

PREFACE TO FIRST EDITION

Fifteen years ago, Professor George P. Murdock began to assemble a classified world-wide ethnographic bibliography. In 1941, the section of this bibliography on North America was published as Volume 1 of the Yale Anthropological Studies. When the present author came to Yale in 1932, Professor Murdock turned over to him the material he had gathered on the East Indies, and this became the base for the comprehensive bibliography presented here. The author has examined all the East Indian publications in the Yale University Library, and has also surveyed the collections in the Library of Congress and other leading American libraries. With the assistance of a grant from the Institute of Human Relations at Yale, he spent the summer of 1938 in the Netherlands, working on the library collections there. It is quite certain, therefore, that the bibliography here published represents a close approximation to complete coverage of all extant books and periodical articles concerning the peoples and cultures of Indonesia.

Several bibliographical works on this area have been published, the most exhaustive one being the great Repertorium op de literatuur betreffende de Nederlandsche koloniën, which lists all publications issued between 1595 and 1932. Dr. Robert Heine-Geldern has prepared a selected bibliography on Southeast Asia, including the Indies, which will be published soon by the American Council of Learned Societies. The Netherlands Study Unit at the Library of Congress in Washington has an extensive card catalogue of all works on Holland and the Netherlands overseas territories which have been published since 1930.

The main focus of interest in the present bibliography is anthropology and sociology, including ethnography, archeology, linguistics, and studies of acculturation. But many books and articles on geography, colonial administration, education, economics, and history have been incorporated, because of their pertinence to the anthropology and sociology of the area. Moreover, standard references on geology, botany, zoology, and kindred subjects have been listed, for their value in illuminating the human and cultural scene. Mainly, however, the bibliography concentrates upon the peoples and cultures of the Indies.

The general plan of classification is by islands or island groups, and within these by peoples and tribes or tribal complexes. This method of classification seems preferable to one by political divisions, since, in most instances, the social and cultural groupings do not follow administrative lines of demarcation. The references within each section are subdivided by language, into those printed in Dutch and those in languages other than Dutch. This device is employed for the practical purpose of enabling the great majority of readers who do not understand Dutch to find references in languages they do understand without having to search through a mass of Dutch titles. Another purely technical device is the

indicating, by asterisks, of books, periodicals, and articles which are not in the Yale collection. The reason for this is that Yale has the most complete Indonesian ethnographic library in the United States, and probably the most complete one in the world outside the Netherlands and the Indies. It would have been desirable to mention where materials which are not at Yale can be found in other American libraries, but the labor involved in such investigation would have delayed publication by a considerable length of time.

The eight main divisions used are: Indonesia (general), Sumatra, Java, Borneo, Celebes, the Lesser Sundas, the Moluccas, and Netherlands New Guinea. Within each of the four large islands, the references are classified by people, tribe, or tribal complex (e.g., within Java: Javanese, Sundanese; within Sumatra: Batak, Minangkabau); and, where their numbers are sufficiently large to warrant special treatment, minority groups are separately classified (e.g., within Java: Chinese, Arabs). The smaller islands of the Lesser Sundas and the Moluccas are subdivided by islands or clusters of islands (e.g., Bali, Ambon Islands). Netherlands New Guinea (including adjacent islands) has not been subdivided, because the tribes and tribal complexes there have not yet been properly defined. Titles which do not fit in the subdivisions have been placed at the beginning of each major division under the heading "General." Here the reader will find the items on archeology, classical literature, and history.

The accompanying maps show the location of all places and groups listed. An alphabetical key has also been added as an aid in using the table of contents and to enable the reader to find references to islands and tribes which are not listed in the table of contents.

The references are listed alphabetically by author's surname, and thereunder by title. Place and date of publication are indicated in all except a few instances where the books were not available to the author for examination and information could not be obtained from any other readily accessible source.

PREFACE TO THE REVISED EDITION

Four years after its publication the first edition of this bibliography was out of print. The continuing demand for a reprint and the large number of publications on Indonesia appearing since 1945 pointed up the widely felt need for this expanded revised edition.

