### INTRODUCTION

Until recently, American education has been oriented to its occidental heritage and experience. However, shifts in our relations with Asian countries have encouraged educators to develop a better general understanding of Oriental cultures rather than producing a limited number of Asian experts. As a result, more colleges and high schools are offering courses in non-Western cultures and history. Unfortunately, academic and public libraries serving these undergraduates and high school students do not, in most cases, have the staff to make the most advantageous selection of supportive materials from the many published about Asia. It is hoped that this bibliography of approximately 4,000 books about China and its peoples will be a step toward alleviating this situation.

The bibliography is divided into twenty-one general topics listing books; in addition it contains a section of periodical sources. Where the number of titles make an alphabetical listing cumbersom and inefficacious, the general heading is subdivided by subject or time period. For example, the section listing juvenile books, included for teachers and future teachers, is basically a fiction/non-fiction listing. Library of Congress subject headings were utilized in placing works within all subject categories.

Each item within the bibliography has a unique item number. These numbers are arranged sequentially except for the addition of certain recent additions which are given an extra digit—for example, 0515, 05151, 0516. The author-title index refers to these numbers. The omission of a number occurs when an item proved unsuitable on closer inspection and was deleted. In addition, the list of numbers found at the end of most sections indicate works located under other subjects but still relevant to the subject of that section. However, no references have been made from the General works, the Biography and the Bibliography sections because of their nature; titles labeled general or biography works could be referred to from many sections, and titles within the bibliography section should be used by any one seeking additional sources. As no classification scheme is perfect the user is also advised to check in obviously related sections for works within their field of interest.

Works in the English language are predominant. However, titles in western languages other than English are included either because they are considered "classics" in their field or because the number of works in a given field is so limited that a non-English title gains special importance. Various editions of translations of Chinese works are also listed. Because of the nature of the classical Chinese language and the classical literary style, the person and personality of the

translator has a great opportunity to intrude upon the translation. Therefore, special efforts have been made to include the translator of Chinese works rendered into English. Other translators and editors are indicated where possible.

The inclusion of a number of older titles in reprint editions in a basic guide of this type may be questionable, especially in certain fields such as science, politics, and history. Though in some of these cases more recent research may have rendered their data almost useless, their value lies in the fact that they are "period pieces" reflecting the attitudes and beliefs of the times. In other cases, the work has simply not been superseded or deals with a subject not yet given wide attention by modern scholars. Reprint editions are noted by placing the date of the original publication in parenthesis after the reprint date.

Since every library (or individual) has monetary limitations, an attempt is made to identify about 200 basic titles which should be held by even the smallest library. The criteria for selection was based primarily upon proven usefulness in providing the broadest possible general understanding for the serious but uninitiated student. These titles are generally solid scholarly works with readability. Though some titles are text-bookish, they provide a broad historical coverage. Collections and compilations listed provide maximum coverage for the expense. Titles which present new or different points of view or lead the way into new fields of research are emphasized. Obviously 200 titles so subjectively selected will be opened to dispute and will not satisfy everyone's needs. However, they should provide a reasonably reliable basic library for research as well as recreational reading.

An appendix near the end of this book lists the item numbers of these basic works.
