

n the occasion of the 10th Anniversary of the City Polytechnic of Hong Kong, I would like to proffer my warmest congratulations to all those connected with this institution of higher technical education for the great success and achievement made during the first ten formative years.

This institution was established in 1984 and developed within the period immediately following the signing of the Sino-British Joint Declaration on the political future of Hong Kong. During this transitional period Hong Kong was undergoing a structural change in both its political and economic systems. On the one hand, Hong Kong was and still is facing an extremely high rate of outflow of professionals of various occupations and experiencing a rapid shift from manufacturing to

servicing industries. On the other, there is an ambitious plan for the development of tertiary education by doubling the first-year first-degree places from 7,000 in 1990 to about 15,000 in 1995. By then, there will be tertiary places for over 18% of the relevant age group.

The City Polytechnic as one of the few tertiary institutions took up the challenge to expand rapidly both in student population and in diversity of courses of study. From a blank sheet in 1984, the institution today (1994) has nearly 15,000 students enrolled in more than 70 disciplines. This is a remarkable achievement by any standards.