Although numerous recommendations for changes in classification and coverage were considered, limitations in funds and personnel made it necessary to adhere to the original form of the bibliography. It was felt, however, that the classification of titles by area and language is still useful for most purposes of scholars of the area. The new titles that have been added to this edition therefore are arranged alphabetically within the original order. Areas are indicated by running heads and a few smaller islands have been regrouped. A section on bibliographical material has been added.

One of the most difficult problems confronting the editors was to decide what books and articles to include in a bibliography whose main topic is anthropological. The first edition represented by no means a complete coverage of anthropological titles on Indonesia. While the revised edition can not claim to be exhaustive either, we do believe that the current effort has resulted in a notably more comprehensive bibliography than any other in its field and subject matter. In keeping with Kennedy's original intent and practices his general policy was followed as closely as possible and his criteria for selecting titles were used. The obvious question arises where, in a rapidly growing modern nation, the lines should be drawn between the fields related to the anthropologist's interest bearing upon culture change and acculturation and those of economics, administration, education, urban development, etc. It was decided to leave out most references pertaining to modern political and economic matters. If a bias appears in such decisions it is admittedly an anthropological one.

An obvious remaining gap is the sparsity of listed Indonesian publications. Pressure of time and lack of funds prevented the extensive research in Indonesia which would have been required to fill it. Sources in other languages, Swedish, Danish, Japanese are likewise not adequately covered.

With regard to publications on language, especially dictionaries, grammars, etc., titles designating the language as 'Malay' were arranged under Sumatra-Malay. However, since Indonesian is a new national language, publications referring to 'Indonesian' are listed under Indonesia-General.

In addition to listing recent publications in the revised edition an attempt was made to fill in some important omissions in the first edition and to correct errors. Several collected works such as those of Adriani, Kern and Wilken have been extracted and references were cited together with the original journal in which an article appeared. Likewise, many articles by different writers which appeared in book form were listed separately by author, area and language. Individual volumes of the Adatrechtbundels covering different regions of Indonesia were listed for the ethnic groups to which most of their content pertains.

One of the sections of the original bibliography most heavily criticized for its classification is Borneo. Kennedy was well aware of the problems involved in making a satisfactory division of peoples inhabiting this island. In spite of recent helpful suggestions for a regrouping of some Borneo peoples, it is felt that a more definitive classification of the whole island is needed before a revised classification can be justified.

A departure from the original edition is found in the omission of the admittedly inadequate section on Western New Guinea. This area has been thoroughly covered in the extensive bibliography (mimeographed) by K.W. Galis, which the Human Relations Area Files hopes to issue as a separate publication in the near future.

This edition was prepared under sponsorship and with funds from the Yale Southeast Asia Studies.

The Yale Anthropology Department, publisher of the first edition, generously transferred all publication rights in the original to the Southeast Asia Studies for issue of this revised edition in the Human Relations Area Files Series.

The Yale Southeast Asia Studies were fortunate in obtaining the assistance of the Director and staff of the Volkenkundig Instituut of the University of Utrecht, Netherlands, whose extensive bibliographical file was made available for the new edition. Specialists on the area, libraries and other institutions offered their help in collecting titles. A great deal of work was done in the Yale University Library which has continued to add to its outstanding Indonesian collection. Since titles were obtained from many different sources and since a great number of books have been acquired by the Yale library since 1945, the first edition's use of asterisks--indicating references not available at the Yale library--has been discontinued. Efforts were made to examine personally as many works as possible.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS:

The editors wish to express their indebtedness and thanks to the many individuals and institutions who assisted in the preparation of this edition. Miss E. Nahuijsen listed and classified the titles which were made available by the Volkenkundig Instituut of the University of Utrecht. Mr. P. PREFACE TO SECOND REVISED EDITION

This new edition of Kennedy's Indonesian bibliography is substantially the same as the first revised edition of 1955. No new titles have been added. The format has been changed to allow publication in a single volume and the usefulness of the bibliography has been enhanced by the addition of asterisks opposite the more important and crucial titles. This latter task was accomplished by Robert J. Theodoratus, Research Associate at the Human Relations Area Files.
