

#### FOREWORD

EUROPEAN domination in Malaya began with the Portuguese conquest of Malacca in 1511, continued with the Dutch capture of that part in 1641 and entered its last phase with the British leasing of Penang from Kedah in 1786, buying the island of Singapore from Johore, taking over Malacca from the Dutch and, during the last seventy odd years, protecting and administering at first four and later nine Malay States. On 31 August, 1957, with the goodwill of the protector and the protected, Malaya was declared independent and European domination came to an end. It was a fitting moment for the British Association of Malaya to sponsor the compilation of a bibliography of works on the country, articles and books nearly all written by Europeans from d'Albuquerque's druggist, Tomé Pires, down to the present day.

Great Britain brought Malaya prosperity unequalled in Asia by the development of the tin industry and the introduction of Para rubber. But behind that splendid façade lies the work of obscure officials and unofficials, botanists, mineralogists, medical doctors and educationists, whose research and efforts have helped to create the modern scene. Even the history of their own past was learnt by the Malays from European scholars and the knowledge acquired contri-

buted to their spirit of nationalism.

So many of the pamphlets and articles on Malaya have been published locally, that the Association have been fortunate to find in Mr. Cheeseman, one with a knowledge of Malaya's libraries and one ready to undertake a laborious task as a labour of love which the British have always felt for the country and its peoples. The result of his toil should be a boon to all those interested in South-east Asia and of the greatest value to librarians.

#### PREFACE

The compilation of this Classified List was begun in 1955 at the request of the President (then Mr. E. D. Shearn) of the British Association of Malaya. From that Association I have received much help. Mr. H. P. Bryson, M.C., the Secretary, was indefatigable in checking all the draft sheets and in undertaking a multitude of enquiries, in which he had much ready assistance from the staff of the Westminster City Central Reference Library. He, too, compiled the index and helped a great deal with the revision and the constant additions to the list.

For this compilation, in the first place all the available lists included in the section 'Bibliographies and Lists' were consulted. The next step was research in those three libraries with Malayan sections to which I have access, namely Malaya House, the Royal Commonwealth

Society and the London Library.

By the courtesy of the Commissioner for Malaya (Enche' M. Othman) a detailed examination of the Malaya House Library, one of the best, if not the best, Malayan collections, was made possible. This work was greatly facilitated by the help received from the

Commissioner's Secretary, Miss Hilda Laggett.

When the draft lists were completed, copies were sent to libraries in Malaya and to leading libraries with Malayan sections in the United States and Australia. The Penang and Singapore libraries, each well known to me as possessing a Malayan section not far behind that of Malaya House, regretted that paucity of staff prevented help in checking the draft lists but offered access to their books to anyone willing to help. Such help was given by a number of former colleagues, chief among them my friend and former pupil and colleague, Mr. Lim Chong Hum.

The University of Malaya Library and the Washington Library of Congress were most helpful. The University Librarian went to much trouble both in checking the lists and in collecting additions from various Departments of the University. The Library of Congress, besides checking the lists, advised regarding classification. It ought, however, to be stated that the compiler alone is responsible both for the classification that has been adopted and for the absence of certain bibliographic details, such as pagination, the desirability of their

inclusion being realized too late for them to be collected.

Help in checking the draft lists was also received from the official Federation departments of Agriculture, Education, Forestry and Museums. For the lists, too, substantial additions were obtained from the Journals of the Straits Branch (S.B.R.A.S.) and the Malayan Branch (M.B.R.A.S.) of the Royal Asiatic Society, and of the more recently established (April 1953) Malayan Historical Society. The S.B.R.A.S. Journals were begun in 1878 (the year in which the Straits Asiatic Society, formed on 4 November, 1877, was affiliated to the Royal Asiatic Society) and these Journals, and the M.B.R.A.S. Journals, with their wealth of information, have been invaluable, since important papers as well as books are included in the lists.

Enquiries were addressed to a number of individual experts on Malaya, past and present. All these helpers are too numerous to be named. But, as would be expected, Sir Richard Winstedt heads the list. Five others who must be mentioned are Dr. Victor Purcell, Dr. R. E. Holttum, Dr. F. E. Wood, Mr. J. C. Sharp and Mr. L. M. Harrod (of Raffles Library, Singapore). The list 'Second World War in Malaya' owes much to Mr. J. C. Sharp, who also collected additions for a number of other lists. In fairness to Dr. Holttum, it should be mentioned that, while regretting that he lacked the time to undertake its improvement, he drew emphatic attention to the inadequacy of the Plant section. For that section to be comprehensive, some long and arduous research would clearly be involved. With no expert in sight to undertake this, the publication of the lists might have been held up indefinitely, while waiting for the help that would be essential. Accordingly, it was decided that it would be best to leave the Plant section as it is, with the hope that at some time in the future an expert will be found to complete the task. The list, as given, does, however, supply information regarding all available sources, though all these sources are not drawn upon fully, as, for example, no articles from the Gardens Bulletin are cited, on account of lack of expert advice as to selection.

A very special word of thanks is due to Mr. John Galvin, without whose financial support this bibliography could not have been

published.
