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Opening Address

Vice Premier of the State Council of China

Today, on the occasion of its centennial celebration of Peking University, presidents from prestigious universities around the world are gathering here in Beijing to attend the Forum on Higher Education of the 21st Century. I am very pleased to have the opportunity to meet with you, and I wish this symposium a great success.

Ever since the beginning of civilization, education has become increasingly important in human life. Although originated in Medieval Europe, university, as a flower of human wisdom, did not perish with the ending of the Middle Ages. Rather, it is flourishing and brimming with vitality, having drawn the essence from different cultures and traditions. Education has come to be a fundamental force in human existence and social progress.

University is an old institution. Some traditions established by scholars in Bologna, Paris and Oxford are still existing as of today. Ancient buildings on campus and timehonored academic principles all remind us of the past with deep veneration. University is also a young institution. It is not confined by traditions, but constantly renovates itself in order to keep abreast of our time and stay at the forefront of knowledge innovation to fulfill its historical missions.

Although China has a long history of education, modern universities in China were born and grows in the process of learning from the West, and developed with its base deeply rooted in our cultural and educational traditions. For over two thousand years, knowledge has been accumulated and developed in a unique way to become part of our own scholastic traditions. One hundred years ago, modern universities first appeared in China. As one of the earliest higher education institutions, Peking University has made significant contribution to the advancement of knowledge and promotion of academic and social progress for our country.

The core of higher learning is scholarship and people. The trend of academic division and specialization emerged in the 19th century. The division of academic disciplines has enabled each field of learning to develop in an efficient and innovative way. While it has undoubtedly promoted the development of knowledge, it has also led to segmentation of knowledge system, which resulted in a lack of communication, separation and even prejudice among different academic fields. A German scientist Max Planck once argued that science is an inherent unity. The fact of its being divided into separated branches is not due to its nature, but to the limitation of human cognition. Modern science and technology are progressing in a constant division and synthesis, where new findings often

occur at marginal or overlapping areas. Future economic well-beings will very much rely upon sustainable development. People are becoming increasingly concerned about issues such as population, environment, ecology, energy and space, which can not be resolved by any single discipline, but will require cooperation and concerted efforts across academic boarders and social sectors. In the future, society will need people not only specialize in a field or trade, but also have the ability to learn new knowledge and skills in order to adapt to the changes of economic and societal demand, and be familiar with the whole process of production. Learning a specific subject shall not pull our students closer to the classics and distant to the contemporary, nor should it mislead them to embrace science while neglect arts. It is crucial to foster a constant communication across academic boundaries so that they can be complimentary, mutually beneficial and cooperative. Universities have an important role to play in bridging the past and future, science and arts, theory and practice, individual and society.

At the dawn of the 21st century, we are facing with both challenges and opportunities of the future. It is commonly recognized that knowledge, including science and technology, will play an unprecedented role ever in the history of human civilization. Our government believes that a modernized China must build on education, and that education must serve the goal of modernization. *Invigorating China through science and education* has become the strategic priority for the nation. We can predict that higher education in China will make enormous contribution to our national development in the next century.

As a developing country, China's modernization drive is a long-term process. It is important to acknowledge that development across its vast territory is uneven. We can not talk about our higher education without noting this reality. Today, higher education is no longer an isolated system. Its development increasingly hinges upon the needs and support from its external environment. Changes in the mode of economic growth call upon not only quantitative growth of higher education institutions, but also improvement in structure, quality, and efficiency. China runs a large higher education system, with over one thousand universities and colleges, one thousand adult higher learning institutions, and a total student body of six million. However, the share number does not readily translate into quality. In the next century, we will aspire to build a number of world-class universities, which will undertake the missions of training creative people, promoting knowledge innovation, technology transfer, and strengthening ties and exchanges with other countries.

China is now in a crucial period of development. The goal of our reform is to bring modernization to 1.2 billion people. This is a gigantic project unparalleled in history. The magnitude, complexity and difficulties of the task are enormous. Clearly, we can not respond to these and many other challenges without depending on our universities and people they educate. We have reasons to expect that China's universities will become centers not only for knowledge creation and innovation, but also practical strategies and solutions to problems that China and the rest of the world face. Most importantly, higher education will further contribute to our modernization drive and revitalization of the

nation.

Peking University has one hundred years behind it. Few universities in China enjoy such a long history, which is why we often call Peking University an old university. The very presence of so many university presidents at its centenary brings new glory to its proud history. It also provides an excellent opportunity for university presidents around the globe to meet each other.

If we look at international higher education community as a big family, each university is a member who lives and interacts with each other in this family. Today's forum speaks to the very nature of this relationship and bondage. I believe that this gathering will deepen our mutual understanding and friendship, open up more opportunities for future exchanges and cooperation, and contribute to a brighter future for the mankind.
