.)

E: The blindest man ought to know that this elephant is not like any of the things you name. He is exactly like a huge fan.

(F feels his way for some time before he can find the elephant. At last he gets hold of the elephant's tail.) Oh, silly fellows! You surely have lost your senses. The elephant is not like a wall or a spear, or a snake, or a tree, neither is he like a fan. But any man with a little sense can see that he is exactly like a rope.


Driver: Oh, fellows! Now you've felt the beast in turn.

(They both get into the cart. The curtain draws. The cart, which is full of people now comes in front of the cur-
