

Notes on the Contributors

Yonah Alexander (US) is Professor of International Studies and Director of the Institute for Studies in International Terrorism at the State University of New York at Oneonta and, concurrently, Research Associate at the Center for International and Strategic Studies at Georgetown University. He is editor-in-chief of Terrorism: An International Journal. He is editor of International Terrorism: National, Regional, and Global Perspectives (1976) and co-editor of Terrorism: Interdisciplinary Perspectives (1977) and of Terrorism: Theory and Practice (1979).

Clive C. Aston (Canadian) is a Ph.D. candidate at the University of London. His thesis is provisionally entitled 'The Social Impact of Political Hostage-Taking in Europe since 1968'. He was awarded a B.A. degree by the University of British Columbia in 1975 and an M.Sc. degree by the University of London in 1977.

Jillian Becker (British) is author of Hitler's Children: The Story of the Baader-Meinhof Terrorist Gang (1977). This work has been translated into French, German, Dutch, Danish, Norwegian, Spanish, Portuguese and Japanese. On the subject of terrorism she has in addition published numerous articles, given lectures and has broadcast on radio and television to many part of the world. She is also a novelist with a special interest in South African themes.

1 Summary of Discussions

William F. Gutteridge

Introduction

The seventh course of the International School on Disarmament and Research on Conflicts took place at Ariccia in Italy between 18 and 27 August 1978. A major concern of the course was violence at the sub-state level with particular reference to those groups which have defined political objectives and thus may be termed 'rational rebels'. What follows is a summary of the main lines of the discussion.

In open states, such as the United States, arms are relatively readily accessible and movement is more or less free, and this facilitates the organisation of violence. The Communist countries and even most of the Third World have so far been relatively immune, perhaps because repression of dissent there is usually more thorough.

An important consideration is whether the violence is linked with some kind of nationalist issue, for example, the Basque movement in Spain, or the troubles in Ulster. Groups employing violent methods, including especially national liberation movements, arise from perceptions of what the nation should be and is not. Rural guerilla warfare and urban terrorism, as in the Basque case, may be blended together.

Today, with the development of communications and relative ease of travel, operations often take place outside the country in question. This occurred on a small scale even before the days of trans-frontier travel by air. But the present trend is sharply upward. Recently, Iraqi and Palestine Liberation Organization
