CUMULATIVE INDEX FOR VOLUMES I-VII AND SUPPLEMENTS I-IV





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Introduction

The twenty-six articles in *British Writers, Supplement IV* survey writers who for one reason or another are not represented in either the initial seven volumes of *British Writers* (1979–1984) or in supplements I (1987), II (1992), or III (1996). In Supplement IV, as distinct from its predecessors, all but a couple of the writers came of age following World War II; they are not only moderns, but contemporaries, their careers still evolving.

From its inception, British Writers was designed as a companion to the ongoing American Writers (1974-). These two sets were followed by Ancient Writers: Greece and Rome (2 vols., 1982), by European Writers (14 vols., 1983–1991) and its three-volume redaction, European Writers (1992), by Latin American Writers (3 vols., 1989), and by African Writers (2 vols., 1996). These volumes constitute, so far, the Scribner World Literature series. And they are allied to works such as Science Fiction Writers (1982), Supernatural Fiction Writers (2 vols., 1985), William Shakespeare: His World, His Work, His Influence (3) vols., 1985), Writers for Children (1988), The Books of the Bible (1989), Modern American Women Writers (1991), African-American Writers (1991), and American Nature Writers (2 vols., 1996).

Each article in *British Writers Supplement IV* is devoted to a single writer; each is between twelve and fifteen thousand words long. Each article presents an account of the writer's works, life, and relations to his or her time, place, and literary context. But from article to article the emphasis varies, just as from writer to writer the relative interest of the life, the reading, the situation varies. Whatever the relative emphasis, the works come first; other matters are taken up to the extent that they form or inform the works.

In style and scope, the articles are expressly written for that mythical but inspiring figure, the general reader, rather than for the specialist. They are written, that is, for high school, college, and graduate students, as well as for their teachers; for librarians and editors; for reviewers, scholars, and critics; for literary browsers; for anyone who wants to repair an erosion or gap in his or her reservoir of knowledge. The article that can at once inform the general reader and stimulate the specialist will have achieved its goal.

Above all, and in consultation with librarians, the editors asked themselves whether a writer under consideration for inclusion was someone that English-speaking readers were likely to look up upon publication of Supplement IV or twenty years later. The editors therefore took into account a shift in reader interest and critical activity and classroom attention that has not yet worked itself out. That shift, which is often thought of as a process of decanonization, includes a weakening of the distinction between popular literature and the other kind, whatever we call it. Thus in earlier supplements there were articles on such "popular" writers as Agatha Christie, John le Carré, Bram Stoker, H. Rider Haggard, Dorothy L. Sayers, and Daphne du Maurier; and thus, in Supplement IV, there are articles on Eric Ambler and P. D. James.

In accordance with a practice that evolved early in the series, not all the writers represented in Supplement IV are "British" in one or another restricted sense of the word. Salman Rushdie, for example, was born in Bombay; Christina Stead and Thomas Keneally are Australian-born; Paul Muldoon is very much an Irishman. But their relation to British literary culture was continuous and formative, if sometimes adversarial; their work shows up most vividly for what it is against the background of that British literary culture it enlarges or contests. In any case, the editors felt that readers would want to look up Keneally and Muldoon, for example, but could not do so elsewhere in articles like the ones that make up this volume. This last justification, however, could apply to all the articles in this volume: they are all about writers who are well worth looking up.
