A NEW VENTURE

One of the problems which beset the present-day publisher is the inability to bring before the reading public the increasing number of new books and new authors. The problem, created by lack of materials and skilled labour, is not mitigated by the fact that many famous modern books have gone out of print. It is almost certain that this is the first time in the history of publishing that such a position has arisen, but, serious as it is, the consequence is beneficial to the readers of Penguin Books.

Under an agreement which has been made between Penguin Books and five leading publishers – Chatto & Windus, Faber & Faber, Hamish Hamilton, Heinemann, and Michael Joseph – Penguins have the opportunity of reprinting some of these books, many by authors who have not appeared in Penguins before. 
