PREFACE

This volume continues the series of guides to manuscripts in European languages in the British Isles prepared by the School of Oriental and African Studies. The first, containing material on South and South-East Asia, was published in 1965, the second, on Africa, in 1971. It is the intention to complete the series with a volume for the Near and Middle East which is under preparation.

The Far East, or East Asia, which furnishes the scope for the present work, is taken as consisting of the vast land mass of China and the adjacent territories of Japan, Korea, and the uttermost eastern parts of the Soviet Union. Tibet was included in the South and South-East Asia volume.

The bulk of the material was collected by Dr. Wainwright and Dr. Matthews in the three years ending in 1965 in the course of a programme of visits to all likely repositories in England, Scotland, Wales, Northern Ireland, and Eire. After writing up notes on the appropriate collections or items found, these were submitted for comments to those in charge of the library or archives depository. Many of these custodians were good enough to correct the entries for their institutions and to suggest for inclusion additional material, overlooked at the time of the first search.

In addition to the information collected by Wainwright and Matthews and the calendars, catalogues, and lists compiled and published by the several libraries, archives, and museums, a number of works of a general character has been drawn on:

Leslie R. Marchant, A Guide to Archives and Records of Protestant Christian Missions from the British Isles to China, 1796–1914 (University of Western Australia Press, 1966).

Rosemary Keen, A Survey of Archives of Selected Missionary Societies (Church Missionary Society, London, 1968).

The undersigned has attempted to bring up to date the material collected by Doctors Wainwright and Matthews. Although not possessed of the resources and time to repeat their visits or to circularize all likely repositories, he has been able to add much new material brought to notice through the examination of many catalogues and surveys published since 1965. It has also proved profitable to work through the geographical indexes to the reports on collections made by the National Register of Archives, its annual List of accessions to repositories (continued since 1972 as Accessions to repositories and reports added to the National Register of Archives), and those reports, as yet unindexed, which seemed likely to embody relevant material.

It must again be emphasized that the mention of any document, or class of documents, does not necessarily imply that it is available for study. Material less than thirty years old may not normally be consulted in the public repositories—in others the closed period may still be fifty years.

As before, it is a pleasure to acknowledge the unstinting assistance provided by the numerous librarians, archivists, and curators of museums to the compilers. While these are far too many for their names to be listed individually, special thanks must go to the staff of the National Register of Archives who have always shown themselves willing, and indeed eager, to give every possible help. Much useful advice was also obtained from the deliberations of a special seminar under the chairmanship of Professor W. G. Beasley held in the History Department of the School of Oriental and African Studies.

The volume has been published with the assistance of a financial grant from the Publications Committee of the School. It may be regarded as part of the United Kingdom's contribution to the Sources for the history of the nations: Asia and North Africa, projected by the International Council on Archives.

Application should be made in writing to the Secretary of the Bank.

THE BAPTIST MISSIONARY SOCIETY

The Baptist Missionary Society, which was founded in 1792, set up its first mission station in China in 1860 and was active in North China and Shanghai until about 1951. Work was started in Hong Kong in 1953. Some of the society's records were destroyed when its premises were bombed in 1940, but a good collection has survived and these have been newly sorted and inventoried. The records of the last fifty years are not open to students. (Marchant, pp. 27–9; Keen, BMS/1–13; Mary M. Evans, Baptist Missionary Society. Papers relating to China 1860–1914; catalogued 1965.) The following list of manuscripts in the British Museum has been compiled from the various catalogues, which are described in detail in The Catalogues of the Manuscript Collections in the British Museum, by T. C. Skeat (2nd edn., 1962). The printed catalogues cover accessions received up to 1945, and the Gladstone Papers which are described in a separate catalogue published in 1953. It was impossible to examine all later accessions for relevant material, and we have had to rely on the short descriptions and lists available in the Manuscript Room. Two of these have been published in facsimile by the List and Index Society. It is probable, therefore, that some items have been missed, but it is unlikely that any major collections have been omitted. Some large collections, not yet indexed, but certain to contain relevant material, have been noted briefly.

An Italian version of the travels to Cathay, &c.,

c. 1318–1330 of the Franciscan Odoric of Pordenone, or Friuli, transcribed by the Cavaliere Alessandro di Mortara from an ancient copy in his possession: entitled 'Memoriale del Viaggio di frate Oderigo di Friuli'. Early 19th century. 27 ff. (Add. 33756. Grenville Library, li.)
